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PROCEEDINGS

(Hearing reconvened at 6:03 p.m.)

CHAIRMAN CLARK: Ladies and gentlemen. We are ready to call the hearing to order. I have six o'clock, so we'll go ahead and get started.

My name is Susan Clark. I'm Chairman of the Public Service Commission. And with me today are two other commissioners with the Commission. Commissioner Julia Johnson -- many of you may know her; she's from the Clermont area. On my right is Commissioner Diane Kiesling; she's from Monticello, Florida.

We have read the notice for this proceeding, Mr. Pierson, so we don't need to read the notice again.

MR. PIERSON: That's correct. Or I could if you would like.

CHAIRMAN CLARK: I think we could dispense with reading the notice again.

What I would like to do is have the attorneys who are representing the parties here today again make an appearance so you will know who the gentlemen are that are sitting here at the table.

Mr. Wagner, we will start with you.

MR. WAGNER: Richard A. Wagner, on behalf of the people supporting the EAS petition, 304 East Colonial Drive, Orlando. commissioner Kiesling: Why don't you wave your hand or something, because, to these people back here, all they see is the back of your heads.

COMMISSIONER CLARK: Mr. Wahlen.

MR. WAHLEN: I'm Jeff Wahlen. I'm with the Ausley Law Firm in Tallahassee. It's P.O. Box 391. And I represent United Telephone Company of Florida.

CHAIRMAN CLARK: Mr. Carver.

MR. CARVER: Phillip Carver, representing

BellSouth, 150 West Flagler Street, Suite 1910, Miami,

Florida.

MR. PIERSON: I'm Robert Pierson. I represent the Staff of the Commission, 2540 Shumard Oak Boulevard, Tallahassee, Florida.

chairman clark: We have also with us this evening some other staff members here who are here to assist us in conducting this proceeding, but they can also answer any questions you may have about this proceeding and about what the Public Service Commission does.

The first person I'd like to introduce is

Ann Shelfer. She's sitting here with Mr. Bob Pierson.

She handles all our EAS proceedings. As I said this

morning, she's probably the one person that can tell

you -- if you give her your exchange, she can tell you

where you can call and for what price. She knows everything about these extended area plans.

In the back of the room is Melinda Pace.

She's from our Consumer Affairs Division. She helps us conduct these proceedings and stays in touch with the public for us.

Seated next to her in the back is Sandy
Simmons. She's with our clerk's office, and she helps
us set up. She gets the location for those proceedings,
and she helps us set up the room.

Have I forgotten any other staff?

I should introduce our court reporter, Katy Trofimov. I should tell you that she does not normally transcribe proceedings before the Commission, so when you do come to give your testimony, if you could speak slowly and clearly, we would appreciate it.

But we're here this evening to hear from you about whether or not we should consider implementing an Extended Area Service between Groveland and Orlando. We're also considering including Windermere and Winter Garden in that service because they are exchanges that are between Groveland and Orlando. We will be looking at an Extended Area Service or an alternative toll relief plan, and more about that is -- more information about that is provided in this blue sheet

that you can pick up at the back of the room.

We had a public hearing this morning, and then we had our technical hearing after lunch, and we're back again now to listen to those members of the public who could not participate in the hearing this morning.

We will be taking your testimony. We will swear you in so that your testimony can become part of the record that we can rely on in making our decision.

One other thing I should tell you. If you do not wish to provide testimony today or if you think of something that comes up after we leave here, at the back of this document there is a sheet of paper that has our address on it, and it has lines on the back so you can make your comments and send them to the Commission or you can leave them with Ms. Pace in the back of the room.

If you want to testify, I'd like to ask you to sign up in the back of the room. We will take testimony in the order you have signed up. If you want to adopt the testimony of someone who has come before you, by all means you can do that.

I should also indicate to you that once you have finished providing your testimony, if you will just wait a minute, we'll see if any of the lawyers representing the parties in this case have questions

they'd like to ask you.

At this point I'd like to ask everyone who has signed up and wants to provide testimony in this proceeding to stand and raise your right hand.

CHAIRMAN CLARK: Is this everyone who signed up and wants to provide testimony? All right.

(The witnesses were duly sworn.)

CHAIRMAN CLARK: Thank you. You can be seated. And the first person I have on my list is Fran Losey. Did I get that correct?

WITNESS LOSEY: That's right. Very few people do.

CHAIRMAN CLARK: You put the accent on it, so that helped. Thank you.

WITNESS LOSEY: My name is Fran Losey. I live at 305 Beach Street in Groveland. And I had an opportunity to be here for a short time this morning, and I knew I would be back this evening with my hustand.

I thought I would let you know my alternative way of calling Orlando. After Clermont got the extended service, I started going to my daughter's house and making my long distance calls over there, or I would go to a pay phone and pay a quarter for it so I didn't have to do it on my own phone because the long distance is so expensive.

CHAIRMAN CLARK: Thank you.

Are there any questions?

Thank you very much.

Dennis Losey.

WITNESS LOSEY: My name is Dennis Losey. I live at 305 Beach Street in Groveland, and I'm here to testify more on behalf of the inconvenience caused to my company than to my own personal.

I'm the chief financial officer of Classic

Fishing Products in Clermont. Although my manufacturing

plant is in Lake County, we are in the East-West

Industrial Park close to the Orange County line, and our

phone exchange is a 643 exchange.

We employ about eighty people, and probably about half of them live in Lake County and the other half in Orange County. Right now, although our employment level fluctuates, we have fifteen people in the 429 exchange. Sometimes that number will go as high as twenty-five.

In order to accommodate our employees, we have installed a Clermont exchange on our switchboard, and that's an extra cost to our company, and it's been a financial burden to my company in order to go to that extra expense. And certainly it's an alternative method of phone calls trailing from Groveland to the 643

exchange area.

At the time the petition was circulated by Carroll Fulmer, every one of the people at our plant who lived in the 429 area signed that petition.

Let me make eure I covered everything I wanted. Yeah, that's pretty well it.

CHAIRMAN CLARK: Okay. Thank you.

Any questions?

Thank you very much.

Mrs. Faye Hall.

WITNESS HALL: My name is Faye Hall. And my address is 7440 Redwing Road, Groveland. Am I supposed to give my telephone number?

CHAIRMAN CLARK: You don't have to.

WITNESS HALL: Okay. It's a 429 number, of course.

My son, who was in back of me, lives in Ocose, with his wife. Another relative of mine lives in Ocose, and he's disabled and has a lot of medical problems, and I help him and he helps me.

I'm disabled, of course. My doctors -everybody's doctors seem to be in the Orlando area. My
mother, who is sitting in the second row, with the hat,
the blue hat -- she's 84, and I take care of her. And
her doctor is in Winter Garden.

It just seems like everything we do -- my other daughter -- I have five children. My daughter's husband works in Ocose, and when my father got sick, in August of last year -- this year -- August, anyhow -- I had to call all the different relatives and the loved ones, and it was very difficult. My telephone bill ran almost \$200, and it was very difficult for me to, you know, pay this off. And I hate to ask the kids to help out all the time.

So it would be very, very helpful if we could get some things where I could just call them.

Especially in an emergency, it's very hard for me to, you know, get ahold of that bill when it comes in after such an emergency like that.

CHAIRMAN CLARK: Thank you.

Any questions?

Thank you, Ms. Hall.

Dennis Cunningham.

WITNESS CUNNINGHAM: Yes. My name is Dennis Cunningham, and I live at 8600 Florida Boys Ranch Road in Clermont, which is another thing I'd like to address. You have a Clermont address with a Groveland exchange.

Now, this is -- you know, I've gone along with this for seven years, but that's another story.

Also I was reading in here where you did your

feedback on the tolls and the calls, and it has that you had to have 50 percent subscribers in a petitioning area making two or more calls per month. If they probably didn't have to pay the rate that they have to Orlando, a lot of people on fixed incomes -- I'm sure you would see a vast change in that stat right there.

Also, if you want to check on my number, you can check on it anytime, and I use it extensively, and it is expensive, and I get tired of doing the, ding, "I've got to go because it's costing me bucks."

And if we're deregulating the system, we're trying to be more to the consumer, I think this is an opportunity to really show what you want to do.

That's it.

CHAIRMAN CLARK: Thank you, Mr. Cunningham.

Are there any questions?

Gail Savage.

WITNESS SAVAGE: My name is Gail Savage. I live at 35 Elizabeth Avenue in Mascotte. It is also a 429 exchange.

I have both a business -- well, actually several businesses, small businesses, and my personal residence here in the area on the 429 exchange. The cost -- in my businesses, I normally am working with suppliers, clients, regulatory agencies, and crafts

people who live in and around the Orlando/Winter Garden/ Ocoee area.

The cost was so exort cat hat I finally had to spend several hours -- and, you know, in a one- and two-person business, hours are very, very critical -- making arrangements with a long distance carrier. So I do not know if, in the process of doing your polling, you checked those long distance carrier calls. You know, there is the ability to dial several numbers beforehand and get your calling under that plan.

I do know that in the course of my business, I have faxed various things, such as suppliers' lists, to clients, and et cetera, in places like California and Alaska. I have taken that same fax and sent it to suppliers in Winter Garden. The faxes have cost me -- the identical fax cost me 18 cents to Paradise, California, and Anchorage, Alaska; it cost me 47 cents to Winter Garden -- which is absolutely ludicrous.

In addition to that, in this area, getting -- as I said, it's very onerous for small businesses. In fact, at one point my business lines got slammed, and it took me hours and hours to get it straightened out.

As a resident in the area, I am a very active resident, as some people probably are aware, and one of the things that we need more than anything else is an

employer base. Now, we have various small employers, various small businesses, and et cetera, but we also, because of the nature of this area, have several extended families where one person is the caregiver both for young children and for elderly adults.

As such, and I know several of them, they cannot afford to commute the hour it takes to get to and the hour it takes to get back, and the long distance charges, and et cetera. They can't afford to be away from the people for whom they give care for that additional length of time. So they remain in the area either unemployed or underemployed.

Now, large businesses do not get to be large businesses by ignoring the small things, such as 25-cent calls or 47-cent calls. And in order to get more businesses, I firmly believe that we need this free long distance calling.

That's all that I have.

CHAIRMAN CLARK: Thank you.

Ms. Savage, let me just make sure that it's clear to you -- and it probably is. From reading that report, you know that to get EAS would likely involve an increase in rates of some amount. Do you still think it's something that needs to be done, even given that potential increase?

withess savage: Yes, ma'am. I have three business lines, which will take the onus of the increase, from what I understand, and I have two personal lines. I'm actually thinking about getting yet another line, and I have an 800 number.

So, yes, ma'am, I'm well aware of the cost to me, and I believe that that cost will be more than compensated for on the free long distance.

CHAIRMAN CLARK: Great. Thank you,

10 Ms. Savage.

Are there any questions?

Thank you.

Jim Alligood.

WITNESS ALLIGOOD: My name is Jim Alligood, and I live at 17307 State Road 19, Groveland. I also own a business in town, a hardware store.

And my point is that we need this. Everything seems to be centralized and hubbed around the Orlando area. Some of my suppliers are there, which I call frequently for stuff.

The other thing is that by implementing this now, usually -- and everyone will attest, that if we let it pass now, in order to get the wheels of government to ever turn again in that way will probably put us far behind, like most every other thing that's after we've

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CHAIRMAN CLARK: Great. Thank you,
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The other thing is that by implementing this now, usually -- and everyone will attest, that if we let it pass now, in order to get the wheels of government to ever turn again in that way will probably put us far behind, like most every other thing that's after we've

been passed by. To get it reimplemented, when we need it, will become harder and harder for us.

The area is growing. We need to look at that and provide this where we can entice other businesses to come this way and help set up a tax base so that we can grow and provide some of the services that we are lacking now.

I know in my business that the exorbitant cost of a phone bill, which -- businesses are assessed a lot higher rate than residents, yet residential phones probably contribute to 75 percent of the calls when people call family around the country. And to increase that share would help us all. I know that for fixed-income people it will be a burden if it's imposed on their bills, but in the long run, with the escalation of phone prices, I'm sure it will balance. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN CLARK: Thank you.

Any questions?

Thank you, Mr. Alligood.

Richard Hufnagel.

WITNESS HUFNAGEL: Good evening. My name is Dick Hufnagel. I live at 9025 Pine Island Road, Clermont. We've been assigned three Groveland exchange numbers.

My wife works at Disney, necessitating in

numerous long distance calls monthly. And my mom receives some of her medical attention in Orlando, resulting in more long distance calls, and it would help us to have RAS to Orlando.

CHAIRMAN CLARK: Anything else?

6 Any questions?

Thank you, Mr. Hufnagel.

Esther Kurfiss.

WITNESS KURFISS: I'm Esther Kurfiss, and I'm representing Kurfiss Funeral Home as well as our own private residence, but I am concerned about the funeral home.

We would appreciate the use of toll-free service into Orlando for as much as we call the area for hospitals and nursing homes to get permission to remove the remains, or doctors' offices to sign certificates, calling or faxing obituaries and funeral notices, airline departures for people as well as for the remains to someplace else.

All facets of this are to be able to assist the families that we serve, and the moneys would make a difference because all of these are cash advances to the families.

And for our home, my husband has all of his doctors in Orlando, or such, and we need to speak

without having to worry about being put on hold for twenty minutes until you get to speak to the person that's involved.

Is there any questions?

CHAIRMAN CLARK: Are there any questions? No.

Thank you, Ms. Kurfiss.

WITNESS KURFISS: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN CLARK: Russell Moore.

WITNESS MOORE: I'm Russ Moore. I live at 121 East Cherry Street, just across the street there, and I'd like to talk from a personal standpoint, and also I work on the church staff at First Baptist.

people that go from time to time to the hospital. And whenever they're in Orlando, it costs the church quite a bit to be able to contact and keep in touch with those folks, and this toll-free extension would help us peable to do that.

Also, whenever I take the youth out and I need to take them to Orlando on an outing or something like this and I have to call several places to get the best price, each time I call, it costs the church and sometimes, as Ms. Kurfiss said, you get the dreaded "hold," and then you're waiting and waiting, and it's just burning money. Sometimes you have to hang up and

call back. And we do need to take care of those things.

And from a personal standpoint, my wife spent much of December in the hospital, and it was difficult to keep in touch with her, while I had to be home here, and knowing that the bills were rising with the phone calls and different things like this.

And I believe we can do this, and I believe we can -- we need to. I believe each of us at one time or another have had to call Orlando, and we look at a phone bill, and we go, you know, two dollars for a couple-minute call or a few-minute minute call -- that hurts. So we need to take care of this, like I say, while we can.

CHAIRMAN CLARK: Thank, Mr. Moore.

Questions?

Thank you.

Bennett Harrell.

WITNESS HARRELL: Good evening. My name is
Bennett Harrell, and I've lived in the area since '85.
I work over at Disney, and I was slightly disappointed
when I found out that the Reedy Creek exchanges wasn't
included, but my wife -- unless I have missed a fer of
them -- is disabled. She has seven doctors. I have
two, myself. We have a dentist and an orthodontist, and
they're all in Orlando. My wife is disabled, and she

has to have quite a bit of medication. Our drugstore is over there too.

And it would relieve some of the burden on us, as well as -- as most of these other people have said, because my long distance bill is seldom under a hundred dollars a month, and a large majority of that -- not all of it, but a good portion of it is made to the Orlando area, and it would be a great help. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN CLARK: Thank you, Mr. Harrell.

Any questions?

Thank you very much.

Brett Hamilton.

WITNESS HAMILTON: Good evening. I came over because I'm for the extended service. I live here at 208 North Main Avenue.

COMMISSIONER KIESLING: Would you state your name.

WITNESS HAMILTON: My name is Brett Hamilton.

I live at 208 North Main Avenue here in Groveland. And
I have several telephone lines coming into my house.

I'm a sales agent for SunTel Communications and a
manufacturer's representative for Sampson Fire Sales.

And those two businesses alone, I receive a lot of
telephone -- a lot of business out of the Orlando area.

On my 800 line from the Orlando area every

month, either to or from, is averaging over a hundred dollars a month. And then on my personal line, just calling family and friends in the Orlando area, plus, since I work for Orange County, I have to use all their services down there, their HMO doctors, dentists, and it gets to be quite substantial, so I'm just here supporting the Extended Area Service. Whether it be the 25 cents a call or whatever, it would greatly help me.

CHAIRMAN CLARK: Thank you, Mr. Hamilton. Let me just check. You were sworn in, weren't you?

WITNESS HAMILTON: Yes, I was.

CHAIRMAN CLARK: Good.

Steve Ferrell.

WITNESS FERRELL: Good evening. My name is Steve Ferrell. I live at 9020 Pine Island Road, with a Clermont address, like Mr. Cunningham. Very interesting.

I work in Orlando, as does my wife. And she's a nurse; I'm an engineer. Her schedule varies to the point where there are a lot of days where one of us is working, one of us isn't. She works every other weekend. And just to speak with each other, when the other one is working, is a long distance call, obviously, so that adds up.

Because we both work in Orlando, the majority

of our friends also live in Orlando, and the calls that we make to them, all being long distance, adds up tremendously. And it's to the point where we have to decide -- we can't call our friends because it costs so much money, and they don't call us either, so it's a 5 real isolating factor. 6 And I think just the turnout of all these people and with so few chairs, apparently there wasn't 8 the feeling that we'd have this kind of a turnout, and I think it really shows that there's support for this. 10 And it would be great if you-all could take care of what 11 obviously seems to be the sentiment here. 12 That's all I had. 13 CHAIRMAN CLARK: Thank you, Mr. Ferrell. 14 Are there any questions of Mr. Ferrell? 15 COMMISSIONER JOHNSON: Where is Pine Island 16 Road? 17 WITNESS FERRELL: It's about halfway between 18 here and Clermont and about four miles south. COMMISSIONER JOHNSON: Going down --20 It's 565B. 21 WITNESS FERRELL: COMMISSIONER JOHNSON: Okay. And that's in the Groveland exchange. 23 WITNESS FERRELL: COMMISSIONER JOHNSON: The industrial park is

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on the other side of --WITNESS FERRELL: Right. I don't -- the line 2 lis somehow jagged, but everybody on our street -- it's about halfway. We're probably half a mile or so from 5 the cutoff line. 6 COMMISSIONER JOHNSON: Okay. Thank you. 7 CHAIRMAN CLARK: Ladies and gentlemen, that concludes the people I signed up on this -- oh, I'm 8 sorry. Excuse me. I have three more. 9 Andrea McKinney. Ms. McKinney, have you been 10 sworn in? 11 WITNESS McKINNEY: No, I have not. 12 CHAIRMAN CLARK: Okay. Also, Ellie Wolfe and 13 14 Karen Woods, have you been sworn in? 15 All right. Why don't you stand up right now, 16 and I'll take care of that. 17 (The witnesses were duly sworn.) CHAIRMAN CLARK: Thank you. You can be 18 seated. 19 Give us your name again. 20 21 WITNESS McKINNEY: Andrea McKinney, 19051 22 State Road 19. 23 I have a couple comments. I own a small business -- me, very small. I do computer graphic 24 design, had a business for about four years. I lived 25

over by Sugarloaf, which is on the other side, and then within a year we moved to a large property over off -- where I just said, over on Lake Indian House.

And I wish I could say my bills were as some of these other people. I do a lot of faxing. I have three lines -- home, business, fax, 800 -- and I'm averaging three-fifty, four hundred. That's not including my local, which is separate.

I have one of the lowest carriers that you can find out there, and I'm still running that. It's killing me.

On the personal end, that's -- the personal end, I've just quit calling my husband. I don't beep him anymore. He works over by Disney. My mother and father-in-law have moved onto our property for care, and the same thing goes. Their doctors, the majority of them, are out of Orlando.

And I know it's the same thing you're hearing over and over. I keep hearing -- I'm standing back here, and I keep hearing "small business," but I think for the regular consumer and for the businessperson -- it's as much as my mortgage. It's about to kill me.

And I've quit faxing. I've quit doing my advertising. I've even laid off some of the people that I used to frequent because it's just been too difficult.

And I heard someone mention when you're put on hold. That is like, "God forbid, please don't," because it's -- you hang up, and you hope you can get lucky later and they won't put you on hold.

So I just really did want to speak. I think -- as they're saying, we are just such an offshoot from Orlando. We are like a suburb off Orlando. We're far, but everything is, you know, all together here, and I just think that everybody really needs this.

And I appreciate your time.

CHAIRMAN CLARK: Thank you, Ms. McKinney.

Any questions?

COMMISSIONER JOHNSON: Ms. McKinney, I have a question for you. How long have you stated that you've lived in the Groveland area?

WITNESS McKINNEY: We're going on about a year and three months.

COMMISSIONER JOHNSON: Sugarloaf was -- is that Clermont?

WITNESS McKINNEY: Sugarloaf is on the other side of 27, up around 561A. Basically we only moved, like, three miles, but the dividing line must be 27 in some form, because we're about a mile west of Carroll Fulmer now. And when we were over at the other property in Sugarloaf, you could call all of those areas. I

don't know where the dividing line is.

COMMISSIONER JOHNSON: And your parents -- are they from the Groveland area also?

WITNESS McKINNEY: My husband's parents. Not originally, no. He had strokes and then moved onto our property. They're from Winter Park, actually.

COMMISSIONER JOHNSON: I see. Perhaps we'll have some other Groveland witnesses, but -- there were a few witnesses this morning that testified during the customer testimony portion of our hearing, and they had suggested that perhaps for some of the elderly or senior citizens, that they might not want a flat rate with the additive, they wouldn't want their local bill to go up.

WITNESS McKINNEY: She uses my phone.

COMMISSIONER JOHNSON: She lives with you?

Just live right next door. She comes over and uses -- because I've got good rates.

COMMISSIONER JOHNSON: I see.

WITNESS McKINNEY: My bill is high. She uses my phone. But, I tell you, I know what -- some people have checked into it. I know what this lady was talking about, but I know we checked into it, and we just came short of doing it. I know that you can buy a number that basically rings Orlando, and then it's really the

number -- then it transfers. It's a call forwarding. You buy an Orlando number, and it forwards it out to here. It's not convenient, and it is expensive, but we're having to look for that kind of stuff because we're desperate looking for ways out of this.

COMMISSIONER JOHNSON: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN CLARK: Thank you, Ms. McKinney.

Ellie Wolfe.

WITNESS WOLFE: My name is Ellie Wolfe, and I live in Mascotte. I'm in the 429 exchange. I am here to register my support, and I'm asking your support to please assist us in this telephone situation.

My doctor, my dentist, my husband's doctor, his dentist, you name it, are all in Orlando. I have a niece in Orlando. And what I have to do is call my sister in New Jersey and tell her to tell my niece hello, because it's more expensive for me to call Orlando than to talk to New Jersey or Washington, D.C.

I believe -- I believe that I'm not the only one in this situation. I still believe that in the long run, it will help all of us. We should not be isolated. Like, I'm a woman; I like to talk to my friends. I am sure everybody has a woman friend. And it's very difficult for me to call my sister, "Oh, tell so-and-so she can call me because I don't have money this month."

And that's in Orlando. I'm talking to New Jersey and Washington D.C., or I'm talking to California.

Women like to talk on the phone to your friends, especially when your husband is not at home.

Let's be practical. That's all my concern. My telephone bill is a lot because I talk to my friends. I like to keep in touch with them.

CHAIRMAN CLARK: Thank you, Ms. Wolfe.

WITNESS WOLFE: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN CLARK: Any questions?

Thank you very much.

R

CHAIRMAN CLARK: Karen Woods.

WITNESS WOODS: Good evening. My name is

Karen Woods, and I live in Mascotte, at Lake Jackson

Estates, with a 429 exchange.

I moved out here four years ago. I am employed in Sanford. Therefore, I have an HMO program. I am not the only one in this predicament. Over one-half of the subdivision is employed in Orlando or beyond and has medical facilities in Orlando or beyond.

And you're having more and more developments being developed, more and more families moving out from the Orlando area into Groveland, Mascotte, Clermont that need to have communication, not only with their employers, but they need communication with their

doctors, especially if they have families.

That is causing a big problem with the telephone bills. And most of -- the majority of your families moving out here that are building up your -- not only your businesses, the consumer, but they just need to know that they've got a way to communicate where they need to call either their business or their physicians or wherever in the Orlando exchange.

I'm one of them, I know. I have an HMO program, and I am employed in Sanford. But even though my physician is a Clermont-located physician, when you have to go to a specialist, it's in Orlando or beyond. You need to have communication with the specialists. It costs you money every time you call a specialist to communicate with them.

We do need your support in getting this through.

CHAIRMAN CLARK: Thank you, Ms. Woods.

WITNESS WOODS: Thank you.

20 CHAIRMAN CLARK: Are there any questions of

Ms. Woods?

COMMISSIONER JOHNSON: Ms. Woods, a couple questions for you.

WITNESS WOODS: Sure.

COMMISSIONER JOHNSON: Are there many doctors

1	in the Mascotte area?			
2	WITNESS WOODS: Not in the Mascotte. They're			
3	in Clermont.			
4	COMMISSIONER JOHNSON: So it would be			
5	Clermont.			
6	WITNESS WOODS: Yes. You have to go to			
7	Clermont to have a physician or you've got the medical			
8	center in Groveland.			
9	COMMISSIONER JOHNSON: But your testimony is			
10	that still most of the doctors are in Orlando that			
11	people use?			
12	WITNESS WOODS: That you are being referred			
13	to, correct, because when you have an HMO program, or			
14	any insurance, okay, you're only limited out here to			
15	specialists.			
16	COMMISSIONER JOHNSON: I see.			
17	WITNESS WOODS: And most of your specialists			
18	on these HMO programs are Orlando-faciliated. That's			
19	where you have to go. You don't have a choice.			
20	COMMISSIONER JOHNSON: Okay. Thank you.			
21	WITNESS WOODS: Thank you.			
22	CHAIRMAN CLARK: Thank you.			
23	Sandra White. Ms. White, were you sworn in?			
24	WITNESS WHITE: I was not.			
25	(The witness was duly sworn.)			

CHAIRMAN CLARK: Thank you.

R

WITNESS WHITE: My name is Sandra White, and I live at 8920 Pine Island Road in Clermont. I've lived there for nine years, and when we moved out there, we were misinformed that we were in the Clermont calling district. We were not aware that we were in the Groveland calling district.

We have a business in Orlando, and that may have been a deciding factor whether we bought the land that we purchased or not, because we knew we would have a lot of calls going back and forth to the office.

We are in the medical business. We're open 24 hours a day, seven days a week; we never close. It's been a problem because the employees have to call long distance to reach me if they have any problems, and so there's been a lot of resistance there, are a lot of problems internally in the business because they didn't want to call long distance. So I had to get an 800 number piggybacked onto my telephone at home so my employees could feel free to call me when they needed to.

In addition, I've piggybacked an 800 number on my business phone in Orlando just so -- specifically, for me to call into the office because we do have to call back and forth frequently.

In addition, my son -- I am divorced, and my son's father lives in Winter Garden. They're very close, and he likes to call his dad on a daily basis.

And I don't like to be put in a position where I have to worry about the number of phone calls my son is making to his father, and I don't like to restrict the phone calls that he makes to his father.

I, too, am on a program in our business. It's an HMO program where our physicians are also majorly in the Orlando area, and a lot of the business I do is in Orlando. My friends all live in Orlando. And I frequently -- I, too, like Mrs. Wolfe, like to talk to my friends. Being a single parent and working a lot, that's my only outlet, and I frequently have ten-dollar phone bills in one phone call.

So if this gets approved, it would literally save me, personally, hundreds of dollars a month.

Thank you.

CHAIRMAN CLARK: Thank you, Ms. White.

Any questions?

Thank you very much.

Ladies and gentlemen, that concludes the people that I have signed up. Is there anyone else who would like to provide testimony at this time?

Yes, sir. Why don't you come forward? I'll

swear you in, and then you can give us your name and then tell us where you reside.

(The witness was duly sworn.)

CHAIRMAN CLARK: Thank you.

R

WITNESS HARRIS: My name is Eugene Harris, and I live on 12998 Harrison Lane. Me and my wife, both, is disabled. We've both got daughters in Orlando.

I have heart trouble. She has cancer. And just last week I got on the phone to my doctor. I got a transfer, so I had to get another doctor. They put me on hold, and I was on there 45 minutes. And this is costing me money and all. And, like I say, both of our daughters are in Orlando. We have to call them quite often. And it's a great expense to us.

As a matter of fact, my brother-in-law is in the hospital now, and we had to call him -- call our sister two or three times in Orlando, so our bill is quite a bit just this last past two weeks. So it would be a lot of help if we could get this toll-free number out to Orlando. I'm on a fixed income. I know my bill it's going to be higher, but it won't be what it is with me calling long distance.

CHAIRMAN CLARK: Okay. Thank you very much, Mr. Harris.

Is there anyone else who would like to provide

testimony at this time? Yes, sir. 1 (The witness was duly sworn.) 2 CHAIRMAN CLARK: Thank you. 3 WITNESS AVERITT: My name is Ken Averitt, and I live here in Groveland on Beach Street. 5 COMMISSIONER KIESLING: Could you spell your 6 last name for me, please? 7 WITNESS AVERITT: A-v, like in Victor, 8 9 e-r-i-t-t. I have to call my customers the night 10 Okav. before to set up appointments. I have customers who 11 live on the south side of Highway 50, out around the 12 industrial park. I have to pay a long distance phone 13 call to call them. 14 However, on the north side of 50 I can call my 15 customers all the way out to Mount Verde, and it doesn't 16 cost anything. 17 It's an inconvenience to me. It's an 18 19 inconvenience to everybody I know that lives over here. And, fortunately, my HMO has an 800 number, but nobody 20 they refer me to has one, so I wind up in the same boat 21 everybody else does. 22 And speaking as a city councilman for the City 23 of Groveland, I think that it would help our city grow, 24 so I would appreciate it if you could get this done for 25

us.

CHAIRMAN CLARK: hank ou very much.

Any questions?

Mr. Wagner, is it your desire to have all those people who are in favor of this plan raise their hand and then all those who are not in favor of the plan raise their hand so we can get an idea of what the sentiment is of the people here?

MR. WAGNER: Yes, ma'am. Please.

CHAIRMAN CLARK: Okay. Would all those people who are in favor of implementing an EAS plan or a toll plan, please raise your hand -- and only one hand, please.

Thank you very much.

Now, let me ask for those people who are a opposed to the plan, because there are people who feel it is not to their benefit to have this plan implemented.

Thank you. We did have people this morning who also provided testimony that it is not a plan they need and they're not anxious to see their phone bills rise for a service they don't feel they need.

At this point we have no further public testimony. We have concluded our technical portion of the hearing. What happens now is, we go back to

Tallahassee, and our staff reviews the evidence in this proceeding. And they make a recommendation to us, and we take it up at a hearing or a public meeting in Tallahassee. It is open to the public, but it is not a meeting at which the public can provide further testimony.

Ms. Shelfer, do you have any schedule of when this is going to be on the agenda so we can give them some idea of when we may decida this itam?

MR. PIERSON: It's currently scheduled for July 16th.

CHAIRMAN CLARK: Okay. What that means is, on July 16th, we'll have an agenda conference. We will take a vote on the staff's recommendation as to whether or not to offer to implement some sort of EAS program or toll-relief program.

If we decide to do that, we do ballot customers; that is, the phone company sends out a ballot to every subscriber that will be affected, asking them if it's going to cost X amount of dollars, are you still in favor of this. So you will -- if we determine there is sufficient community interest that some sort of toll relief has to be provided, you will be getting a ballot.

And then after we review those ballots, then we meet again to review the outcome, and a decision is

made about whether or not to implement a toll-relief plan.

Mr. Wagner, did you have something else you wanted to add?

MR. WAGNER: Yes, ma'am, one point. I don't want to belabor this point, but in the earlier portion of the technical program, there was question about a sales representative for U.S. Sprint that was known as "Skip Baker." If you will recall, the representative from United could not provide any information, did not have any information.

I have a business card and some other phone records concerning those calls. The gentleman's name was R. L. Skip Baker, and his title was Major Account Representative with U.S. Sprint. And I don't believe there's any objection, unless the Commission has any objection to making this a part of the record, just to clarify it.

CHAIRMAN CLARK: We'll make that Composite

Exhibit 9, and it is the document evidencing the contact

from a U.S. Sprint/Centel representative regarding

service to Carroll Fulmer, the business.

MR. WAGNER: Yes, ma'am.

CHAIRMAN CLARK: That will be entered in the record without objection. My staff will make sure that

you get a copy of that exhibit, as well as Mr. Wahlen and Mr. Carver. I appreciate your courtesy. MR. WAGNER: CHAIRMAN CLARK: Thank you. With that, ladies and gentlemen, we have concluded these proceedings here. I want to express to you my appreciation for you taking your evening to come out here and let us know your thoughts about Extended Area Service between Groveland and Orlando. And I want to say it's been a nice day spent here, it's been lovely weather, and I appreciate again your coming out. Thank you very much. (Hearing concluded at 6:52 p.m.)
