STAFF RECOMMENDATION

<u>Issue 1</u>: Should the Commission grant the amended petition by Friends of the Aquifer, Inc. to initiate rulemaking to adopt rules stating that it will propose further rules governing safety and environmental standards for intrastate and interstate natural gas pipelines and pipeline facilities?

<u>Recommendation</u>: No. The Commission should deny the amended petition. To the extent that the Commission has jurisdiction and the authority to adopt rules regulating gas pipelines, it has done so.

<u>Issue 2</u>: Should this docket be closed? <u>Recommendation</u>: Yes.

CHAIRMAN GARCIA: Item 4.

MS. MOORE: Commissioners, Item 4 is the petition to initiate rulemaking by the Friends of the Aquifer. They asked for rules on gas safety and environmental standards for intrastate and interstate natural gas pipelines and pipeline facilities, which includes, hazardous liquid pipelines. The Staff has recommended denial.

Mr. Folsom is here I think to -- I believe to propose an alternative or a settlement agreement. Staff recommends against that.

CHAIRMAN GARCIA: All right. Very good. Sir?

MR. FOLSOM: Mr. Chairman --

CHAIRMAN GARCIA: Welcome back. You need to press the button so that the light turns green. There we go.

MR. FOLSOM: Thank you.

I have filed a petition and a brief in support of the petition, and anything I would say now in support of it would be repititious, so let me move on to another area, which is hazardous liquid pipelines.

when a natural gas line leaks, the gas goes

up. When the liquid petroleum pipeline leaks, it goes down. And I'm advised by the experts that one gallon of liquid petroleum is sufficient to contaminate a million gallons of water to the point that fish cannot live in it. And a leak with the liquid pipeline has the potential of going down and contaminating the aquifer, streams, rivers, lakes, and so on.

There is not a single agency, state or federal, that now regulates liquid petroleum pipelines. We have filed a petition with both the Department of Community Affairs and the Department of Environmental Protection requesting or seeking them to initiate rulemaking to regulate the hazardous liquid pipelines. Both agencies denied our petition on the grounds that there is no specific statute that would authorize them to initiate rulemaking.

We appealed both these decisions to the First District Court of Appeals, and the First District Court of Appeals consolidated the two appeals and referred it to their — the court mediator. We met in mediation and agreed to employ the Florida Conflict Resolution

Consortium at the expense of Friends of the Aquifer to serve as a facilitator to coordinate a series of meetings to discuss the best management practices as relates to natural gas and hazardous liquid pipelines in Florida.

And the parties agreed that the Public Service Commission, local government, and pipeline owner-operators would be invited and requested to attend, and the parties had agreed to use their best efforts to encourage the participation of these nonparties. The agencies agreed to be present as advisors and consultants, with no agreement at this time as to any particular resolution to any issue. The Department of Environmental Protection agreed to provide pipeline facility spill records in advance of the meetings and agreed to contact the Coast Guard for its spill records to furnish all parties in advance of the meeting.

And we -- I have discussed this matter with Chris and have furnished her a copy of the agreement between the two agencies and the Friends. And we would like to encourage the Public Service Commission through its legal staff to participate in these meetings.

CHAIRMAN GARCIA: Okay. Very well. 1 Mr. Melson? 2 MR. MELSON: Commissioners, we support the 3 staff recommendation to deny the rulemaking. 4 think the request Mr. Folsom has made this 5 morning is really beyond the scope of this 6 docket. Obviously, if this proceeding is going 7 on, it's probably something you do want your 8 staff to participate in, but I don't think 9 that's something you need to decide here today. 10 11 CHAIRMAN GARCIA: I agree with that. 12 Staff, do you want to answer some of the 13 questions that were put out there by Mr. Folsom? Who regulates --14 15 MR. MILLS: The Department of Agriculture does OP gas pipelines. There is a small number 16 of those, and they do them. And as far as the **17** 18 rest of the liquid lines, they're done by the USDOT out of Atlanta. They're done on an annual 19 basis. They are jurisdictional to them. 20 21 CHAIRMAN GARCIA: Okay. MR. MILLS: DEP also says that they do not 22 23 have rules that say pipelines, but they do have rules, extensive rules covering pipelines. 24

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CHAIRMAN GARCIA: Okay. We do not have

2	MR. MILLS: Not on the environmental side.
3	COMMISSIONER CLARK: I can move Staff, but
4	I
5	CHAIRMAN GARCIA: On the safety side we do.
6	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Will we be
7	MR. MILLS: Not on liquid. On natural
8	only.
9	COMMISSIONER CLARK: It might be helpful to
10	participate in
11	CHAIRMAN GARCIA: If that happens, yes.
12	COMMISSIONER CLARK: I think that the
13	expertise that we might bring
14	MR. MILLS: We're just concerned that these
15	be constructive meetings, not obstructive
16	meetings.
17	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Yes.
18	CHAIRMAN GARCIA: Right. I think we're
19	going to vote out Staff, but if this happens,
20	Mr. Folsom, please Mr. Melson I'm sure will
21	follow it also. We will we should
22	participate, and I know we're a constructive
23	force there.
24	COMMISSIONER CLARK: I move Staff.
25	COMMISSIONER DEASON: Second.

1	CHAIRMAN GARCIA: All those in favor
2	signify by saying "aye."
3	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Aye.
4	COMMISSIONER DEASON: Aye.
