FLORIDA POWER & LIGHT COMPANY'S RESPONSE TO BARRON COLLIER COMPANIES' MOTION FOR LEAVE TO FILE TESTIMONY OUT OF TIME

Florida Power & Light Company ("FPL"), by and through its undersigned counsel, and pursuant to Rule 28-106.204(1), Florida Administrative Code, hereby files this Response to the Motion for Leave to File Testimony Out of Time ("Motion") filed by Barron Collier Companies ("Barron Collier"). This Response is filed subject to the pending Petition to Intervene filed by Barron Collier. In response to Barron Collier's Motion, FPL states as follows:

- 1. In its Motion, Barron Collier concedes that as a putative intervenor, "Barron Collier is taking the case as it finds it..." However, despite this concession, Barron Collier does not wish to take the case as it finds it. Barron Collier seeks permission to file testimony that was required to be filed on March 12, 2003.²
- 2. As purported support for permission to file its testimony, Barron Collier inaccurately suggests that FPL somehow failed to provide notice of this proceeding and that Barron Collier was essentially surprised to learn that this proceeding was pending.
 - 3. Barron Collier's accusations belie the facts. The facts are:

- a. Pursuant to Rule 25-22.075(4), Florida Administrative Code, FPL published notice of the final hearing in this proceeding at least 45 days before the April 8, 2003 final hearing. The notice had been approved by the Commission Staff. FPL's notices of final hearing were quarterpage ads published in local newspapers in areas where the proposed line could be placed, including publication in the Naples Daily News on February 20, 2003. The notices of final hearing and Affidavits of Publication were filed with the Commission on March 5, 2003.
- b. The Commission also published notice of the final hearing in this proceeding at least 45 days before the April 8, 2003 final hearing date in the Florida Administrative Weekly, pursuant to Rule 25-22.075(3), Florida Administrative Code.
- c. In addition to complying with the legal notice requirements, FPL has implemented an extensive consumer outreach program regarding the new line. FPL held open houses in Lee and Collier Counties on February 12 and 13, 2003, respectively. An additional open house was held in the Naples area on March 11, 2003. Notice of each of the open houses was provided through newspaper advertisements (copy attached as Exhibit A) and individual mailed notices to numerous property owners in the study area. Barron Collier was mailed an individual notice for *the February 12 and 13, 2003*, open houses (copy attached as Exhibit B). The open houses provided a forum for discussion and input concerning FPL's proposal to build a new 230kV transmission line in a new, geographically diverse right-of-way between the Orange River Substation and Collier Substation. The open houses also provided a forum for discussion of the need determination, siting and certification process. Indeed, at all open houses a series of large display boards (each 30 inch x 30 inch) was prominently displayed in the meeting room. One of these large display boards provided highlights of the regulatory approval and construction timeline, including the on-going PSC need

determination process. This entry on the large display board even indicated the approximate time period within which the Commission's decision in the need determination process was anticipated.

(A copy of a reduced version of the display board used at the open houses is attached hereto as Exhibit C).

- d. FPL also has established a Community Advisory Panel for the purpose of gathering input from potentially affected citizens in Lee and Collier Counties on the transmission line project and potential corridors for the siting of the proposed line.³ A member of the Community Advisory Panel, Vernon Wheeler, was identified by Barron Collier to be their representative on that group. Mr. Wheeler was an active participant at Community Advisory Panel meetings and should have been well aware of the open house schedule.
- e. Finally, FPL has provided information about the proposed new line and the approval process to numerous media representatives. As a result, the project has been the subject of several newspaper articles in local newspapers, including an article that appeared in the Naples Daily News in Collier County on November 21, 2002 that specifically referenced the requirement that FPL secure approval of the new line from this Commission. (Copy attached as Exhibit D).

These facts establish that Barron Collier either knew or should have known of the on-going need determination process before the Commission well in advance of the deadline for filing of testimony.

This line will connect our existing Orange River substation east of Fort Myers to the existing Collies substation east of Naples. The new transmission line is needed to serve your area with electric power.

Routes currently under review

The rours currently under review are shown here on the map and are described as follows:

Beginning from the intersection of Collier Boulevard (CR 951) with FPL's existing transmission line right-of-way just north of Green Boulevard:

- Rollowing FPI's existing transmission line right-of-way west to Santa Barbara Boulevard, following Santa Barbara Boulevard south to Golden Gate Parkway, following Golden Gate Parkway west to Collier rubstation
- Following FPL's existing transmission line right-of-way (just north of
 Green Boulevard) west from CR 951 to the FPL transmission line right-ofway at Livingston Road. In addition, from the FPL transmission line
 right-of-way at Livingston Road/Pine Ridge Road, following Pine Ridge
 Road west to Airport-Pulling Road, following Airport-Pulling Road south
 to the existing FPL transmission line right-of-way just porth of Golden
 Gate Parkway, and following that right-of-way east to Collier substation
- Following FPL's existing transmission line right-of-way east across
 Collier Boulevard, and south, parallel to Collier Boulevard, to SR 84
 (Davis Boulevard), following Davis Boulevard west to another of FPL's
 existing transmission line rights-of-way, following that transmission line
 right-of-way north to Collier substation
- Following Collier Boulevard south to Radio Road (CR 856), following Radio Road west to FPL's existing transmission line right-of-way, following FPL's transmission line right-of-way north to Collier substation
- Following Collier Boulevard south to Davis Boulevard, following Davis Boulevard west to FPL's existing transmission line right-of-way, following FPL's transmission line right-of-way north to Collier substation


When finished, the overhead transmission line will let us continue to meet the electric needs of our area's growing population. It will also help us satisfy the needs of customers who have increased their use of electricity.

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

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FPL to build new power line in SW Florida

The state's largest utility says it will work with local governments and civic leaders to determine where the backup line will be placed

To get more power to the people, Florida Power & Light Co. plans to build another 36-mile transmission line in Southwest Florida.

The second line is needed to keep up with the region's burgeoning growth, and will provide a backup energy source to local residents, said Mike Haggerty, a spokesman for FPL in Miami.

Like the existing line, the new line will have poles stretching anywhere from 30 to 60 feet in the sir, but it won't follow the same route, FPL, the state's largest utility, plans to work with local governments and civic leaders to come up with the alignment.

"For safety sake it has to be on a different route." Haggerty said. "We have to have a dual system—a backup."

The new line will connect FPL's substation on Golden Gate Parkway to the Orange River substation in Fort Myers.

Parts of the line could be built below ground. However, local communities that want underground lines will have to pay for them. And they don't come cheap.

"It could be millions," Haggerty said. "A transmission line is a huge deal."

To keep up with the region's growth, FPL needs to have a second line in service by December 2005, Haggerty said.

Southwest Florida is one of the fastest growing areas that FPL

Over the last five years, the company has seen a 25 percent growth in customers in Lee County. At the same time, the company's customers in Collier County have grown by 31 percent.

Before it can build the new line, FPL needs to get permits from Lee and Collier counties, as well as from any cities that the line will go through. The company is also required to get approval from the Florida Public Service Commis-

sion and the governor and Cabinet, Haggorty said.

Kevin Bloom, a spokesman for the Florida Public Service Commission, said he hadn't heard of FPL's expansion plans in Southwest Florida.

To get commission approval, FPL has to show that the line is necessary to meet future demand.

Bloom said he was encouraged to hear FPL's plans to work with the local community to determine the route.

"It certainly behooves a company to work with local governments and to negotiate a preferred route," Bloom said. "But out role is only to certify that the need exists."
