CHAIRMAN BRISÉ: Thank you, Commissioner Balbis, for leading us in the pledge and prayer invocation.

COMMISSIONER BROWN: I'm doing okay. How are

CHAIRMAN BRISÉ: Good. We're doing well.

Before we get into the business, I just wanted to wish our Executive Director, Mr. Baez, a happy birthday.

(Applause.)

All right. So we wish you all the best and hope you enjoy today.

Commissioner Edgar.

COMMISSIONER EDGAR: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

And you know, because we mentioned it last time, that this is our last regularly scheduled Agenda Conference of the year, and that means that this is your last Agenda Conference sitting in that center chair serving as our presiding officer, for the time being anyway. So we have to make a few comments and we want to make a few comments.

Of course, we all know and recognize and are very grateful for the wonderful job that you have done

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as our Chairman over these past two years, and I know that it is not always as easy as you make it look. But thank you for making it look so simple and easy, like there's just nothing to it. We're all grateful for all the work that you have done building on the prior work of your predecessor and maybe even some of those that have come before you in that role. You have done a yeoman's work of uniting our agency, leveraging our individual talents, and even our idiosyncrasies.

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Chairman Brisé, as we all know, has been steadfast and he has been heartfelt in his pursuit of the public interest and of all of our decisions in all of our proceedings. And even at times when everyone up here and probably everyone in the room is maybe a little tired and a little frustrated -- it does happen sometimes occasionally -- you have kindly and gently guided us, helping us to all take a deep breath, perhaps me in particular, steered us away from those rocky shoals, you've been our captain there in the center. Chairman Brisé has been our rock in the midst of turbulence when it arises. He is amazingly and admirably slow to anger. But I can tell you, because I've had the chance to sit this close for the last two years, that every once in a while I see a little spark there in his eyes, and then I just try to lay low and

hope that I was not the cause of it. Because, believe me, you don't want to be.

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You have always shown, as I said when I first had the honor of nominating you to be our Chair, that you have the heart of a public servant, and you have been a wonderful leader for us, a great role model for me, and I am so, so grateful and will forever be grateful for your leadership.

You mentioned a couple of weeks ago at one of our meetings as we were just gathering that you had rarely used the gavel, and I told you that that was too bad because that was one of the most fun things of the job, to sit there, is to be able to bang the gavel. So we want you to you keep practicing, so I have the honor and the pleasure on behalf of the Commission, my colleagues and our staff, of presenting you with the honorary gavel. Please feel free to use it at the dinner table, in your office, but please take it as a token of our appreciation for your years of service.

CHAIRMAN BRISÉ: Thank you.

COMMISSIONER EDGAR: Thank you.

(Applause.)

CHAIRMAN BRISÉ: Commissioner Graham.

COMMISSIONER GRAHAM: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

It's good that we're sitting here roasting you

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at the beginning of your last meeting.

COMMISSIONER GRAHAM: I thought I'd start off by going over the comments I said when I seconded the nomination two years ago. I said, "The best word to describe you up here is the rock. You are the stable guy, you are the support that we all lean against and push against to move ourself forward."

As you go down through my comments, it says,
"I believe that the agency is stable now, and I think
it's time to move forward to get us back in a position
that the staff and the Commission has been for years and
years and years. I think you are the person to open
those doors and to steer the ship where we need to be."

I think those words all came true. Now I understand that the Chairman that preceded you set the bar pretty high. But I'm glad to report back here that I thought you did a great job of moving us forward. And as Commissioner Edgar said earlier, that you do a phenomenal job of making it look easy. But you do have a very unselfish style of leading. I know for you it's all about moving the agency forward and not about moving you forward. So one of the things that we say — sometimes behind your back — when we're in the NARUC meetings, it's Team Florida, and you were the lead of

Team Florida.

Under your leadership we got ourself a person that's second vice president at SEARUC, we got ourself somebody that's first vice president in SEARUC. And one of the things I can tell you, because I was in the room when that happened, it was not a pretty process. But we are now, the State of Florida is going to have a president of SEARUC. And I'm glad that we all stood together and strong and made that happen, and I am glad that you were the leader to get us there, and I appreciate all you've done for us.

CHAIRMAN BRISÉ: Thank you.

Commissioner Balbis.

COMMISSIONER BALBIS: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

And I just wanted to make a few comments. I certainly

have --

CHAIRMAN BRISÉ: Uh-oh.

enjoyed your leadership as Chairman the past two years.

Looking back on these past two years definitely has -it's been challenging. We've gone through some major
issues and major cases, and a lot of times it's been an
unusual process. And I think your leadership and
ability to guide us through, successfully through those
decisions and through changes in this agency has been

greatly appreciated. And I know that, that you will continue to do a good job as a Commissioner, but I will miss your leadership as Chairman. And I appreciate, as Commissioner Graham said, your unselfishness, your candidness, and your ability to lead us. So thank you.

CHAIRMAN BRISÉ: Thank you.

COMMISSIONER BROWN: Chairman?

CHAIRMAN BRISÉ: Commissioner Brown, we won't forget you just in case you have something you wanted to say. I'm in an odd position here; right?

Commissioner Brown.

COMMISSIONER BROWN: Thank you so much. For my comments I want to thank you for allowing me the opportunity to participate telephonically today. I apologize to my colleagues and the parties for my physical absence today. I had emergency surgery late last week that prevents me today from being physically present, but I really wanted to participate in today's agenda and IA meeting. So thank you for bearing with me today.

And instead of roasting our dear Chairman, I prefer to toast Ronald Brisé. He has fine dedication and work as Chairman of our agency. I think his background as a legislator certainly served us well while he was Chair. He really enhanced our

communications with the state Legislature through regular newsletters, updates, and I think showed a big presence throughout the Tallahassee community.

If you all noticed, he also volunteered for participation in various local and state events, and he took the Chairmanship by storm right when he got there. So I've often described Ron as a man of diplomacy, and I believe that also describes him well in his role as Chairman. And while everyone said it well, we'll all miss you as Chair in that role, but I look forward to personally having you sitting next to me again. So congratulations.

CHAIRMAN BRISÉ: Thank you, Commissioner Brown.

I guess I have a few comments to make myself.

I put together some notes. My staff is not going to be happy because I'm probably not going to go off the notes, so now they're starting to be concerned.

But I want to first of all thank my wonderful staff, Baldwyn English and Pamela Paultre, for their support and their hard work. As it's been said, the office of the Chairmanship is not an easy task. It's juggling a lot of things a lot of the time, and my staff has done a fantastic job of doing that and keeping me where I need to be, thinking the way I should be

thinking and so forth. So I am thankful to both of you for, for your hard work.

(Applause.)

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I too pulled up the transcript or some notes from, from what I stated two years ago, and there's three things I think that we talked about when -- that I talked about when I accepted to be Chairman. One is that we would broaden and improve our ways of interacting with our stakeholders overall, but most importantly our consumers. And I want to thank the Office of Consumer Outreach and so forth for helping us organize a variety of events. I want to say that we've had 143 events in the last two years reaching out to the community, and every single Commissioner has played a vital role, whether it's speaking at universities, speaking at individual forums, and all sorts of things to make sure that people understood that we're an entity that is here not only to regulate rates and so forth, but we want you to understand how we operate and why we're here and how we can be of service to you outside of the ratemaking process.

We also talked about addressing the issues of efficiency within the agency. And so that's one of the things that Commissioner Graham, when he was Chair, was championing, and we decided to continue with, with that

Executive Director, ensuring that our organization was ready to deal with the challenges that were coming in the future, recognizing that as the world that we regulate becomes more efficient, then there becomes some pressures, some financial pressures. And, and so with that, we wanted to make sure that our staff was prepared to deal with that in the future. And so we wanted to make sure that everyone is cross-trained and so forth, so we went through a reorganization process. At first it was a little bumpy, but it seems that it's, it's sort of found its stride and we are working through that as we move forward.

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The other thing has to do with collaboration with, with those that, that we regulate and those who are stakeholders and state entities and so forth. And so we have partnered, and some of you are aware of the helping hands that we have identified on a monthly basis, and whether it's the Department of Children and Families, Elder Affairs, the Office of Public Counsel — and we can name up to 12, because that's the number that we did this last year, of partner agencies that have helped us get our message out, and we have helped them understand how we operate and what this agency can do to help the people who they serve in particular.

We have also worked to, to strengthen our relationship with the Legislature frankly. And so I'm thankful to Curt in his efforts in helping us do that, shore up our relationship, because we recognize that we are the implementing body of the Legislature. And having a strong relationship of, of them understanding what our role is and, and understanding our importance and understanding that sometimes our decisions are not going to be popular, but they are the right decisions. And so that, that has helped us in the last two years as we've moved along this process.

The other thing that I thought was important for us to look at is modernizing how we do things a little bit and moving further into the digital age. So I'm thankful to, to our Clerk staff for ensuring that we are well along in that process. Currently my staff strictly works off, off of their iPads, and all of our documents are primarily found on our iPads. And so hopefully we will be able to get there as an agency very soon, and these are things that I think will make us better as an agency. Obviously all those stakeholders, now you don't have to show up at the door and make sure that you're here at 5:00. By the end of the day you could go ahead and electronically file your documents and so forth, which makes the process a whole lot

easier.

But each one of my fellow Commissioners have played a vital role to me personally over the last two years. So as you recall, when we started this process and you all elected me, I gave -- we decided that we would come up with these little folders so that you can keep as, as a memento. And so I just thought of a phrase that would capture a little bit of what, of what you often say on the bench.

So with Commissioner Graham, so I figure it's probably "I love it when everybody sings *Kumbaya*."

Right? So, Commissioner Graham, here's a little memento that represents that.

Commissioner Brown, we know that you're always interested in, in officers -- or D&O insurance, so we have a little memento that recognizes that.

Commissioner Balbis, I know you always want to know about O&M expenses, so we have a memento that recognizes that as well.

And, Commissioner Edgar, we know you're always prepared to do the motion, so we have a memento that recognizes that you are always prepared to, to do the motion.

I have really enjoyed my time as, as, as Chair, and I thank you for the trust that you have in me

as you selected me as your Chair. This has been one of the two most rewarding years of my professional experience. I've had a great time working with our Executive Director. I feel like, you know, you are an extended member of my personal staff. And, Curt, I felt like you were an extended member of my, my personal staff as well. And I have grown to know both of you and I have gained a very, very solid appreciation and great appreciation for the work that you do.

But my colleagues, once again, we have gone through some, some interesting times over the last two years. You know, four major, major rate cases, and I think we have handled them admirably. And I know J.R. is out there and sometimes we, we are on opposite sides of things, but J.R. is an excellent partner for us here. And I thank J.R. for, for his service as well, as he represents the ratepayers of the State of Florida.

With that, that ends my comments. And I'm thankful to all of you for the opportunity to have served as your Chair.
