I have all LED bulbs and have replaced all light fixtures... I never thought electric costs would be so out of control for FPL users.

I am from Maryland and we have a choice of 4-5 different utility companies to chose from which has lowered costs for all in MD...my tenant I in my house in MD has a monthly electric bill averaging \$270.00 for a family of 4 and they use all of their appliances.

Somehow Florids PSC and FLPL needs to be more mindful of residents...I know FPL has received huge profits each year and should have been funding reserves for these massive data centers which residents should not be bearing the cost.
