Reading the Tampa Bay Times this morning, I am very grateful that you stood your ground against Duke and promoted the renewable energy. It is astonishing that Duke doesn't think for the future. Thank you very much.

We have 13.2 KW nominal solar capacity on our roof (55 panels) and we are almost completely independent. Our monthly power bill is \$10.49 for 11 months (= the connection fee). In the month of January, Duke pays me a paltry \$.04 per KW for the overage and since this is a "dark" month I do not produce sufficient reserve to get back to \$10.49. Instead I am being charged \$0.14 or \$0.15 for power usage. The most honorable Duke could do is trade me KW for KW. But I could do this investment because of the tax credit and the \$2.00 per KW subsidy from then Progress Energy.

I think furthermore that the time has come to stop the premium consumers have to pay for future investments that are never going to take place. Any reasonable company plans and pays for its own investments, but this being a public utility I understand they need help from time to time. But let the expenses be reimbursed as they occur, though there does not seem to be a need: Duke makes for plenty of happy shareholders.

Anyway, thank you again for your support and Happy Thanksgiving.

Florida Refrigeration and Air Conditioning Contractors Association (Florida RACCA) is a statewide professional association representing approximately 325 contractor and associate members. On behalf of our members, we oppose the request of various utility companies and the PSC staff recommendations to eliminate rebates for air conditioning systems that are more energy efficient.

It is our position that rebates for air conditioning systems with greater efficiency meet the PSC rules requirement to be cost-effective by directly and proportionately (or greater) reducing the utility costs for the customer. We understand this reduces revenue for any utility company.

We disagree with the point made by utility companies and the PSC staff that improved building codes make rebates unnecessary as these improved codes apply only to new construction - which is only a fraction of the overall residential energy use. The existing building stock still constitutes the largest portion, for which energy efficiency is still very much needed. It is reasonable to estimate that it will take at least another ten years for Florida's residents and businesses to transition from existing inefficient air conditioning systems to new ones. Until then, it only makes sense to continue with this part of the rebate program.

In addition to simply improving energy efficiency for air conditioning systems, the rebate program also provides a very important impact for Florida in that it increases

permitted installations by licensed contractors because the rebate makes the perceived savings in hiring unlicensed contractors who will install substandard or illegal equipment without a permit much less attractive for the consumer.

Complete elimination of rebates benefits only the utility companies and hurts the consumer, the State of Florida, and businesses that participate in this worthwhile program. It hurts the consumer by virtually mandating higher utility expenditures by encouraging higher use of energy that results in what the utility companies really want – a reason to impose higher rates on consumers in order to build (or plan to build) additional power plants. It hurts the State of Florida by leaving it alone to try to meet upcoming federal goals while utility companies pull Florida in the wrong direction. It hurts participating businesses by requiring a sudden and costly shift in business structure to account for elimination of the rebates, which cost cannot be passed on to ratepayers as it can be by and for utility companies.

In the best interests of most involved, it would be prudent to modify, rather than eliminate, the rebates and to delay the deadline to end the program. We understand that falls short of what the utility companies want, but this should not be driven by what the utility companies want. This should be about what is best for the consumers and the State of Florida.

We respectfully request that the Public Service Commission deny complete elimination of the rebates in favor of a modification of the program to allow continued rebates for a minimum of ten years for air conditioning systems with greater efficiency.

King delivers blow to Senate Keystone passage

The outlook for passage of a bill to approve the Keystone XL oil sands pipeline from Canada dimmed in advance of a planned vote Tuesday, when a key undecided senator announced his opposition.



The decision to vote no on the bill by Sen. Angus King, an independent from Maine who caucuses with Democrats, left Sen. Mary Landrieu one vote short of the 60 she needs to pass her bill. She has the backing of all 45 Republicans and 13 other Democrats.

Landrieu, D-La., avoided comment when asked in the Capitol about King's decision.

Her top Democratic ally on the bill, Sen. Joe Manchin of West Virginia, acknowledged that they had run out of potential backers and had to hope that one senator would reverse course to vote for the \$8 billion project.

"Maybe someone else will see it like I do and surprise us," Manchin told reporters.

King, who was previously leaning against the bill, said in a statement that while he

was "frustrated" by Obama administration delays in making a decision on the project, he was also opposed to Congress giving the green light to individual pipelines.

"Congress is not, nor should it be, in the business of legislating the approval or disapproval of a construction project," he said.

Sen. Harry Reid, D-Nev., the outgoing majority leader, told reporters that Landrieu brought up the vote in the Democrats' weekly closed-door luncheon on Tuesday. He declared himself uncertain about how the bill would fare and would not confirm that the bill would come up short.

"I don't expect it to fail -- I don't know what's going to happen," he told reporters in response to a question about whether the bill would be defeated.

Landrieu secured a vote on her bill last Tuesday in a bid to show her influence on Capitol Hill ahead of her Dec. 6 runoff election against Rep. Bill Cassidy, R-La.

Responding to questions about the impact of the vote on Landrieu's re-election prospects, Reid said only, "the race is not over in Louisiana. She has not given up and we have not given up."

The last publicly undeclared vote, Sen. Dick Durbin, D-Ill., Reid's top deputy, declined Tuesday to say definitively that he would oppose the bill.

But he told CNN on Sunday that he backs President Barack Obama's stance that Congress should not intervene in the ongoing State Department permit review.

The Keystone vote was capping a multi-hour debate on the Senate floor over the project, which would transport oil sands crude from Canada to Nebraska for shipment to refineries on the Texas Gulf Coast.

The debate was marked by partisan jabs and references to the race between Landrieu and Cassidy, who sponsored identical approval legislation that passed the House on Friday.

Under a deal between Landrieu and Republicans to bring the bill to a vote in the Senate, the final bill sent to Obama after Senate passage would be the House version, giving Cassidy a victory to tout in Louisiana.

Incoming majority leader Sen. Mitch McConnell, R-Ky., opened debate by referring to the bill as "Congressman Cassidy's Keystone bill," and said that if it fails on Tuesday, he will bring it back up when the GOP takes over the Senate in January.

Berkeley to vote on climate change labels at gas pumps

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP) — The San Francisco Bay Area city of Berkeley will decide whether to slap stickers on gas pumps warning that burning fuel contributes to global warming in a plan that's a first of its kind in the country.

The Berkeley City Council is expected to vote Tuesday night on whether to move forward with the proposal to put climate-change warning labels on gas pumps

citywide. San Francisco is drafting a similar ordinance that officials could vote on by next spring.

A spokeswoman for the Western States Petroleum Association, an oil-industry lobbying group, has said the labels reflect the state's and Berkeley's opinions and would force "unwanted speech in violation of the First Amendment."

The labels are part of a voter-approved city plan to reduce emissions by 33 percent between 2000 and 2020.

Heating costs heading up as cold grips nation

NEW YORK (AP) — The cold is back, and with it, rising heating bills.

This winter was expected to bring much lower bills than last year because it wasn't supposed to be so darn cold. Homeowners could go a little easier on the thermostat, and less fuel use would offset rising prices for natural gas and electricity, which generates heat for 88 percent of U.S. households.

Then, descending from the Arctic, came a block of cold air nearly the size of the entire Lower 48. This month is now on track to be the coldest November since 1996.

"It came in hard and strong, pretty impressive stuff," says Matt Rogers, a meteorologist at the Commodity Weather Group, which forecasts weather and heating demand for energy companies. He notes that a cold November doesn't necessarily lead to a colder winter. But it depletes fuel supplies and pushes prices up.

And it just so happens most forecasters think January and February will also be colder than normal across most of the U.S.



Toxic plume spreading at defense plant in NY, tests show

BETHPAGE, N.Y. (AP) — A decades-long toxic cleanup around the former aerospace plant that helped land a man on the moon is getting renewed scrutiny after groundwater tests showed a potential carcinogen spreading deeper and toward nearby Long Island communities.

Officials revealed this month that the 4.5 mile by 3.5 mile plume of underground contamination in Bethpage is moving deeper than ever. High concentrations of the industrial solvent trichloroethylene, or TCE, were found more than 60 stories below ground.

Readings show the plume is moving further south toward untainted public wells, officials said.

"Unless they figure a way to reach it, locate it and extract it, you're looking at a much longer range of a high contamination area that they will have to contend with," warned Sarah Meyland, associate professor of environmental technology at New York Institute of Technology.

The contamination is emanating from a 600-acre property that was once home to Grumman Aerospace Corp., the U.S. Navy and other associated defense industries. Grumman built an armada of aircraft used during the Cold War, as well as the lunar module that landed astronauts on the moon.

NTSB: Gov't aircraft regulations apply to drones

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government has the power to hold drone operators accountable when they operate the remote-control aircraft recklessly, a federal safety board ruled Tuesday in a setback to small drone operators chafing under Federal Aviation Administration restrictions.

The National Transportation safety Board, which hears appeals of Federal Aviation Administration enforcement actions, ruled that small drones are a type of aircraft and fall under existing FAA rules.

The FAA had fined Raphael Pirker, an aerial photographer, \$10,000 for operating his Ritewing Zephyr in a reckless manner on the University of Virginia campus in 2011. Pirker allegedly flew the drone, which weighed less than 5 pounds, at "extremely low" altitudes, including under a pedestrian bridge and directly at a person, causing the individual to duck out of the way. He had been hired to make photos and videos of the campus.

Pirker appealed the fine, saying his aircraft was effectively no different than a model aircraft and therefore not subject to regulations that apply to manned aircraft. An NTSB administrative law judge sided with him in March, saying the FAA hasn't issued any regulations specifically for drones and therefore can't determine their use.

The FAA appealed the decision to the four-member safety board, which said Tuesday that the definition of an aircraft is very broad.



NRC chair: Work needed to finish Fukushima changes

ATLANTA (AP) — The outgoing chair of the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission said Tuesday the industry must finish making the safety changes required after a nuclear disaster in Japan, and it faces unresolved questions over how to store nuclear waste as existing plants close.

Allison Macfarlane became the agency's leader in July 2012 after the stormy tenure of former chair Gregory Jaczko, whose management style was described as bullying by fellow commissioners and staffers. A geologist, Macfarlane will start teaching Jan. 1 at George Washington University.

Macfarlane said the agency must follow through on changes required after the March 2011 crisis at the Fukushima Dai-ichi nuclear plant in Japan. Tsunami waves disabled the plant's electrical and cooling systems, causing a meltdown and explosions that flung debris and radiation into the environment.

"We as regulators need to do what we think is right," Macfarlane said in an interview during a nuclear industry conference in Atlanta. "And if we think something is required, and this is something we've learned as a result of the Fukushima accident, we need to tell the industry to do it."

Among the changes, the nuclear industry has set up centers in Memphis and Phoenix that can quickly send emergency gear to a stricken plant. Some plants will install vents meant to prevent explosions during extreme accidents. Regulators are reviewing updated earthquake and flooding hazard assessments for plants across the country.

The fundraiser with Wonder could give Landrieu's campaign a jolt of cash in the final days, as she struggles to combat attack ads from outside groups supporting Cassidy.

Google buys up Dutch wind energy for data center

AMSTERDAM (AP) — Google says it will buy the entire output of an 18-turbine, 62-megawatt Dutch wind energy project in the Netherlands to supply power to a major data center it is building.

Company officials said Tuesday that Google wants both price certainty and to ensure that the 600 million euro (\$750 million) data center in Eemshaven, Netherlands — due to be completed in 2017 — will be supplied by renewable energy from the start.

The wind project is also still under construction at nearby Delfzijl, with turbines both onshore and off the coast in the North Sea.

Google did not disclose terms but said it has signed a 10-year contract. The U.S. internet giant has inked similar deals in Finland and Sweden in the past two years.

Shell Nigeria denies it lied to Dutch court

LONDON (AP) — Shell Nigeria denies it lied to a Dutch court in The Hague about oil pollution in the Niger Delta.

The multinational company, half owned by Nigeria's government and with significant Dutch shareholding, says sabotage, not negligence, caused spills in 2004 along the Trans-Niger Pipeline that destroyed several hectares of mangrove forests and the livelihoods of residents of Goi village.

"We dismiss any suggestion that SPDC has knowingly continued to use a pipeline that is not safe to operate," a spokesperson for the Shell Petroleum Development Company of Nigeria Ltd told The Associated Press on Tuesday. Shell is preparing for the appeal hearing.

In a press statement released Monday, Friends of the Earth Netherlands alleged that

documents revealed this year in a British court show that Shell continued to pump oil through a corroded pipeline despite being warned in 2002 that it had exceeded its lifespan and needed to be replaced.



Brazil ex-billionaire on trial for insider trading

RIO DE JANEIRO (AP) — Eike Batista, the flamboyant Brazilian tycoon once named No. 7 on Forbes' list of the world's richest people, went on trial Tuesday in an insider trading case that could make him the first person in the country to go to prison on such charges.

The 58-year-old former billionaire who once reveled in the limelight made a now-rare public appearance with his arrival Tuesday at a federal criminal court in Rio de Janeiro.

It's the latest chapter in a vertiginous fall that saw Batista's estimated \$30 billion fortune evaporate over the past two years as his oil, mining, logistics and shipbuilding empire crumbled. Batista often used to say he hoped to dethrone Mexico's Carlos Slim to become the world's richest person, but now says he's \$1 billion in debt.

Batista faces market manipulation charges in the sales of shares in two of his companies, including the OGX oil exploration and production unit that filed for bankruptcy protection last year. If convicted, Batista faces fines and up to 13 years in prison, but experts say he could get a lighter sentence as a first-time defendant.

Dean Commissioner Brise,

There has been a lot of back and forth with regards to solar pilot programs that have expired. It seems that TECO, Duke and FPL all feel that energy efficiency costs per kWh saved are greater than what they can generate and sell a new kWh now. Let me state that most of the discussions center around Solar PV or the electric panels while you hear little if any on solar water heating systems.

It could be argued as it is, by the utility companies, that they are in fact, in business to generate electricity and make a return for their share holders. Ulike most companies, their rate of return or profit is limited to around 12 or 13% or as dictated by the PUC. So, on the one hand, you have to ask yourself, why does it make sense to ask utility companies to pay for programs that actually reduce their profit? In a real sense, it is like asking General Motors to pay for me to install energy efficiency improvements on my Chevy Truck to improve its fuel economy rating so I don't need to buy a new vehicle. The concept is ridiculous.

On the other hand, by virtue of being a monopoly and the unique guidelines that govern their operations, utility companies can actually be allowed to charge existing rate payers for the cost of building new power plants and generating capacity long before that new production is realized. This makes the case for looking at other strategies that have a lower impact on rates, the environment, and jobs creation. Of course, most people have no idea that some of their bill is covering these expenses so it is rarely questioned.

In my case, my company makes solar water heating equipment. This is a proven technology that offers significant benefits to the utility companies:

- 1. Storage. Unlike PV, Solar water heating has built in energy storage.
- 2. Not connected to the grid. This whole argument about the wealthy owners of solar systems being paid for on the backs of poor rate payers, simply does not apply to solar thermal since solar thermal water heating does not use the Utiltiy power lines, transformers or switch gear.
- 3. Back up element can be radio controlled. Due to the combination of storage and an electric back up element, utilities can remote control the backup element to turn it off when they experience periods of peak demand like on cold mornings in the winter. Solar thermal water heating can actually help the utility more effectively load level their output by allowing the backup elements to come on at say 4:00AM but cut them off at the peak times of around 5:30 to 6:00AM so that they do not have to run expensive peaking units. PV does not offer this benefit since it has no built in storage.
- 4. The cost per watt offset is greater than with a PV system. A 4x10 solar water heating panel, the most common size installed in Florida, has an approximate equivalent output of about 2100 watts. Most modern PV modules are in the 230 watt range.

Maybe a better strategy for Florida, would be to do what Hawaii has done and just require a solar water heating system on all new homes. This helps to kick the volume higher, lowers cost due to economies of scale, puts the cost of the system into the 30 year mortgage and since Florida does most residential water heating with electricity, will have a huge impact for the utility companies to mitigate new plant construction. This can be done without a utility rebate program. In addition, it has been estimated that 80% or more of Floridians, feel that the state needs to do more with Solar but feel it is too costly and no one wants to pay more on their utility bill to subsidize it.

Just so you know, while Florida lags behind California, New Jersey and now possibly New York in Solar PV, it ranks in the top 3 for solar water heating and has since the late 70's.

Finally, make no mistake, natural gas prices are not going to remain at the historically low figures that they are now forever and Florida is especially vulnerable to spikes and shortages. Look at the attached Boston Globe article that predicts electric rates will rise 37% this year for the North east. This is because the main gas line is not large enough to provide the volume of gas during peak demand events. Florida could have the same problem. Not long ago, FPL used to generate 50% of it's electricity from coal. Now, 70% from Natural gas. Duke just closed down the Crystal River Nuclear Station and will replace it with a gas unit. Consider that this gas comes from a hurricane prone area; the gulf coast. The issue of cost per kWh may be a secondary issue to being able to get power at all if we are hit with the storms we had back in 2003. Use of a technology like solar water heating that can actually store energy, can pull demand off the grid and allow more electricity to be used for more productive activities like running refrigerators for food and meds and oxygen machines for seniors.

Ask yourself, how will you respond in the town hall meetings when the utilities need to raise rates because gas went up and what did you do to mitigate tha

Dear Chairman Graham:

I respectfully urge you to side with Florida consumers and keep Florida's energy efficiency goals intact. The Florida Public Service Commission (FPSC) is one of the most important regulatory bodies in the entire state, affecting the daily lives of 19.5 million people and ensuring quality and affordable electricity. On July 24, I wrote to you and your fellow commissioners regarding the benefits of energy conservation, energy efficiency and renewable energy. I thank you for making my letter a part of the record in the "numeric conservation goals" proceedings. However, upon learning that FPSC staff recommended certain utilities' proposal to eviscerate their currently weak energy conservation goals by 90 percent for the next 10 years, I felt I had to again urge you and the Commission to side with hardworking Florida families and vote for meaningful energy efficiency goals.

Florida needs to adopt the greatest possible energy conservation, energy efficiency and renewable energy goals. Doing so would unleash a wave of innovation, investment and jobs. Carbon pollution not only causes climate change and its devastating impacts such as sea-level rise, but it causes health problems, as well.

Even though Florida has the potential to be the 3rd leading solar power producer in the country, it ranks 18th. Adopting greater use of energy conservation and renewable energy helps consumers save money on their electric bill, which gives them more resources to invest in other goods and services and creates American jobs. Energy efficiency boosts job creation in construction, weatherization, retrofits, manufacturing and installation of energy-efficiency equipment. According to the ACEEE, a more aggressive commitment to energy efficiency would yield significant economic benefits. ACEEE estimates that by 2050, significant investments in energy efficiency at the state and federal level could

benefit all parts of the economy, including the residential, commercial, industrial and transportation sectors. These efficiency investments would result in a net gain of almost 2 million jobs and save consumers an average of \$400 billion per year (or about \$2,600 per household).

The PSC's and utilities' elimination of energy conservation goals is extremely shortsighted, especially because it increases our dependence on natural gas. Florida relies on natural gas for over 62 percent of electricity generation. The average Florida household spends \$1,900 every year on electricity, 40 percent more than the U.S. average. As a peninsular state, Florida always faces the threat of hurricanes and natural disasters disrupting our natural gas delivery infrastructure. In this day and age of technological interdependence, we cannot afford to risk the loss of energy supplies as it leads to economic loss and could lead to the loss of life.

I urge you and your fellow commissioners to reject the utilities' request to eviscerate their already mild energy conservation standards by 90 percent. On November 25, you can help create jobs, reduce consumers' electricity bills, decrease pollution and diversify Florida's fuel mix by voting against the proposal. Instead, take a forward-looking step for Florida and examine an expansion of energy conservation to benefit consumers and the great state of Florida.

Our firm represents Florida Alliance for Renewable Energy and the Florida Solar Energy Industries Association. We believe that termination of the current solar program would be a setback for renewable energy in Florida and a strategic mistake for Florida utility policy. I note that solar energy plays an increasingly prominent role in regions which receive a fraction of the sunshine as Florida. Striking solar energy from the range of renewable options seems antithetical to sound utility, economic and environmental policy. All trends indicate that solar energy will be economically competitive and a critical component for achieving environmental standards. As you may know, the industry is on record of supporting a more efficient program, but it seems that the staff's response is to throw the proverbial "baby out with bath water." In this case, metaphor is fitting, as solar is in the relevant infancy compared to traditional "big electricity" options.

The better approach would appear to be to take a pro-active position to discern methods for fostering and implementing this non-polluting, jobs-creating option instead of wholly foreclosing it. Further, given that the PSC has sanctioned the development of expensive capital options such as nuclear energy, with which solar energy compares favorably in today's market, we submit that a sensible and efficient solar energy program should be part of our energy mix and Florida's future.

On behalf of the solar and renewable energy industry in Florida and the ratepayers who contribute to the Solar Pilot Programs we ask you **not** to terminate the solar pilot program and consider the following request:

- Reduce the incentive for January 2015 for Residential Solar PV to \$0.40
- Apply a similar reduction to the commercial solar PV program
- Require a MW goal
- Require a predictable declining incentive structure
- Maintain the current funding cap

Sighting the most recent Staff recommendations the installed solar photovoltaic prices have dropped in Florida to \$4.13/watt for the average residential solar system and lower for commercial. As compared to slightly over \$8.00/watt in 2009.

In 2009 the Florida Solar Coalition, an intervener in Docket 080407 suggested the following:

FSC (Florida Solar Coalition) suggests that annual support should continue for five years, and decrease every year to account for market development and reductions in technology costs.

At that time 25% of the installed cost per watt was subsidized by this program. This coming January if left unchanged the incentive will have actually increased to approximately 50% of the installed cost. Everything in the middle was purposefully over subsidized in order to promote the Utility argument toward the termination of this program - all at the expense of the ratepayers who provide them their guaranteed profits. The utilities could have avoided this by following the Florida Solar Coalitions recommendations in 2009 and followed a simple market price decline and the residential solar rebate would be approximately \$1.00/watt.

The Utilities have blatantly avoided a simple way of increasing the programs participation rates and it is time to require the utilities to lower the incentive amount for the 2015 program launch to \$0.50 cents per watt. This would positively impact promoting solar energy in Florida all while maintaining the funding cap established in order PSC-09-0855-FOF-EG. Though this appears to be a dramatic step downward in incentive, it signals to the ratepayers of Florida that solar energy should be considered, pricing has come down, the market is maturing and rebates do not and should not last forever. It also supports staffs favorable recommendation that Florida's Net-Metering rule is supportive of an incentive free solar market.

If the Commission believes this request is prudent and the best decision for ratepayers, participants and reasonable use of funds it would require the utilities to make the adjustment to the program prior to the January launch as part of the order on November 25th.

Regarding the future of the Solar Pilot Programs, we believe that they should have been designed to have a MW goal accompanied with a smooth transition to an incentive less market. We urge the Commission, rather than terminate the Solar Pilot Programs, extend them for 1 more year following the 2015 launch with a MW Goal combined with declining incentives as we approach zero incentives and the programs end.

Though it is not part of the mandate of the commission to consider these statistics we feel that it is important to note that the solar industry employs nearly 150,000 Americans and is growing every day. Every 3 and half minutes a new solar energy system is installed in the United States. These are well paying construction jobs that cannot be outsourced overseas. The sun provides Florida with stable energy that does not come from across our border. It is energy that is generated here in Florida using our most popular resource.

The Florida industry is not asking for overly rich subsidies to promote solar, but simply for a clear and stable business environment in which to operate. One that sends the appropriate signals to ratepayers - incentives that decrease over time, not increase. The utilities have ignored this request on all accounts which is why the staff was easily able to come to the conclusions to terminate the programs. We are now relying on you the Commissioners to heed our requests and enforce make sense policy for the ratepayers of Florida.

On behalf of the solar and renewable energy industry in Florida and the ratepayers who contribute to the Solar Pilot Programs we ask you **not** to terminate the solar pilot program and consider the following request:

- Reduce the incentive for January 2015 for Residential Solar PV to \$0.40
- Apply a similar reduction to the commercial solar PV program
- Require a MW goal
- Require a predictable declining incentive structure
- Maintain the current funding cap

Sighting the most recent Staff recommendations the installed solar photovoltaic prices have dropped in Florida to \$4.13/watt for the average residential solar system and lower for commercial. As compared to slightly over \$8.00/watt in 2009.

In 2009 the Florida Solar Coalition, an intervener in Docket 080407 suggested the following:

FSC (Florida Solar Coalition) suggests that annual support should continue for five years, and decrease every year to account for market development and reductions in technology costs.

At that time 25% of the installed cost per watt was subsidized by this program. This coming January if left unchanged the incentive will have actually increased to approximately 50% of the installed cost. Everything in the middle was purposefully over subsidized in order to promote the Utility argument toward the termination of this program - all at the expense of the ratepayers who provide them their guaranteed profits. The utilities could have avoided this by following the Florida Solar Coalitions recommendations in 2009 and followed a simple market price decline and the residential solar rebate would be approximately \$1.00/watt.

The Utilities have blatantly avoided a simple way of increasing the programs participation rates and it is time to require the utilities to lower the incentive amount for the 2015 program launch to \$0.50 cents per watt. This would positively impact promoting solar energy in Florida all while maintaining the funding cap established in order PSC-09-0855-FOF-EG. Though this appears to be a dramatic step downward in incentive, it signals to the ratepayers of Florida that solar energy should be considered, pricing has come down, the market is maturing and rebates do not and should not last forever. It

also supports staffs favorable recommendation that Florida's Net-Metering rule is supportive of an incentive free solar market.

If the Commission believes this request is prudent and the best decision for ratepayers, participants and reasonable use of funds it would require the utilities to make the adjustment to the program prior to the January launch as part of the order on November 25th.

Regarding the future of the Solar Pilot Programs, we believe that they should have been designed to have a MW goal accompanied with a smooth transition to an incentive less market. We urge the Commission, rather than terminate the Solar Pilot Programs, extend them for 1 more year following the 2015 launch with a MW Goal combined with declining incentives as we approach zero incentives and the programs end.

Though it is not part of the mandate of the commission to consider these statistics we feel that it is important to note that the solar industry employs nearly 150,000 Americans and is growing every day. Every 3 and half minutes a new solar energy system is installed in the United States. These are well paying construction jobs that cannot be outsourced overseas. The sun provides Florida with stable energy that does not come from across our border. It is energy that is generated here in Florida using our most popular resource.

The Florida industry is not asking for overly rich subsidies to promote solar, but simply for a clear and stable business environment in which to operate. One that sends the appropriate signals to ratepayers - incentives that decrease over time, not increase. The utilities have ignored this request on all accounts which is why the staff was easily able to come to the conclusions to terminate the programs. We are now relying on you the Commissioners to heed our requests and enforce make sense policy for the ratepayers of Florida.

Chairman Graham -

Those of us who have lived all or most our lives in Florida, as have I, realize the "Sunshine State" is largely a Chamber of Commerce notion when one finds that Florida is in the second quartile of annual insolation of the 50 states.

Nevertheless, being in the second quartile is significant, worthy of the State being much more creative and supportive of distributed solar electric generation, as is occurring in several states (e. g., New Jersey and Minnesota) of less solar resource than Florida.

Net metering has been characterized as the solar elite being subsidized by the non-solar masses. A few months ago economists with the Minnesota equivalent of the PSC debunked this subsidy perception, when all true values and all true costs of solar versus conventional generation are considered.

I look forward to the PSC adding renewed emphasis to the "Public" and the "Service" components of its name in

regard to the big picture of electric power production and usage in Florida.
