1	DIRECT TESTIMONY OF MIKE SIMS
2	Q. Please state your name and professional address.
3	A. My name is Mike Sims and my business address is 5601 S.E. 66^{th} Street,
4	Ocala, Florida 34480.
5	Q. By whom are you employed and in what capacity?
6	A. I am employed by the Marion County Board of County Commissioners
7	(MCBCC), Solid Waste Department as an Administrative Manager.
8	Q. How long have you been employed by the Marion County Solid Waste
9	Department?
10	A. I started working at the Marion County Solid Waste Department (MCSWD)
11	in December 4, 1993.
12	Q. Would you state your educational background and experience?
13	A. My educational background includes an Associate of Arts degree from
14	Miami Dade Community College (1979) and a Bachelor of Science degree in Plant
15	Science - Vegetable Crops from the University of Florida (1987). My
16	experience includes service in the U.S. Army, Toll Testing Technician at
17	Southern Bell, Assistant Farm Manager at Town & Country Farms, Soil
18	Conservationist at Marion Soil Conservation District, Hazardous Waste
19	Technician at the MCSWD, Hazardous Waste Supervisor at the MCSWD, and
20	Administrative Manager at the MCSWD.
21	Q. Would you explain what your general responsibilities are as
22	Administrative Manager at the MCSWD?
23	A. My general responsibilities as Administrative Manager at the MCSWD
24	include facilitating the flow of paper work in the MCSWD, organizing the
25	specifications for project bids managing the implementation of contracts

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25 specifications for project bids, managing the implementation of contracts,

overseeing the groundwater monitoring activities for the County's landfills.
 Q. What is the purpose of your direct testimony?

A. My testimony will describe Marion County's assistance in addressing the water contamination problem at the old Davis Landfill (Landfill) site. Sunshine Utilities of Central Florida, Inc.'s (Sunshine or utility) Lakeview Hills water system well is located next to the Landfill. My testimony will also describe the County's proposal to have Sunshine provide service to private homes that are currently not connected to the utility's water system and the financial assistance proposed by County staff for this project.

10 Q. Please state your understanding of the contamination problem at11 Sunshine's Lakeview Hills water system.

A. When I assumed this position with the MCSWD, ground water monitoring had been going on for several years at monitoring wells located around the Landfill and at private drinking water wells in the surrounding community. Laboratory analysis had revealed levels of 1.1-dichloroethene (1.1-DCE) had exceeded the maximum contaminate level (MCL) of 7 parts per billion established by the state for this compound in several private wells and in monitoring wells around the Landfill.

The Landfill was constructed and accepted garbage disposal prior to the 19 currently required landfill liner and leachate collection systems that 20 protect groundwater from landfill contamination. Sunshine's Lakeview Hills 21 public well is located across from the Landfill on SE 115^{th} Avenue. This 22 23 public supply well serves the Lakeview Hills water system. In September 1994, the County's groundwater monitoring program discovered that the well 24 samples contained 1,1-DCE, but the samples did not exceed the MCL. 25

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Marion County performed a contamination assessment report (CAR) identifying 1.1-DCE as a landfill generated contaminate. This CAR was checked and field-verified by both the Florida Department of Environment Protection (FDEP) and the United States Environmental Protection Agency. The County entered into a consent agreement with the FDEP to implement a closure plan for the landfill. In July,2002, the closure plan was completed.

7 Q. What assistance has Marion County provided to Sunshine with regard to8 this contamination problem?

9 When 1,1-DCE was discovered in the Lakeview Hills supply well, the Α. 10 County performed quarterly water quality tests and provided the results to 11 Sunshine, as directed by the FDEP. County staff requested permission, and was approved by the MCBCC, to install a dual tank activated carbon water filter 12 system. The levels of 1.1-DCE had not exceeded the MCL prior to the date the 13 filters were installed. The County, in agreement with the utility, agreed to 14 15 fund the engineering, permitting, refurbishing of the filters (original 16 filters supplied by FDEP), installation, water quality testing and maintenance 17 of the filters. Sunshine informed the County at that time that Sunshine was 18 planning a new water source for the Lakeview Hills water system.

Water quality testing prior to installing the filters was performed quarterly from October 1999 through October 2000 at a total cost of \$3,767. The filter was placed into operation in December 2000 for a cost of \$15,574, not including County staff time. The County continues to provide special water quality monitoring required by the filter permit and a sample is tested every 60 days for the presence of 1,1-DCE between the two filter units. The testing cost totaled \$3,582 for 2001 and from January through July, 2002 cost

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\$1,791. The filter permit requires replacement of the activated carbon filter
 media when 1,1-DCE test results show breakthrough concentrations in excess of
 50% of the MCL.

4 Q. Has the County replaced any filter media for this system, and if so,5 what is the cost to changing a filter?

The County's consulting engineer estimated that the first filter 6 Α. Yes. would reach breakthrough concentrations of 50% of the MCL between 8 to 12 7 months. Marion County has exchanged the filter media once for Filter No. 1 8 on January 17, 2002, which occurred 12 months after the filters became 9 operational. Filter No. 1 accepts raw water from the well then feeds water 10 to Filter No. 2, then water flows into the distribution system. As expected, 11 Filter No. 1 reached 50% breakthrough first and required replacement. 12 13 Following replacement of the filter media in Filter No. 1, the water flow manifold was adjusted to make Filter No. 2 the lead filter for raw water. The 14 cost for the filter exchange performed on January 17, 2002, was \$2,775. 15

16 Q. Pending the implementation of an alternative solution for the 1,1-DCE,17 does the County plan to continue funding the filtration system?

18 A. Yes.

Please state your understanding of the County's proposal to have 19 Q. Sunshine provide service to an area currently outside the utility's territory. 20 Marion County has worked with the utility and the FDEP on a plan to 21 Α. expand the public drinking water system around the Landfill. The County has 22 23 concerns with the private drinking wells in this area where test results reflect the presence of some chemical compounds. These tested levels of 24 contamination have not exceeded the MCL for compounds, but leaves the County 25

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very concerned about the long-term viability of these wells. The contaminants of concern include nitrate, cadmium, lead, 1,1-DCE, vinyl chloride, chloromethane, and other secondary drinking water standard compounds. The County would like to see the existing Lakeview Hills well replaced and the public water distribution system expanded to provide safe drinking water to the 37 private homes with questionable wells.

7 Q. Does the County plan to provide any financial assistance for Sunshine8 to serve this area?

9 County staff had prepared and supported the approval of an agenda item Α. 10 to consider the funding of \$175,000 at the MCBCC May 7, 2002 meeting. This 11 agenda item was pulled when Sunshine informed the County that the utility's proposed South Marion Regional Water System project was put on hold. 12 The total County proposed funding was based upon a projection of costs prepared 13 14 by H.W. Barrineau and Associates, Inc. (Sunshine's consulting engineers) to 15 directly connect the homes identified as a concern to Lakeview Hills water system and provide a new potable water supply source. Any funding provided 16 17 by the County will require the approval of the MCBCC. County staff has placed 18 funding into the MCSWD's proposed budget for the fiscal year 2002-2003 19 (October 1, 2002 - September 30, 2003) to continue water quality testing and 20 filter maintenance. As of this date, the budget has not been approved by the 21 MCBCC.

- 22 Q. Does this conclude your testimony?
- 23 A. Yes, it does.
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
