- 1 O. PLEASE STATE YOUR NAME AND OCCUPATION.
- 2 A. Cheryl R. Phoenix, Director of the Florida Coalitica
- 3 Against Domestic Violence ("FCADV").
- 4 O. WHAT IS YOUR EDUCATIONAL AND WORK BACKGROUND?
- 5 A. I have a Bachelor's Degree in Social Work, and have
- 6 worked in two Florida shelters before becoming FCADV Director.
- 7 Q. PARAGE DESCRIBE THE MEMBERSHIP AND FUNCTION OF THE

- 4 A. YCADY is a non-profit group composed of twenty-nine
- battered women's shelters, concerned citizens and other groups
- 11 working to end domestic violence in our state. We have been
- 12 working since our inception in 1976 to support shelters
- 13 through technical assistance and legislated funding, to
- 16 aducate the public about the realities of domestic violence,
- and to protect battered women and their children by bringing
- 16 to the forefront issues concerning them, such as protective

- 1 Q. WHAT IS THE PURPOSE OF YOUR TESTINONY TODAY?
- 2 A. The purpose of my testimony is to highlight issues

- 6 O. WHAT IS YOUR UNDERSTANDING OF CALLER I.D.?
- 7 A. I understand Caller I.D. to be a service which Southern
- g Ball wishes to introduce in Florida which would allow a
- o costomer to be able to identify the telephone numbers of
- incoming calls with a purchased display unit.
- II G. WEST IS YOUR UNDERSTANDING OF FER-CALL AND PER-LIME
- 12 RINGRIMOY
- 13 A. I understand that Southern Bell would not make either
- ortion generally available to the public. However, domestic
- violence intervention agencies and law enforcement agencies
- 16 Will be able to obtain Per-Line Blocking free of charge, if

- 21 A. I understand Call Trace to be a third service option
- which is now available, which allows a recipient of a crank

- WEAT EFFECTS WOULD CALLER I.D. HAVE ON BATTERED WOMEN AND
- THEIR CHILDRENT 5

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- Caller I.D., if offered as proposed, will be lethal to battered women and their children. Every year, pauple leave abusive partners, often having to hide in order to live. Many of these victims have to contact the abuser, either because of Ç children involved, divorce or property settlements, etc. 20 the abuser obtained the device needed, he would know what 1.1. state, city, and even house in which the victim was now 4 residing. Because during and after a separation is the most 33 dangerous time for a battered woman, resulting in 30% of all 1 45 fomale homicides being from their partners, this would 15 obviously endanger thousands of battered women and their 16 children. 17
 - This option would also endanger hundreds of shelter advocates who return hotline calls from their homes at night. If an abuser were to call during these hours, he would automatically know the location of that advocate, putting her at even further danger than is normally experienced.

- WHAT EFFECTS DO YOU SEE PER-CALL AND PER-LINE ELOCKING
- 32 MAVING?

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3 My understanding with Per-Call Blocking as proposed is that one can block his or her number from being sent by đ, 6 pushing additional numbers at the end of the sequence. 6 concern with Per-Call Blocking is that this does not take into Š consideration the telephone use by battered women's children, who may or may not remember to dial the numbers when calling dad. When this becomes the case, all safety in Call Block is negated. Since almost half of all children in violent homes are also physically or sexually abused, we are putting them at risk for revictimization if the abuser tries to take the children unsupervised from their homes.

There are several unanswered questions we have with Per-Line Blocking. The first concern we have in that battered woxen who are struggling to be financially independent will be unable to afford another monthly phone charge, and how will Sorthern Bell decide who can obtain it free of charge? a victim have to detail all of the threats, physical and saxual abuse which she has experienced, and that of her children? If vo, how will Southern Bell be able to adequately handle 60,000 requests from individuals in this state, which is the number of victims who called the domestic violence hotlines atatewide last year? Is this a reasonable solution to the problems?

1 O. WHAT HYPECTS RIGHT CALL TRACE HAVE OF BATTERED WOMEN AND

THEY CHILDRED?

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A. Call Trace seems to be an excellent method for dealing with harassing phone calls, crank calls, and obscene phone calls. Call Trace, if offered on a per-use charge basis, would be a viable option for battered women to document with the police if the abuser is still harassing her. For a victim with an Injunction for Protection, Call Trace would mean massety and enforcement of the court order given. It would be more of a service, however, it Call Trace were offered immediately for all Southern Bell customers on a Per-Use Charge, and could ultimately make the difference in time for a battered woman whose abuser is threatening to kill her on the telephone, but cannot be arrested until she can prove it.

cirisen/vigilante from taking "justice" into his or her own hands if given the number of an obscene phone caller. Law Enforcement officials would then be better equipped to deal with complaints of disturbing phone calls since they would immediately have the number of the offender. As a Coalition of people concerned with all of the violence in our society, we see this as a much more acceptable option to deal with abusive behavior.

In conclusion, the Florida Coalition Against Dorestic Violence is very concerned with Caller I.D., Per-Call Blocking, and Per-Line Blocking as proposed. We see them as

being very dangerous for many Florida citizens, but especially 3 for the 60,000+ victims of domestic violence who fear reprisal 2 from their abusive partners. We oppose both services as offered because of this, but support the offering of Per-Line Blocking to ALL Southern Bell customers, free of charge. also feel strongly that Call Trace should be an cition for all 1 customers on a Per-use Charge, in order for people to be able 7 to utilize this service immediately. We trust that the 2.5 Florida Public Service Commission will take these concerns 9 into consideration when deciding the fate of our privacy and 20 maraty. 11.
