

3	COMMISSIONER RIESLING: We'll call the
4	hearing to order. Counsel, would you please read the
5	notice.
6	MS. BARONE: Pursuant to notice, this time
7	and place have been set for a prehearing conference i
8	Docket 961150.
9	COMMISSIONER KIESLING: And I'll take
10	appearances.
11	MS. WHITE: Phil Carver and Nancy White on
12	behalf of BellSouth Communications. I'm sorry.
13	COMMISSIONER RIESLING: I was just going to
14	work my way down the table.
15	MR. HERRON: Mark Herron on behalf of
16	BellSouth Advertising & Publishing Corporation.
17	MR. FINCHER: Benjamin Fincher on behalf of
18	Sprint Communications Company, Limited Partnership.
19	MR. BOYD: Everett Boyd, also on behalf of
20	Sprint Communications Company, Limited Partnership.
21	MS. BARONE: Monica M. Barone and Charlie

COMMISSIONER KIESLING: All right. Are

MS. BARONE: Yes, ma'am. The first thing we recommend that you take up is BellSouth Advertising & Publishing Corporation's request to make special appearance and to intervene in this proceeding.

COMMISSIONER KIESLING: All right.

MS. BARONE: And, Commissioner, it's my understanding that all directory issues have been withdrawn, for your information; therefore, the issue really is moot.

COMMISSIONER KIESLING: All right,
Mr. Herron. What is it that you think is still at
issue?

MR. HERRON: Madam Hearing Officer, I think
I agree with your counsel from the Commission that
Mr. Boyd, I think, has to make a statement that
matters have been withdrawn, and my motion would be
mooted at that point.

MR. BOYD: Commissioner, we have clarified this with Mr. Herron and his client that based upon the issues that are still alive and will be confirmed this morning in the conference, that based on those issues, Mr. Herron will stipulate on the record that BAPCO's pleadings will be withdrawn.

COMMISSIONER KIESLING: Well, as long as the

issues are withdrawn, you can either withdraw your request or I'll deny it. Those are the two choices. MR. HERRON: I understand. And, again, I 3 understand that the issue is going to be withdrawn and, as a consequence, my pleadings will be withdrawn. 5 COMMISSIONER KIESLING: Okay. Then you 6 don't need to stick around unless you're just dying to listen to the rest of it. MR. HERRON: I'd love to hear it. 9 COMMISSIONER KIESLING: Any other 10 11 preliminary matters? MS. BARONE: Commissioner Kiesling, that's 12 the only one that I'm aware of. However, the parties have informed Staff that they've withdrawn several 14 15 more issues. COMMISSIONER KIESLING: Well, let's work our 16 way through the prehearing then, and we can get to them. And I don't need to do anything with Sprint 18 Communication Company's motion to strike, or do I do 19 that at the end? 20 MS. BARONE: That's in Section IX, which it 21 is moot at this point. 22 23 COMMISSIONER KIESLING: Okay. MS. BARONE: Oh, I'm sorry. Sprint's motion 24

strike the notice of the 8th Circuit's order,

that's what you're referring to. We'll get to that in 2 Section IX. COMMISSIONER KIESLING: Okay. 3 MS. BARONE: Also, I'd like to ask if the parties have any preliminary issues before we move into the issues. 6 MS. WHITE: Beyond the additional issues? I 7 mean, the ones we've taken out? 8 9 MS. BARONE: Yes. MS. WHITE: No. 10 COMMISSIONER KIESLING: Okay. I've got the 11 draft prehearing here. Are there any problems with 12 the case background? MR. BOYD: Commissioner, I'm sure Monica 14 will clarify that we need to show Mr. Fincher's 15 appearance also on behalf of Sprint. 16 COMMISSIONER KIESLING: Is Mr. Fincher from 17 your office, or do you have another address? 18 MR. BOYD: He is with the Atlanta office. 19 MR. FINCHER: I'm with Sprint out of 20 Atlanta, Georgia, 3100 Cumberland Circle, Atlanta, 21 Georgia 30339. 22 COMMISSIONER KIESLING: Have you entered any 23 kind of a written appearance just so that our record

can be clear?

MR. FINCHER: Yes, my name is on the 1 original petition. 2 COMMISSIONER RIESLING: Okay. 3 MS. BARONE: It will be reflected in the order. 5 COMMISSIONER KIESLING: All right. What 6 about the order of witnesses or the names of the 7 witnesses, are any of these going to be stipulated? MS. BARONE: Yes, and I've asked the parties 9 to identify which issues the witnesses will be 11 appearing for. COMMISSIONER KIESLING: All right, the first 12 two listed are yours. Go ahead? 13 MR. BOYD: Yes, ma'am. We are withdrawing 14 the testimony of Mr. Stahly, who is listed second, and 15 our witness will be Mr. Hunsucker, who is adopting the 16 direct prefiled testimony of Mr. Key. We filed a 17 notice to that effect, and with it the three 18 replacement pages. Mr. Hunsucker will be testifying 19 as to all of the issues that are still remaining, and 20 he has both direct and rebuttal as to all issues. 21 COMMISSIONER KIESLING: All right. Well, 22 23 that makes one thing -- let's go ahead and take it up

now. I don't see him listed here under rebuttal.

When did he file rebuttal?

MR. BOYD: It was on the date that was required to be. I'm not sure why it was overlooked.

COMMISSIONER KIESLING: All right.

MS. BARONE: We'll reflect that.

COMMISSIONER RIESLING: Okay. And as to Mr. Hunsucker's testimony, if he has testimony that relates to any issues that have now been withdrawn, are you planning to delete that testimony at the beginning of his testimony.

MR. BOYD: If that's the desire of the chair, we certainly will.

COMMISSIONER KIESLING: I mean, that's what I would request that everyone do. To the extent that any of your witnesses have provided testimony on issues that are no longer litigated issues, just when you begin with your witnesses go ahead and have them delete whatever is superfluous now so that it doesn't come into the record.

MS. BARONE: Commissioner Kiesling, if I may add, the parties have recommended to Staff that it may be that they can stipulate all of the testimony into the record, and that we not have a hearing and they brief the issues. I wanted to bring that to your attention.

COMMISSIONER KIESLING: Bless you.

2	wondering when we could finalize which of the
3	testimony would be withdrawn.
4	MS. WHITE: We could get you the exact page
5	numbers by Wednesday.
6	MS. BARONE: That will be fine.
7	MR. BOYD: Sure, we can do that.
8	COMMISSIONER KIESLING: And then
9	Mr. Hunsucker is your only witness?
10	MR. BOYD: Yes, ma'am.
11	COMMISSIONER KIESLING: And at some point, I
12	guess, he will testify as to every issue that is not
13	withdrawn.
14	MR. BOYD: Yes, ma'am, that is correct.
15	COMMISSIONER KIESLING: And then how about
16	BellSouth? Let's start with Mr. Varner.
17	MS. WHITH: All of Mr. Varner's testimony
18	will be withdrawn except that with regard to Issue 27,
19	and Mr. Scheye will adopt that. Mr. Scheye's
20	testimony, direct and rebuttal, will be in to the
21	extent it talks about the issues that are still in.
22	Ms. Caldwell's testimony would be totally
23	withdrawn. Mr. Reid's testimony would be totally
24	withdrawn. Ms. Calhoun's testimony would be withdrawn

25 with the exception of that concerning Issue 11.

Mr. Milner's testimony would be withdrawn in its entirety. Mr. Pecoraro's testimony would be withdrawn in its entirety, and Mr. Atherton's testimony would be withdrawn with the exception of Issues 18 and 21.

COMMISSIONER KIESLING: That's all that's listed here. So his will stay?

think all of his will stay. I think that's the way it'll end up, and he just has direct. Ms. Calhoun has direct and rebuttal.

COMMISSIONER KIESLING: Okay. Let's go on into rebuttal then. Mr. Varner's will be withdrawn in its entirety or --

MS. WHITE: I'd have to see if it speaks to Issue 27. I'm not sure. But it will be withdrawn with regard to everything but that issue and will be adopted by Mr. Scheye.

COMMISSIONER RIESLING: Okay.

MS. WHITE: Mr. Scheye's rebuttal will be withdrawn with the exception of Issue 6, 7, 13 and 27.

I'm sorry; 21 as well. 6, 7, 13, 21 and 27.

Dr. Emerson's would be withdrawn in its entirety.

Ms. Calhoun's would be withdrawn with the exception of Issue 11. I guess that's it.

MS. BARONE: Commissioner Kiesling, may I

ask a question, please? COMMISSIONER KIESLING: Sure. 2 MS. BARONE: It would help us, if you could, 3 if you need to clarify any of this, to get it to us by Tuesday since we have a three-day week. And the second thing is I would ask, would you like to take the direct and rebuttal together? 7 COMMISSIONER KIESLING: That was going to be 8 my next question. What's the parties' pleasure? 9 Direct and rebuttal together? 10 MS. WHITE: Oh that's fine. 11 MR. BOYD: That's fine. 12 COMMISSIONER KIESLING: Would you make sure 13 14 the order reflects that? MS. BARONE: Yes, ma'am. 15 COMMISSIONER KIESLING: And do you have any 16 problem with having any of that filed by tomorrow, 17 just to the extent --18 MS. WHITE: Yeah. Okay. 19 COMMISSIONER KIESLING: Okay. Basic 20 positions; any changes, additions, corrections? 21 MS. WHITE: I guess that will be changed to 22 the extent the issues have been narrowed, but other 23 than that --. 24

21	MR. BOYD: Issue 5 has been withdrawn.
22	COMMISSIONER KIESLING: 6; changes,
23	additions, corrections or withdrawn?
24	MR. BOYD: It is still alive, and we don't
25	have any changes.

21	COMMISSIONER KIESLING: Well, let's get that
22	down then. "How many points of interconnection are
23	appropriate"?
24	MS. WHITE: (Nodding head.)

COMMISSIONER KIESLING: "And where should

1	they be located?"
2	MS. WHITE: That's fine with us.
3	MR. FINCHER: Would you read that one more
4	time, please?
5	COMMISSIONER KIESLING: "How many points of
6	interconnection are appropriate and where should they
7	be located."
8	MR. FINCHER: Sounds good.
9	MR. BOYD: Yes, ma'am.
10	COMMISSIONER KIESLING: And then as to the
11	parties' positions, is there any change for Sprint?
12	MR. FINCHER: No change.
13	COMMISSIONER RIESLING: Okay. So one point
14	of at least one, and within the ILEC calling area.
15	MS. WHITE: I think BellSouth would probably
16	have to make a change to make it more specific to that
17	issue that's left, but I can get that to Staff by
18	Tuesday.
19	COMMISSIONER KIESLING: Okay.
20	MS. BARONE: Thank you.
21	COMMISSIONER KIESLING: And if in reading
22	over your entire position on that, if there is any
23	change, would you also get that in on Tuesday?
24	MR. BOYD: Yes, ma'am. We'll do that by

tomorrow.

COMMISSIONER KIESLING: 19 is withdrawn? 1 2 MR. BOYD: Correct. COMMISSIONER KIESLING: 20? 3 MR. BOYD: Has been withdrawn. 5 COMMISSIONER KIESLING: 21? MR. BOYD: It's still alive. 6 7 MS. WHITE: But it's been narrowed considerably. 8 COMMISSIONER KIESLING: What should it be 9 now? 10 MS. WHITE: The only two issues left in 21 11 are whether mid-span meets are appropriate, and -- I never know how to put this one -- the types of traffic, the jurisdictional mix -- let's see. I guess 15 it would be broken down into two. "Are mid-span meets appropriate," and the second one would be, "What is 17 the jurisdictional mixture of traffic that should be allowed on the trunks." 18 19 COMMISSIONER KIESLING: Okay. Well, let me 20 get the first part down, then. "What are the midpoint 21 connects"? 22 MS. WHITE: No, it would be -- I guess it 23 would be, "Are mid-span meets appropriate." 24 MS. BARONE: I would suggest we begin the next sentence "If so."

1	COMMISSIONER KIESLING: "If so would you
2	repeat yourself again then for me, Ms. White?
3	MS. WHITE: I was just trying to think. I
4	think it's two different issues.
5	MS. BARONE: Oh, is it?
6	MS. WHITE: Yeah.
7	MS. BARONE: Go ahead.
8	MS. WHITE: So I would just say what
9	COMMISSIONER KIESLING: Well, do we need an
LO	(a) and a (b), then?
11	MS. WHITE: Maybe we need an (a) and (b).
12	That would probably make it cleaner.

14	COMMISSIONER KIESLING: Okay. 21(a) is "Are
15	mid-span meets appropriate." And I guess for that,
16	Sprint, your position would be yes?
17	MR. BOYD: That's correct.

19	would be no?
20	MS. WHITE: Right.
21	MR. FINCHER: Let me clarify something. I
22	was thinking mid-span meets was really part of Issue
23	21 rather than

2	MS. WHITE: That's fine with us.
3	MR. FINCHER: Term sheet item II.B.2 along
4	with II.B.1.A are the two issues still remaining in
5	Issue No. 18. That might be the place to address
6	mid-span meets.
7	MS. WHITE: We could make 18 an (a) and a
8	(b).
9	MR. FINCHER: Right. That would work.
10	COMMISSIONER KIESLING: Well, a mid-span
11	meet is a form of point of interconnection.
12	MS. WHITE: Right.
13	COMMISSIONER KIESLING: Then I don't see a
14	need to break it up, because how many points of
15	interconnection are appropriate? You know, Sprint
16	says at least one. BellSouth says none, I guess.
17	MS. WHITE: No. I think we'd say that at
18	least one is appropriate.
19	COMMISSIONER KIESLING: Both of you are in
20	agreement on
21	MS. WHITE: Maybe it's where they should be
22	located that is really the issue.
23	COMMISSIONER KIESLING: "And where should
24	they be located. " and would include the mid-span meet

issue.

MS. WHITE: Right; because that would be part of where should they be located. COMMISSIONER KIESLING: So both of you will 3 be amending your position on 18 to reflect your position on midpoint meets, which means that we don't need an (a) and a (b) on 21. 6 MS. WHITE: So 21 really comes down --7 COMMISSIONER KIESLING: Jurisdictional. 8 MS. WHITE: Yeah; what jurisdictional mix of 9 traffic. I never know how to put this one. 10 COMMISSIONER KIESLING: Well, everyone think 11 about it for a second and see if you can come up with some language that you think is okay. (Pause.) 14 MS. BARONE: Nancy, is this the issue, 15 "Should jurisdictional mixed traffic be allowed?" 16 MS. WHITE: Yeah, that's it, on the same 17 trunk group. I mean, on the same trunk is really what 18 it comes down to. MR. BOYD: But we want to make sure that the 20 condition --21 COMMISSIONER KIESLING: Push your button. 22 MR. BOYD: The rest of the term sheet 23 language relating to the conditions and if it's how

you're going to -- if you're going to mix them, how

2	that. It's not just a yes or no answer.
3	COMMISSIONER KIESLING: No, it's not. I
4	mean, it's saying what jurisdictional mix of
5	traffic no; sorry
6	MS. WHITE: No; but you could do that and
7	that would do it. "What jurisdictional mix of traffic
8	should be allowed on the same trunk group, " because
9	your argument would be all of it and here's how you
10	deal with it. You know, you use percentage of local
11	use and measurements and all that kind of thing. So
12	maybe that's the way to do it. "What jurisdictional
13	mix of traffic should be allowed on the same trunk
14	group."
15	MR. FINCHER: Would a second part of the
16	that be like "If so
17	MS. WHITE: No, because you're not
18	answering
19	COMMISSIONER KIESLING: This isn't a yes or
20	no. You list it and you say
21	MS. WHITE: And you say how you deal with
22	it, because your answer would be "All types should be
23	allowed, and here's how you deal with it."
24	MS. BARONE: Nancy, we have a suggestion.
25	What do you think about this? "Should jurisdictional

1	mixed traffic be allowed? If so, what should be the
2	terms and conditions?"
3	MR. FINCHER: That's what I was looking for.
4	COMMISSIONER KIESLING: You have that down,
5	because I'm not going to rewrite it.
6	MR. BOYD: Would you say it again, please?
7	MS. BARONE: "Should jurisdictional mixed
8	traffic be allowed? If so, what should be the terms
9	and conditions?"
10	MS. WHITE: Be allowed on the same trunk
11	group.
12	COMMISSIONER KIESLING: And then each of you
13	will amend your positions to respond to that issue?
14	MR. FINCHER: Yes, ma'am.
15	COMMISSIONER KIESLING: Okay. When you're
16	finished writing, I'll start the next one. (Pause.)
17	Okay. Issue 22?
18	MR. BOYD: It is withdrawn. 23 is
19	withdrawn, 24 is withdrawn, 25 is withdrawn, 26 is
20	withdrawn, and 27 is still alive.
21	COMMISSIONER KIESLING: And is 27 alive in
22	its current form?
23	MR. BOYD: Yes, ma'am.
24	COMMISSIONER KIESLING: No rewording is
25	necessary.

MR. BOYD: I don't believe so. COMMISSIONER KIESLING: And no changes to 2 either party's position are necessary? 3 MS. WHITE: (Shaking head.) COMMISSIONER KIESLING: Okay. On the 5 exhibit list, then I assume since we're withdrawing a number of parties' testimony in toto, that some of 7 these exhibits are not going to remain. So do you know yet which ones are going? 10 MS. WHITE: Do you all want to start? MR. BOYD: Sure. Mr. Stahly's been 11 withdrawn, so all three of his are out. Mr. Hunsucker's, all three of his are still on the table, and I guess that should be -- the third one should be MRH-3. 15 16 COMMISSIONER RIESLING: Yes. Okay. MS. WHITE: Mr. Varner's, his two exhibits 17 should be withdrawn. Mr. Scheye's issue -- Exhibits 1 and -- no. Exhibit 1 would be the only one remaining. 19 COMMISSIONER KIESLING: Okay. 2 and 3 are 20 21 gone. MS. WHITE: Right. Dr. Emmerson is 22 withdrawn in its entirety, so his would be gone, as 23 would be Ms. Caldwell's, which go on for quite a 24

2	MS. WHITE: Mr. Reid is withdrawn, so all o
3	his would go. Ms. Calhoun, let's see. I think all o
4	hers are gone except for GC-1 and GC-3. Now, 1, 2 an
5	3 would remain, 5, 6, 7 and 8 would be withdrawn.
6	COMMISSIONER RIESLING: And there is no 4?
7	MS. WHITE: I guess that's so. Yes. And I
8	didn't count very well. Yes. Mr. Milner's, all of
9	his would be gone. Mr. Pecoraro's all would be gone.
10	Mr. Atherton's would remain.
11	COMMISSIONER KIESLING: And are there any
12	stipulations at this time?
13	MS. WHITE: Yes. The parties would propose
14	stipulating the testimony of the witnesses that were
15	left and on the issues that remain, and briefing the
16	issues that are remaining for the Commission and not
17	having a formal hearing on this matter.
18	COMMISSIONER KIESLING: And waving cross?
19	MS. WHITE: Waiving cross.
20	MR. BOYD: (Nodding head.)
21	COMMISSIONER RIESLING: Any problem with
22	Staff on that?
23	MS. BARONE: We're going to have to check
24	with all Staff on their issues, but we can get back

commissioner KIESLING: Yes, because if you actually want somebody to be here to testify, you'll need to make sure they know it, too.

MS. BARONE: Yes, ma'am.

MS. WHITE: And just to make clear, the three witnesses that -- what we had remaining on the issues that remain would be Mr. Scheye, Ms. Calhoun and Mr. Atherton.

COMMISSIONER RIESLING: All right. Then the only matter remaining is Sprint's motion to strike.

The other is taken care of. I'm assuming that BellSouth Advertising & Publishing Corp's motion to dismiss is no longer viable since they're not a party any longer.

MR. BOYD: That's correct.

COMMISSIONER RIESLING: Then let's talk about the motion to strike. Well, let me just ask a couple clarifying questions and then it will help me put this in a framework.

On the notice of the order of the 8th Circuit, I understand everything except the request for relief. I mean, I take it you're asking us to take official recognition of the 8th Circuit's order granting stay.

MR. BOYD: Yes. Are you talking --

MS. WHITE: BellSouth.

COMMISSIONER RIESLING: Yes.

MS. WHITE: BellSouth.

COMMISSIONER RIESLING: Yes, I'm sorry. It was your motion to strike. I'm sorry.

MS. WHITE: Yes. We are asking you to take notice of the 8th Circuit order.

commissioner RIESLING: And since we generally do take official notice of orders of Courts, what does the request for relief mean? I mean, how can you be requesting relief on a notice, official notice --

we've been able to resolve, to some extent, a lot of the issues in this case, the pricing issues in particular, I'm not sure that our motion -- or our petition for relief really has the same effect, or we're really asking for anything more in this.

The most favored nation clause, the pick and choose part, is still out there, but we can argue that in our brief. So I guess -- I think as long as the Commission takes notice of the order, then we're not asking for anything more.

COMMISSIONER KIESLING: Well, I don't think there's going to be any problem with that. Ordinarily

you'll take that up at the beginning of the hearing with whoever is conducting the hearing. But I mean beyond that, I couldn't understand what the request for relief was. It seemed like it was more argument for your position than it was --5 MS. WHITE: Well, I think you're right, and 6 that's why I think it's better to be argued in the 7 brief if need be. COMMISSIONER KIESLING: So if we limit 9 what's going to happen to simply official recognition 10 and allow both parties to argue in their brief, do I 11 need to take up your motion to strike? 12 MR. BOYD: Well, I think the most 13 appropriate thing would be for BellSouth to withdraw its pleading, save for the request for official 15 recognition. 16 MS. WHITE: We'll do that. 17 MR. BOYD: That's fine. 18 COMMISSIONER KIESLING: That will make it a 19 whole lot cleaner and easier. 20 Okay. Then with that, I have nothing else 21 on my plate. 22 MS. MS. BARONE: We have one last question.

want to clarify with the parties, are there any pricing issues left? Because I believe you have withdrawn cost studies and I want to make sure that there are no pricing issues left.

MR. BOYD: There are no pricing issues remaining.

ms. WHITE: Unless you call the most favored nation some kind of pricing issue, but other than that, there's nothing left; and that's why we might just as well withdraw our motion for the 8th Circuit order.

MS. BARONE: Thank you. That's all.

at least convene a hearing and then let everyone stipulate in the testimony and then close the record. So are there any questions or problems about when that is set, or any question about whether we'll finish in time? (Laughter.)

Well, I just like to be sure, considering some of the hearings we've been having lately that have gone until 9:00 at night.
