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## T-MOBILE'S RESPONSE IN OPPOSITION TO FPL'S STATUS REPORT RELATED TO STAY OF PROCEEDINGS

T-MOBILE SOUTH LLC ("T-Mobile"), pursuant to Rules 28-103.006, 28-105.001-105.003, and 28-106.204, Florida Administrative Code, hereby responds in opposition to the Florida Power and Light Company ("FPL") Status Report Related To Stay of Proceedings (hereinafter, "Report"). T-Mobile respectfully requests that the Florida Public Service Commission ("Commission") deny the continued stay requested by FPL and that the Commission proceed to address and grant T-Mobile's prior pleadings to dismiss the original Petition for Emergency Rule or, Alternatively, Declaratory Statement (hereinafter, "Petition"), as the ultimate relief being sought, the issuance of an emergency rule, has never been, and remains, unnecessary and inappropriate. As grounds for denying the continued stay, T-Mobile states:

1. We are now more than six months downstream from FPL's original Petition for Emergency Rulemaking in this matter. As is clear from the face of FPL's Report, there is no more emergency or any other circumstance compelling any action by this Commission today than there was at the time of the original Petition in April. Without rearguing the substance of T-Mobile's May 30, 2006, Response to FPL's Motion for Stay, or its Response to the Petition filed on May 12, 2006 (both of which T-Mobile incorporates by reference), there is absolutely no reason or basis for continuing this docket seeking the issuance of an emergency rule or a declaratory statement. FPL has never proven or even

- sufficiently pled any basis for this docket, and its Motion admitted that the "threat" that compelled its initial Petition is nonexistent. Indeed, T-Mobile has not, and will not, do anything to "threaten" FPL's system.
- 2. The Report FPL filed on November 1, 2006, which undersigned counsel did not receive until November 8<sup>th</sup>, does not provide any new information of any kind regarding any threat to the safety or reliability of its system meriting the continuation of this docket. The only thing FPL has said is that it would like to keep this docket open in case it needs it. That is simply not a legitimate basis for continuing this docket any further. If it was, then T-Mobile would be justified in filing its own presumptive complaint against FPL for failure to negotiate in good faith just to maintain a placeholder docket. This is simply not authorized by or within the scope and intent of the rules.
- Finally, FPL has asserted that the ongoing rulemaking proceeding, Docket Nos. 060172-EI and 060173-EI "could potentially resolve some or all of the issues in this proceeding."

  Report, at 5. Again, the procedural posture of this docket is an emergency rulemaking, which requires "an immediate danger to the public health, safety, or welfare" requiring "emergency action." It is simply not permissible to hold open an emergency rulemaking request for six months or more while the Commission proceeds in due course with its rulemaking and then use the emergency rulemaking docket to collaterally attack the results of the rulemaking or a third party, such as T-Mobile.

WHEREFORE, T-Mobile respectfully requests that the Commission deny FPL's request to continue the Stay of Proceedings and that the Commission proceed to address the merits of the original Petition and deny the Petition for Emergency Rulemaking and Alternative Request for Declaratory Statement, and that this docket be closed.
