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

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CHAIRMAN EDGAR: And we are on Item 3.

MR. HARRIS: Good morning, Commissioners. Larry
Harris on behalf of the Commission.

Item 3 is staff's recommendation that the Commission propose amendments to Rule 25-6.0143. Specifically, the amendments would be for storm accounting purposes. Staff recommends that the Commission propose several amendments to Account 228.2.

We're available to answer any questions you might have. I believe parties are available, but no one has asked to speak.

CHAIRMAN EDGAR: Thank you, Mr. Harris.

Commissioners, questions for our staff?

Commissioner McMurrian.

COMMISSIONER McMURRIAN: I have a few questions and comments sort of mixed in.

Staff, I wanted to make sure that I'm clear about the deferred accounting treatment section. And I realize that is basically for cause which the Commission has not yet established the appropriate disposition or accounting treatment.

Do I understand correctly that after the Commission has decided on these items that are listed there, again, in the future that they may be moved to either the (1)(e) for the

items that are included in the subaccount, or to (1)(f), the items that are excluded? And I guess Part B is would that necessitate a rule change, or is that something we can do by order, or is it that these costs that are listed there are something we will just litigate each time? Sorry for the compound question.

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MR. SLEMKEWICZ: Well, I can answer part of that question. Most of those costs would be ones that really need justification each time to be included, and we would need to see the rationale for including those items. Now, it's possible that after numerous times that we have gone through these items, we may decide that they may be moved either to be excluded all the time or included all the time. But I think that needs -- you know, we need to wait to see how future commissions decide on these issues. And they were kind of controversial in the hearings that we had on the prior storms.

COMMISSIONER McMURRIAN: Thank you. I think that answered that.

And I guess the next thing is related to that. I'm not sure if it fits, but can the concept of the risk management pool or the capture as raised by FIPUG and Gulf, is that something that could be included in this deferred accounting method, or is that just something -- I realize that staff has recommended to have a workshop on those items, but did staff look at whether or not that concept could go into that deferred

accounting since these are, sort of, items in limbo?

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MR. SLEMKEWICZ: I believe with something like that that they would have to come before the Commission anyway to propose it. And whether or not it's in the rule or not in the rule, that it could be approved for inclusion in the property insurance reserve. And I think it needs some further study before we would want to say one way or the other whether we think it should be included.

COMMISSIONER McMURRIAN: Okay. I guess I should just say that I'm really encouraged by the concept. I think that we have heard a lot from the public in the past about questioning whether or not there is insurance for these companies, and we know that there is a lot of impediments to that, but it seems like there is some hope that we might be able to put something in place that will mitigate the costs to the ratepayers in this area. And I very much appreciate staff bringing that concept to our attention and recommending that if we propose these amendments and they are adopted, that you will conduct a workshop to fully explore it.

But that sort of raised a question. There was a recommendation within the staff analysis there about that. Is that something that staff thinks that we need to vote on, or by voting on Issue 1 and proposing the rule amendments, do we incorporate that recommendation and approve that?

MR. HARRIS: I do not believe you all -- it's

incorporated in Item 1, which is should you propose the rule amendments. As staff conceives it at this point, we would be having some type of information gathering, whether it's a staff workshop, a staff workshop that the Commissioners want to be present at, a conference call, we don't have those details fleshed out yet. But what staff needs to know is sort of what this idea is, what we're talking about, the scope, the parameter, things like that. And then staff can make a decision as to sort of which way it needs to go.

So, at this point we're not asking for a vote from you all on should -- we're not asking you to vote that staff should go forward with this. We are planning to do it -- part of staff's responsibility is to gather this type of information and bring it to you all, so we are planning to do that. Your vote would be to propose the amendments. Part of that is staff's advising you that we plan to take this next step of having a workshop. So I don't think you're voting to authorize us to have a workshop or ordering us to.

COMMISSIONER McMURRIAN: Okay. I didn't think it was necessarily something that needed a vote; but, at the same time, the way it was worded, it was sort of staff recommends that. And I wondered if we needed to make sure that we let you know that we thought that was a good idea, if we all do. I, of course, do.

MR. HARRIS: I suppose you could instruct us from the

bench to do it, yes, or to not do it, that you don't think it's a good idea and would prefer we don't have that workshop. Or, something else, you could say we think there should be a Commission workshop, or something. So, I guess that's why we used the language recommends.

Our intent is to go forward and gather this information and bring it back to you all in some way. If you all would like us to do something else, we would be happy to do that at your direction.

COMMISSIONER McMURRIAN: I guess that brings up one more question. If it's not a Commission workshop, we still could listen in to it at least, right?

MR. HARRIS: Yes, ma'am.

COMMISSIONER McMURRIAN: There may be issues about attending it, or at least all of us attending it, but we could listen in.

MR. HARRIS: Yes, ma'am. And you would be able to attend. It would be noticed as Commissioners may be present. The distinction I see is a Commission workshop, you all are up there at the bench and people are addressing you. A staff workshop, we're gathering the information. If you are there and asking questions, that's one thing, but it's not primarily for you all's benefit. People aren't on notice that it's the Commission sitting in your formal capacity taking this information.

COMMISSIONER McMURRIAN: Chairman, that's all the questions I have. If we are ready for a motion, I can do that, too.

CHAIRMAN EDGAR: Commissioner Carter, do you have questions or comments?

COMMISSIONER CARTER: Just a brief comment, Madam

Chairman. I was going through the -- I started to say litany,
but the chronology of this rule. And I think that based upon
the level of detail and the amount of input from all of the
parties, as well as staff working with the parties and
gathering the information, I think they have captured the
essence of what we decided as well as incorporated a lot of the
great recommendations that we got. So I just wanted to go on
record as saying I support staff's recommendation on this. I
think they have done a very comprehensive job on it.

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CHAIRMAN EDGAR: Thank you, Commissioner.

And I guess I would just take the opportunity to say that I agree with both of your statements. You know, I think we all, the Commission, our staff, and I think the utilities and consumers all learned a lot as we dealt with the storms in '04 and '05, and as we addressed the issues that arose after the fact. And I think that to have the rule in place, the proposed amendments in place that clearly lay out some of the things that we learned, and some of the incipient policies, I

guess, that were developed through that process is useful. And I think staff has done a good job.

I also, Commissioner McMurrian, agreed with I think what I think you are saying was your reading of the way the recommendation was written, that a vote to adopt the proposed amendments wasn't necessarily a vote to proceed looking at possible issues with insurance, commerical availability, pooling, and some of those. But I think that is an excellent thing for us to pursue and for our staff to work on, and we can certainly work with them to see procedurally what's the best way to bring that information forward. So I'm pleased with the product, and if there's no further comment we can have a motion.

Commissioner McMurrian.

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COMMISSIONER McMURRIAN: Thank you.

With that clarification, I'll move staff's recommendation in its entirety.

COMMISSIONER CARTER: Second.

CHAIRMAN EDGAR: And I agree. So all in favor say aye.

(Unanimous affirmative vote.)

CHAIRMAN EDGAR: Opposed? Show it adopted.

And, Commissioners, that is our last item of business for today.
