

In order to assist Florida Public Service Commission staff in formulating an agenda for the July 18, 2002 workshop, the investor-owned electric utilities offering Industrial or Commercial Interruptible or Curtailable Service are requested to respond to the following questions. Information Request

For the purposes of the following questions, the term "interruptible rate" is defined as any rate schedule which allows the utility to interrupt all service behind a meter, in order to supply capacity to either its own or to another regulated utility's firm load. It does <u>not</u> include load management programs with specified limits on the duration or frequency of interruptions, or programs which interrupt only certain appliances behind a meter such as residential load management programs.

- 1. How many of the following types of customers are currently served under interruptible rates which allow the utility to interrupt for an indeterminate time period and frequency:
 - A. K-12 Schools
 - B. Post secondary schools (universities, community colleges, trade schools)
 - C. Public functions (prisons, police stations, fire stations)
 - D. Public health facilities (hospitals, clinics, laboratories)
- 2. How does the utility determine which customers are interrupted during a given capacity shortage? Are outages cycled or rotated on a specific basis if not all interruptible load is needed to meet a given shortage?

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- 3. How many times during the last five years were the types of customers described in Question 1 interrupted for more than 10 minutes during a single interruption?
- 4. Was any advanced warning provided to the customers described in Question 1 prior to interruption? Is such information routinely available to any customer served under an interruptible rate?
- 5. What language changes could be made to the existing tariffs to preclude new customers from taking service under the rate for whom interruption would create a public policy issue?
- 6. What steps could be taken to move existing customers described in Question 5 off of interruptible rate schedules, without undue financial hardship to such customers?
