2	CHAIRMAN JACOBS: Good morning. We will call this
3	hearing to order. Counsel, read the notice.
4	MS. ESPINOZA: By notice issued April 23rd, 2001, this
5	time and place has been set for a formal hearing in the
6	following consolidated dockets: Docket Number 990696-WS,
7	application for original certificates to operate a water and
8	wastewater utility in Duval and St. Johns Counties by Nocatee
9	Utility Corporation; and Docket Number 992040-WS, application
10	for certificates to operate a water and wastewater utility in
11	Duval and St. Johns Counties by Intercoastal Utilities, Inc.
12	10:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. have been set aside for customer
13	testimony sessions.
14	CHAIRMAN JACOBS: Very well. We will take
15	appearances. We can begin with you, Mr. Wharton.
16	MR. WHARTON: John Wharton and Marty Deterding
17	representing Intercoastal Utilities.
18	MR. KORN: I am Michael Korn from Korn & Zehmer,
19	Jacksonville. We represent the Sawgrass Association.
20	MR. HOFFMAN: Kenneth Hoffman and J. Stephen Menton of
21	the firm of Rutledge, Ecenia, Purnell & Hoffman on behalf of the
22	JEA. I would also like to enter an appearance for Michael B.
23	Wedner, Assistant General Counsel with the City of
24	Jacksonville's Office of General Counsel, 117 West Duval Street,
25	Suite 480, Jacksonville, Florida 32202, also on behalf of JEA.

CHAIRMAN JACOBS: Could you give me the spelling for 1 2 Mr. Wedner's last name? 3 MR. HOFFMAN: W-E-D-N-E-R. CHAIRMAN JACOBS: Thank you. 4 5 MR. MELSON: Richard Melson of the law firm Hopping, 6 Green. Sams & Smith on behalf of Nocatee Utility Corporation and DDI, Inc. 7 8 MS. CIBULA: Samantha Cibula and Lorena Espinoza on 9 behalf of Commission staff. 10 CHAIRMAN JACOBS: Before we begin. I would like to make a couple of notes. First, we have received a motion for 11 12 withdrawal from St. Johns County and we will acknowledge that for the record at this time and then we will come back later to 13 14 figure out how that works into the overall proceedings of the 15 case. As was noted in the reading of the notice, this time 16 has been designated as the time for customer hearing. Are there 17 18 any customers who are here to testify at this time? Let the record reflect that none have come forward. In an abundance of 19 20 caution, and, first of all, because Public Counsel is not here 21 and second of all because of the weather, I would like to stand 22 in recess for approximately ten minutes or so just to make sure 23 no one is in transit and attempting to get here. And then at the 24 end of that time we will come back on and announce how we will proceed from there. So for ten minutes we will stand in recess. 25

4 CHAIRMAN JACOBS: We will go back on the record. We 5 read the notice this morning for the customer hearing, is that 6 correct?

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MS. CIBULA: Correct.

8 CHAIRMAN JACOBS: This is the continuation of the 9 customer hearing portion of the combined docket applications for 10 certificate to operate water and wastewater utilities by Nocatee 11 Utility Corporation and Intercoastal Utilities to serve the 12 development Nocatee bordering -- I should say traversing Duval 13 and St. Johns Counties.

14 The purpose of the hearing this evening is for the 15 Commission to hear customer input on these applications. We will be considering the opposing applications in further proceedings 16 later on in Tallahassee. We will use the customer input that is 17 generated in addition to technical testimony that we have been 18 taking earlier in the day, and we will continue taking tomorrow. 19 20 And that will go into a formal proceeding that the Commission 21 will develop from which we will deliberate and make our decision.

As indicated in the handout that has been given, our decision will be made at an agenda conference that is presently scheduled for July 24th of this year. As of this time, we have one customer who I show signed up to testify this evening. And

7 1 in an abundance of caution, we waited a few moments. We will go 2 ahead and take that customer's testimony and then see if there are any other present at the conclusion of that testimony. 3 This is a part of a formal docket, so we will ask that 4 5 the customers who testify be sworn in. So all customers who are 6 here to testify, would you please stand and raise your right 7 hand. 8 (Witness sworn.) 9 CHAIRMAN JACOBS: You may approach. We call Mr. Roger 10 P. O'Reilly. 11 12 ROGER P. O'REILLY 13 was called as a witness on behalf of the Citizens of the State 14 of Florida and, having been duly sworn, testified as follows: 15 DIRECT STATEMENT CHAIRMAN JACOBS: Would you please restate your name 16 17 and address for the record. 18 MR. O'REILLY: My name is Roger O'Reilly. I live in Ponte Vedra, Florida, and currently I am a customer of 19 20 Intercoastal Utilities. And I have two concerns concerning the 21 proposed expansion of their facility so as to handle Nocatee. 22 The first concern is the impact that such an expansion will have on the facilities that they currently have in place 23 24 serving Ponte Vedra. And, secondly, how the expansion will be 25 financed. My understanding currently is that Intercoastal,

unlike electric utilities with which I am pretty familiar, has
 been given permission to take care of their expansion needs and
 their needs to accommodate EPA regulations by charging their
 current customers for that.

5 In my experience with electric utilities, the only way 6 they got money was to go out and borrow it and then if they did 7 have to meet EPA requirements, they got a municipal tax free loan 8 to provide for those kinds of facilities. So I am concerned 9 about the impact that this expansion will have on the current 10 customers as far as their costs are concerned.

11 CHAIRMAN JACOBS: Very well. Does that conclude your 12 statement, Mr. 0'Reilly?

MR. O'REILLY: That concludes my statement.

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14 CHAIRMAN JACOBS: Very well. Are there any questions, 15 counsel, staff, Commissioners?

Very well. Thank you very much for your statement,
Mr. O'Reilly. As I indicated, if you wish to continue to monitor
this case as it proceeds, there are various avenues for you to do
that. Most of those are explained in the blue handout that you
have. Thank you for coming this evening.

MR. O'REILLY: Does anyone answer questions here?
 CHAIRMAN JACOBS: If you would like to pose a
 question, we will take a stab at it.

24 MR. O'REILLY: Well, the question I pose is if they 25 expand into Nocatee, will that have an impact on the current 1 facilities they are using to serve Ponte Vedra? And the impact 2 that I was concerned was, of course, mostly in the area of odors 3 and their just general expansion of the plant in the area which 4 they currently occupy. And then secondly how they plan to 5 finance their expansion. If they plan to finance it by charging 6 current customers, obviously we would have a strong objection to 7 that.

8 CHAIRMAN JACOBS: I will offer that up to counsel for 9 Intercoastal.

10 MR. DETERDING: As far as the plan for service as proposed by Intercoastal, there is no plan to utilize the 11 12 facilities in the existing service area to serve those customers 13 in the proposed area. So that sewage treatment plant and those 14 wells would not be utilized for that purpose. There is, I 15 believe, still some consideration of bringing treated effluent 16 across to the new area to utilize for reuse water, but that is the only -- that is my understanding of the only cross between 17 18 the two. So we would not be utilizing -- would not propose to 19 utilize the current facilities for service to this new area.

As for the financing issue, all facilities would have to be financed through debt. We don't have municipal bonds, nor do we have access to municipal bonds, but we would seek either debt or equity infusion of debt or equity, new debt, or infusion of additional equity. The current proposal is to utilize whatever this Commission really thinks we ought to, but generally

1 debt to finance those new facilities.

2 MR. O'REILLY: When you get started and you do 3 increase your debt, I presume you are allowed to charge interest 4 during construction for that, and I presume that is paid by your 5 current customers?

6 MR. DETERDING: Well. no. that is not correct. 7 Interest during construction is an item that is capitalized to 8 your total investment and then is considered in future rate setting, but it is not something that you charge back to an 9 individual. In other words, once you start the construction and 10 11 start incurring interest, you don't start throwing that back to 12 your existing customers. You capitalize it and at some point in 13 time you request rates to recognize that.

What Intercoastal has proposed to do in this case is to -- the last proposal that is in the record, or will be in the record in this case is that the utility will keep their rates the same and in about four or five years they should be able to reduce them to all customers. And what they have proposed to do is to go a step farther and, in fact, immediately reduce rates to all customers about 5 percent.

MR. O'REILLY: So in effect you are saying that the expansion into Nocatee will not have any impact on current customers either from the influence of the expansion on the current facilities or on the rates that the customers, current customers are paying?

1 MR. DETERDING: Other than based upon our projections 2 and our proposal to immediately reduce rates about 5 percent and 3 to long-term reduce rates by a substantial amount more. 4 MR. O'REILLY: So this will not have an impact on 5 odors. either, emanating from the plant? 6 MR. DETERDING: This should have absolutely no impact 7 on that issue. 8 MR. O'REILLY: Thank you. 9 COMMISSIONER JABER: Mr. O'Reilly -- if I could just 10 clarify, Mr. Chairman, an issue. The person answering your 11 questions was the attorney for Intercoastal. I wanted to just be clear on that. And there is an issue that is before us, it 12 13 is Issue 20, and hopefully staff will hand you a copy of the 14 prehearing order on your way out, that has us looking at the 15 public interest associated with granting what Intercoastal has 16 requested. And staff to the degree -- our staff to the degree 17 that there would be any impact on current customers, that would 18 be the place that they would discuss it and we would consider 19 it. If any. If there is any impact. 20 MR. O'REILLY: Thank you. 21 CHAIRMAN JACOBS: Thank you very much. Any other

questions? You are excused. Are there any customers whose have arrived and who would like to speak before the Commission this evening?

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MR. KORN: Mr. Chairman, if I might. Mr. Flury, who

is, of course, the President of the Sawgrass Association, is 1 2 here and has been here throughout most of the day, and could 3 theoretically speak as a customer since he is, in fact, a 4 customer of Intercoastal Utilities. However, it would be my 5 suggestion so as not to unduly lengthen the proceedings this 6 evening, since Mr. Flury will be testifying in this docket, that 7 he will have an opportunity to address the Commission and be 8 cross-examined at that time so as to not unduly lengthen this 9 evening's proceedings. 10 CHAIRMAN JACOBS: Very well. 11 MR. KORN: And, of course, Mr. Flury speaks for the
