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2	CHAIRMAN BROWN: All right. Our last item is
3	a panel comprised of Commissioner Graham, Commissioner
1	Patronis, and myself. And we do have a few folks that
5	will be coming to the bench for this, I believe.
5	We're at Item 16.
7	MS. HELTON: Madam Chairman?

CHAIRMAN BROWN: Yes.

MS. HELTON: Ms. Brownless has just asked us to confirm that when you deferred Item 4, that what you were in effect doing was denying Duke's request -- denying the motion.

CHAIRMAN BROWN: You want me -- I believe -- I was not the motion maker, Commissioner Patronis was, but I believe that's what we did. Commissioner Patronis?

COMMISSIONER PATRONIS: Yes.

CHAIRMAN BROWN: He says yes.

MS. BROWNLESS: Thank you, ma'am.

CHAIRMAN BROWN: All right. We are on Item

16, and I believe Ms. Aktabowski is on the phone.

Ms. Aktabowski, are you there?

MS. AKTABOWSKI: I am.

CHAIRMAN BROWN: Thank you. If you could just put it on mute until we get to you. We are going to have staff introduce the item first, please.

MS. AKTABOWSKI: Thank you.

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CHAIRMAN BROWN: All right. And staff.

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MS. MAPP: Good afternoon, Commissioners.

Item 16 is staff's recommendation on two

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separate motions for reconsideration that were filed in

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Docket 150071-SU by KW Resort Utilities Corporation,

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KWRU, and Harbor Shores Condominium Unit Owners

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Association, Inc. This docket went to hearing on

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November 7th, 2016, in Key West, Florida, and this

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Commission entered its final order on March 13th, 2017.

The Office of Public Counsel and Monroe County

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filed a joint response in opposition to the KWRU's

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motion for reconsideration, and KWRU has filed a

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response in opposition to Harbor Shore's motion. All

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parties are present, with Harbor Shores participating

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telephonically, and staff is available for any

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questions.

CHAIRMAN BROWN: Thank you. Ms. Aktabowski

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had previously requested to address the Commission. And

there were no objections from any of the parties, so I

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said that would not be a problem. So Ms. Aktabowski is

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going to address the Commission. She has five minutes. The parties may respond to any of the comments that she

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raises after that in whatever order you'd like to go. I

imagine the County and OPC won't have any comments, so 1 we'll go directly -- if you don't, we'll go directly to 2 the utility. And with that, Ms. Aktabowski, hello. 3 MS. AKTABOWSKI: Hello. 4 CHAIRMAN BROWN: How is the weather down 5 there? 6 7 (Technical difficulties with sound system.) Didn't hear a word you said. 8 9 MS. AKTABOWSKI: Oh, no. Really? CHAIRMAN BROWN: I heard that. 10 MS. AKTABOWSKI: Okay. I said it's raining. 11 12 Can you hear me now? 13 CHAIRMAN BROWN: Oh, yes. Yes, I can hear you now. Good job. 14 15 MS. AKTABOWSKI: Okay. Good. CHAIRMAN BROWN: All right. You have five 16 17 minutes, if you'd like to address us. 18 MS. AKTABOWSKI: All right. Thank you. Thank you and good afternoon, Commissioners 19 20 and staff. On March 13th, as you've just heard, you 21 issued a final order regarding KWRU's application for an 22 increase in wastewater rates. In this order you created 23 a special rate for Harbor Shores. The staff analysis 24 agreed that Harbor Shores should be classified as a

(inaudible) service customer, and staff also created a

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new rate to be based on 69 times the residential base facility charge, BFC, of \$31.86 for a bulk BFC of \$2,198.34. That's \$5.28 per 1,000 gallons with a 690,000 gallon cap equal to a 10,000 gallon cap per unit.

Staff stated that this rate base should ultimately result in no overall change to Harbor Shore's bill. I will address the fallacy of that statement later.

In reaching this special rate for Harbor Shores, staff claims that Harbor Shores is a unique situation, unlike Sunset Marina, Meridian West, and Flagler Village, three similar communities on Stock Island, because the residents within Harbor Shores are individually metered by the FKAA.

Staff went on to say that, and I quote, if we were to allow billing based on the size of the two FKAA meters, the utility would not be adequately compensated for the demand Harbor Shores' residents are placing on the system, unquote.

On March 24th Harbor Shores filed a motion for reconsideration based on our belief that the PSC decision is arbitrary, capricious, and resulted in blatant discrimination in that Harbor Shores has been treated differently than Sunset Marina, Meridian West,

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and Flagler Village, who are general service customers paying general service rates based on master meters and general service gallonage rates. Staff has recommended that our motion for reconsideration be denied, but now the reason for denial, aside from the 69 ERCs we reserved ten years ago, is based on the ownership of the sub meters, which, and again I quote, quickly differentiates Harbor Shores from general service customers and allows the Commission to directly assess the ERCs of Harbor Shores' residents, unquote.

Pardon my ignorance, folks, but I have no idea what that statement means. Harbor Shores has sub meters and master meters. The other three communities have meters and master meters. How do the individual Harbor Shores sub meters put any additional demand on KWRU versus the individual sub meters in Sunset Marina, Meridian West, and Flagler Village? How is total demand for Harbor Shores on KWRU different than the total demand for Sunset Marina, Meridian West, and Flagler Village? Why does meter ownership make any difference in the demand placed on the KWRU system? If KWRU will not be adequately compensated for Harbor Shores' demand, then how is KWRU adequately compensated for the demand caused by Sunset Marina, Meridian West, and Flagler Village?

Harbor Shores reserved 69 ERCs for 69 units; Flagler Village reserved 49 ERCs for 49 units; Sunset Marina reserved 60 ERCs for 60 units; and Meridian West reserved 102 ERCs for 102 units; yet only Harbor Shores is being charged a bulk BFC based on their 69 reserved ERCs.

CHAIRMAN BROWN: You have one minute left,
Ms. Aktabowski, one minute left.

MS. AKTABOWSKI: All right. Okay. The others are being charged based on the master meters and general service gallonage rates. This is discriminatory and unfair.

KWRU argued that the billing determinant should be adjusted if Harbor Shores is classified as a general service customer. The difference in monthly charges for Harbor Shores is, on average, 12- to \$1,400 -- a big deal for us, but I imagine not a great (inaudible) for KWRU.

With regard to the issue of no overall change to Harbor Shores' bill, has the Commission considered the impact of the bulk rate based on 69 units if a hurricane destroyed several or many units? And if they are not permitted to rebuild, then will the remaining units be subject to the bulk rate, and will they then be paying more than regular residential customers,

nevermind general service customers? 1 2 CHAIRMAN BROWN: Thank you. Can you wrap it up, please? 3 MS. AKTABOWSKI: Yes. If you cannot agree 4 5 that we are general service with general service rates, then at least let the residents be treated as residents 6 7 by KWRU individually, and we will work with KWRU to smooth the transition. Thank you. 8 9 CHAIRMAN BROWN: Thank you. If you could please mute your phone so that we don't hear any of the 10 feedback. 11 MS. AKTABOWSKI: Okay. 12 13 CHAIRMAN BROWN: Thank you very much. 14 All right. Assuming that Public -- you have 15 no --MR. SAYLER: Erik Sayler with Public Counsel's 16 17 Office. We don't have any questions or response related 18 to our office. 19 CHAIRMAN BROWN: Thank you. MR. WRIGHT: Schef Wright representing Monroe 20 21 County. We have no questions or response to 22 Ms. Aktabowski's arguments, nor to -- I don't think 23 we're going to have any to KWRU's as long as they stay 24 on hers.

CHAIRMAN BROWN: Thank you.

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I bet Mr. Friedman does have some response.

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MR. FRIEDMAN: Thank you. I do. Marty Friedman on behalf of KW Resort Utility.

As we pointed out and as staff pointed out in the staff recommendation, there is a big difference between those two subdivisions, and that is -- or those three developments, and that is, as Ms. Aktabowski pointed out, Harbor Shores is the only one that has Keys Aqueduct Authority water meters. And so we have no control over the, the meters behind the, behind the Keys meters in these other developments. And I think that is a salient factor because, as you know, when this case -one of the things the Commission was trying to do was to get away from a very unique billing structure that existed at KW because of the uniqueness of the customer base to one that is based on a simple KW meter billing, which, which certainly simplifies the billing process and will make it easier to deal with in the future because the past rate structure was one that was very difficult to apply at all times. And, in fact, there's a docket open to deal, to deal with that.

And by going -- by billing off of KW -- by billing off the Keys Aqueduct Authority meters, we won't have that problem in the future. And as the, the staff pointed out, they went and did a calculation of the

demand and showed that the demand for those customers is going to be the same as the demand for any other single customer.

There's no evidence in the record that that is also true of these other developments that

Ms. Aktabowski is trying to say they are similar to.

There is nothing in the record that discusses the consumption of each of those residences so that we can make that evaluation as to whether the consumption patterns for those other developments is, in fact, the same as it is for Harbor Shores and every other single family residence. And as a result, I would -- I think it's appropriate to deny her motion for reconsideration. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN BROWN: Thank you.

All right. Commissioners, this is Issue 2.

We'll take that up first since we heard oral argument on that. Again, it's limited to Commissioner Patronis and Commissioner Graham and myself.

Commissioners -- or staff, before we get to Commissioners, staff, do you have any comments to add? No comments.

Commissioners, any questions or comments on Issue 2? If not --
