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# ORDER ACKNOWLEDGING INDEXING AND PASS-THROUGH RATE ADJUSTMENTS

BY THE COMMISSION:

On May 22, 1989, Rolling Oaks Utilities, Inc. (Utility) notified this Commission of its intention to increase rates to its customers in Citrus County by application of the price-indexing and pass-through provisions of Subsections 367.081(4)(a) and (b), Florida Statutes, respectively, and Rules 25-30.420 and 25-30.425, Florida Administrative Code, respectively.

By Order No. 20972, issued by this Commission on March 31, 1989, in Docket No. 890005-WS, the rates of water and sewer utilities are subject to adjustment as a result of the application of the price index to certain utility operation and maintenance costs. The indexing factor is 4.35 percent.

The Utility also intends to pass through to its customers an increase in its property taxes. The Utility waived its right to place the pass-through rates into effect thirty days from the filing date of this notice and states that these rates are to become effective simultaneously with the indexing adjustment.

The documentation submitted by the Utility in support of its indexing and pass-through notice meets the Commission's requirements, as set forth in Rules 25-30.420 and 25-30.425, Florida Administrative Code. In compliance with said rules, the Utility advised us that it will provide notice to its customers prior to the effective date of the rates, informing them of the impending rate adjustment and explaining that the increase is due to the pass-through provisions and the application of the price index to certain operation and maintenance expenses.

Applying increase factors of 1.0318 and 1.0296 to the existing rate schedules, plus a pass-through increase of \$.05 and \$.04 per equivalent residential connection (ERC), results in increased water and sewer revenues of \$24,653 and \$23,508, respectively. The schedules of our computations are as follows:
