1	PROCEEDINGS
2	CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: We had the fun festive part
3	of the morning and now it's time to get town to the
4	work of the State.
5	Before we call the meeting to order, I would
6	ask if you would like to join for us the invocation
7	and the pledge. If you could stand, and Lisa Edgar
8	will give the invocation.
9	(Invocation and Pledge of Allegiance.)
10	CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Commissioner Edgar, thank
11	you very much for the invocation. As always, I am
12	always appreciative that my colleagues allow for us
13	to do that before the beginning of the meeting, and
14	especially this meeting, our last meeting before
15	the holidays, it always means a lot.
16	Before we get into the agenda, we have another
17	special occasion today, or what was that?
18	Bittersweet occasion. We have one of our one of
19	my fellow commissioners, this is his last meeting,
20	and before we get into the meeting, I wanted to
21	give him a little time to speak to you, to speak to
22	us and talk about his tenure here on the board.
23	Commissioner Balbis.
24	(Applause from the audience.)
25	COMMISSIONER BALBIS: Thank you, Mr. Chairman,

and thank you to my fellow commissioners for this opportunity to spend a brief bit of time kind of going over what I feel were some of the great accomplishments of this commission and also maybe have a little bit of fun at the end.

I am very proud of my past four years on this commission serving with my colleagues here. I reflected in the past few weeks on some of the things we accomplished, and some of them are very important and I believe that customers have benefited. And starting with the electric industry, just what have we accomplished? Well, over the past four years, we have seen a tremendous amount of investment in the utility infrastructure. We have seen over \$5 billion in plant production investment. We have seen over \$1 billion in transmission investments, and \$2.1 billion in distribution investments.

So what have customers benefited from this?

That's over \$8.3 billion in investments. We have much cleaner power plants and much cleaner omissions, see have seen our sulfur dioxide emissions reduced by almost 50 percent, our nitrogen dioxide emissions reduced by almost 45 percent, and mercury by 50 percent. Those are

dangerous greenhouse gasses and other pollutants
that have been eliminated, and the environment and
all Floridians are benefiting from that.

So what else have the customers received and the State received from these investments?

Increased reliability, that is something that is extremely important for the economy and for the quality of life for all Floridians. We measure, on an annual basis, different reliability metrics to see how utilities are doing. And from all of the spectrums, from our largest utility that has seen, Florida Power & Light that has a system average interruption indices, an improvement of 21 percent. On the smaller side, Gulf Power has shown a 35 percent improvement in reliability. This is shown system-wide. This helps the economy and helps Floridians.

We have accelerated investments in storm hardening so that, God forbid, a hurricane hits this state again and customers will be without power for hopefully a shorter period of time and get back to restoration and recovery.

Another item in the electric industry that I am very proud of, that is controversial but I think is important to point out, is the fact that we have

completed the largest nuclear project in recent
U.S. history with FPL's uprates of their reactors.

They have put on line over 520 megawatts of clean
burning nuclear energy. Customers will save over
\$3 billion in actual costs over the life of these
projects. And the very controversial advanced cost
recovery mechanism actually saved customers over
\$300 million in interest payments. Those are
savings and those are resulting in clean burning
electricity.

Some of the improvements in emissions that discussed didn't mention carbon dioxide, but that nuclear uprate projects -- those nuclear uprate projects are eliminating as much carbon as removing seven million vehicles from Florida roadways.

Those are benefits that need to be applauded, and this commission needs to be applauded, and FPL needs to be applauded.

One of the other important things we have accomplished in not only the electric industry, but all the industries, is created a stable regulatory environment. When at least four of us took office, perhaps things were not as stable, and it was mentioned by governors, by members of the nominating council and members of Senate And

confirmation committees. I believe we stabilized
the regulatory environment and customers have
benefited from this.

Standard & Poor's has upgraded all three of our largest electric utilities since 2010. What is more impressive is two of them enjoy a single A rating. So what is the benefit to customers?

Well, it's evident in the cost of capital. If you look at the reductions in cost of capital for each utility, it is very significant and important.

Florida Power & Light, since 2010, has seen their cost of capital reduced by 12 percent, Duke Energy, 11 percent, TECO 21 percent and Gulf Power 19 percent. That results in cost savings to customers and allows the utilities to access capital at a cheaper rate.

So that summarizes the electric industry, and moving on to the water and wastewater industry. We are still challenged by the many issues associated with this industry, large capital requirements, shrinking customer base and decreased consumption. But one thing that I am proud of that we have done in this commission is we have tried to stress the importance of quality of service, of improving customer relations, of eliminating the disconnect

that sometimes exists between the utilities and customers, so that customers know what they are paying for and can have choices as to whether or not they should pay for improvements that will increase and improve the water quality. We have had recent help from the Legislature, and we will be acting later today on rule implementations that will further assist us.

In the natural gas industry, which I have been very involved with and I am very proud of, I think we have had great strides and accomplishments. I have mentioned several times the accelerated replacement of bare steel and cast iron pipes.

Those are safety improvements that will help Floridians. We have over 47,000 miles of pipeline. We still have 1,600 miles left of unprotected bare steel and cast iron pipe, and I am glad this commission has approved these accelerated recovery mechanisms.

Another aspect of the natural gas industry that isn't talked about too much is the fact that although Florida has very little natural gas resources, we have actually become a leader in compressed natural gas facilities. With help from the Legislature and actions this commission

ascertain, we have gone from just having but a handful of compressed natural gas facilities in the state to having over 41 in operation today, over 12 of them having public access. We are seeing school buses, transit buses, sanitation trucks and even beer distribution trucks being converted to clean burning natural gas. And frankly, if you are not in favor of the more efficient delivery of ice cold beer, I don't think we can with friends.

On the telecommunications side, we have seen our jurisdiction decreased quite a bit since I took office this late 2010. However, we still are involved in wholesale transactions to make sure predatory pricing or noncompetitive issues are resolved. What I am very proud of is the fact that even though we have seen a tremendous increase in our lifeline participation of our Floridians, statistics show over 49 percent increase, and even with that increase, we have still been recognized as being a leader in reducing waste, fraud and abuse of that program that helps so many.

Those are just some of the accomplishments that I am proud of. There are many, many, many others. But I wanted to thank everyone here, and thank a few people that are in the audience here

1 today.

First of all I would like to thank my fellow Commissioners and I will thank each of you individually a little later, but I wanted to thank you for your thoughtful deliberation, the discussions, the respect that we have shown with each other, the patience of me clearing my throat over 300 times a meeting and me asking a question of every single witness.

To our Executive Director, Braulio Baez, thank you for your hard work and understanding. You understand what it is to sit in this seat and the needs and expectations we have. And I really am going to miss you coming into my office 45 seconds before a meeting and asking, are you good? Are you good?

To our General Counsel, Curt Kiser, thank you for our long and -- for your long and distinguished service to this state. You have taken steps and you have been involved with all of the accomplishments that I have listed and even before them. I am going to miss your obligatory commentary as to every single statute, who filed the bill, why it was developed, whether or not we asked you.

To our newest award recipient, Mary Ann

Helton, I am going to miss you being -- where did

she go? Where is she? Sorry. Usually you are

over there. Chairman Graham mentioned this, but I

am going to be to miss you being startled by him

asking your position on a surprise objection and

you having to ask, could you please repeat that

objection? And you always recover and always give

us great advice to make sure that everything we do

is legal.

To all of staff, a heartfelt thank you for all the hard work that you put into it. Thank you for dealing with the questions that I have asked during briefings, during agenda conferences, and thank you for the dedication that you have shown to the State. Without that, we cannot do our jobs, and I am very appreciative of it.

I would also like it thank the parties, the utilities, the intervenors. Without your hard work and dedication in providing the information and testimony that we need, again, we cannot make those decisions.

Hopefully at some point today I will be able to request a late file exhibit so John Moyle can object to it once again, but I am not sure we will

1 have that opportunity.

I would like to thank my advisers, Lisa

Bennett, Casey Hinton, Diana Caridad and John

Truitt. I think that I have had more advisers than

Commissioner Edgar has served with Commissioners,

and each one did an excellent job, and I am thank

foul full for their service.

I would like to thank my executive assistant, Christina Slaton, who has stuck with me these past four years, has put up with all of the issues and all of the things that you need to put up with in order to work with me. She has been tremendous, professional and a pleasure to work with.

And finally my fellow Commissioners, starting with Commissioner Brown. It has truly been a pleasure to work with you and the passion that you bring to this commission is palpable.

COMMISSIONER BROWN: You are funny.

COMMISSIONER BALBIS: I think that your experience with local government has certainly been a benefit to the Commission, and I have a few regrets, and one of them probably is I should have supported you on that motion in limine a few years ago. Her experience with contracts assures this commission that she will look very closely at every

single contract, and she will find the mistakes no matter how hard it is to see or even hear.

To Commissioner Brisé, I appreciate you diving into the issues of telecommunications. As exciting as ILECs and CLECs, and all the other acronyms are, you diving into it and being recognized nationally is a benefit to the Commission and this state, and I am sure you will continue to be involved and be recognized.

To Chairman Graham, I am certainly going to miss your detailed engineering drawings of lime sludge piles and what they represent, but I also am going to miss your leadership. That's one thing that you had mentioned previously, you are not afraid to make decisions, move things along and rule on issues, especially objections, that are quite difficult and complicated, and make sure that we operate efficiently and effectively.

And Commissioner Edgar, we spent some time a few weeks ago poking fun and roasting you a little bit, so I will refrain from that. But I have truly enjoyed working with you these past four years. I have learned quite a bit from you, not only how procedurally things should work, but also how to read your mannerisms, expressions and swift kicks

1 under the diocese.

It has been a pleasure serving these past four years. I want to thank Governor Scott and Governor Crist for appointing me to this position, for the Senate for confirming me and the nominating council. It has been a pleasure, and I am sad to go but I appreciate everyone that's here. Thank you.

(Applause from the audience.)

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Commissioner Balbis, you, as I said before, and several people have heard me say many, many times outside of this room, I refer to this commission as Team Florida, especially when we go outside of the state, and you have always been a very strong and very needed member of this team.

When we got here, as you said before, and several people said before, that one of the biggest drives -- one of the biggest tasks before us was to create a collegiate board, and no doubt about the fact that you added to that.

It's great to work with somebody else that actually has more college football knowledge than I do, which I think is fantastic. You are my go to guy for that stuff, you know, and can you believe this call, and what about this? But on top all

that, you know, because I am up here with attorneys
and legislators, and it actually feels good to
actually have somebody up here that speaks the same
language that I do being a nut fellow engineer, so
I am going to miss that very much, and I wish you
all the best in your future endeavors.

Commissioner Brisé.

COMMISSIONER BRISE: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

It's always a sad and bitter moment, I guess, to a certain degree when you see one of your colleagues moving on to something different, but we certainly wish and expect great things from you as you leave these walls. You know, people say, when you have children, you know, time just warps and you can actually see them grow up so quickly. Well, that's similar here, too, as a commissioner, and we have gotten to go through -- the four of us went through Senate confirmation together the first few months, and that was very

1 stressful, and we definitely all formed a bond 2 together. And Commissioner Edgar was a critical 3 component of that. 4 And, you know, Commissioner Balbis, you 5 alluded to it, but you started off, right from the 6 bat, never being reticent to ask anyone questions 7 about anything, even when it's midnight. Nope, we 8 know that Commissioner Balbis, he is going to ask 9 that question. 10 So we do appreciate it, though. You provide 11 our board, as a unit, you provide a such in-depth 12 analysis that really helps for a discussion among 13 So we are going to -- I mean, I am going to 14 miss you. They are going to miss you. Staff is 15 going to miss preparing all the additional 16 documentation for you. I know the parties are 17 going to miss that. 18 And we know -- I know that you are on to 19 greater, you know, and better things for you and 20 for your family. I wish you and your family, 21 Laura, Zac, Mark and Sarah, wish you guys the best 22 luck on your next journey. 23 CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Commissioner Edgar.
