In response to your recent questions relayed to me and the Utility verbally, and as a result of correction of the index filing which ultimately affects the revenue figures shown in this Limited Proceeding filing, I am attaching revised schedules showing the ACK calculation of the revenue short-fall; calculation of annualized AFA revenue; calculation of the rate adjustment necessary to implement the increase; schedule of present and proposed rates; tariff APP sheets; and customer notice of increase; all revised in order to CAF reflect changes which we have discussed. CMU

Based upon our recent conversations, I understand that the Staff is considering the possibility that the entire rate increase should be allocated to base charges, and I believe there is some merit to such a proposal. revenue; and a notice of the filing of the Application for Rate Increase in this docket. I have attempted to respond to each of these requests separately below.

- 1. Copies of previous paid invoices— Attached hereto are a copy of the bill rendered and the billing register for 1991 and 1992, reflecting the amount of such fire protection charges imposed upon the City of Parkland. As you can see, the services for 1991 were not billed to the City of Parkland until early 1992, along with the charge for 1992, the breakdown is shown on the bill which was rendered. As you know, the rendition of this bill started the City's discussions of whether or not they should be paying Parkland Utilities, Inc., for this service, and their ultimate decision not to pay that bill, or any future bills. I am also attaching the bills rendered for 1988, 1989, and 1990 services.
- 2. Verification of the number of active fire hydrants— As you know, our filing was based upon service to 81 fire hydrants. In previous years, the Utility imposed a charge based upon 78 hydrants. The three additional hydrants result from the addition of a new elementary school, which at present time is nearing completion and is on-line with three new fire hydrants thereon. Therefore, in order to properly reflect the revenues lost as a result of the City's decision to discontinue payment of fire protection service charges, the revenue short-fall must be calculated using the total number of hydrants currently receiving such service.
- 3. Annualized Revenue— I have attached hereto a revised version of the calculation of annualized revenue, excluding fire hydrant charges. As we discussed, while it is appropriate to include those hydrant charges in the index and in calculating the appropriate index percentage, it is not appropriate to include them in the annualized revenue in this limited proceeding. If we were to do so, the proposed increase which would result would not cover the revenue short-fall resulting from the City's decision to discontinue payment of fire protection charges.
- 4. <u>Customer Notice</u>— I have prepared a simple customer notice to inform the customers that the Application for a Limited Proceeding Rate Increase has been filed and the reason for such increase. I have tried to keep this as simple and straightforward as possible while informing the customers of the basics.

After you have had a chance to review it, please let me know if you have any questions or comments.

- 5. Reported Revenues from Fire Hydrant Service. I am attaching copies of schedules from the 1989, 1990, and 1991, Annual Reports for Parkland Utilities, Inc., showing revenues collected by class of customer. There were some questions raised about the amount shown for Fire Protection Service revenue in each of these three years. I have discussed this with the Company and have determined the following:
- (a). The 1989 report shows \$12,480 for fire protection revenue. This is the result of the Utility having billed for 1988 and 1989 services together in mid-1989. I am attaching a copy of the bill and the City's check in payment for these specifically identifying these dollars as being related to both of those two years.
- (b). The 1990 Annual Report shows \$3,120 in fire protection revenue. I am attaching hereto a copy of the bill rendered to the City of Parkland for the first six months of 1990 totalling this amount. Apparently, the Utility in changing its billing agent around this time, overlooked charging for the latter half of 1990's fire protection service.
- (c). With regard to 1991, there is no line item whatsoever for Fire Protection Services. This is a result of the fact that the Utility failed to bill for those services during 1991 and instead billed the County in 1992 for both 1991 and 1992 charges. This is apparent from the bill previously referenced and attached hereto, dated March 13, 1992.

I trust that the above explanations and the attached information adequately responds to all your inquiries and concerns. Please let me know once you have approved the notice so that we can begin mailing it as soon as possible. Should you have any further questions at all, please let me know.

#### NOTES:

- (1) The revenue shortfall total is based upon application of the rates proposed in the recent Notice of Application of Index Provisions of Section 367.081(4)(a), Florida Statutes, to increase the existing charge for Public Fire Protection to \$109.73 per year.
- (2) It is estimated that approximately 25 hours of attorney's time will be necessary in order to prepare and process this Application through the Florida Public Service Commission. At \$135 per hour this equates to \$3,375 in attorney's fees. In addition, a filing fee of \$900 and estimated costs of \$225 will have to be expended by the Utility for a total of approximately \$4,500 in rate case expenses. Amortized over the statutory period of 4 years, this equates to a \$1,125 rate case expense amortization cost.

This annualized rate case amortization cost then must be grossed-up for regulatory assessment fees. Since the revenue shortfall already includes recognition of regulatory assessment fees, no gross-up of that figure is necessary. The revenue impact of the rate case expense is therefore \$1125 + .955 = \$1,178.01.

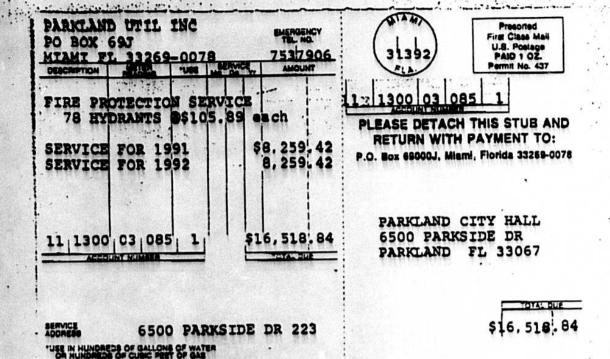
