CHAIRMAN BROWN: All right. And the last item is Item 10 before we adjourn today.

MR. ROME: Good morning, Commissioners. Don Rome with Commission staff.

Item 10 is a petition filed by St. Joe Natural Gas Company to restructure its rates to address a shortfall in revenues due to the permanent loss of its largest and only industrial customer, the Arizona Chemical Company. St. Joe is not requesting any changes to the total revenue requirement, operating expenses, rate base, or cost of capital that were approved in the company's last rate case proceeding in 2008. St. Joe seeks only to restructure its gas delivery charges to reallocate the revenue deficiency from the loss of Arizona proportionately among the remaining customer The proposed restructured rates are intended classes. to recover no more revenues than were approved in St. Joe's 2008 rate case. The typical monthly bill impacts to St. Joe's three residential customer rate schedules would range from \$4.73 to \$6.97, depending upon the customer size and based on annual therm usage.

Staff conducted a customer meeting in Port St.

Joe on April 11th, 2016, at which time three customers

provided comments for the record. Other than the

comments provided at the customer meeting, staff is not aware of any customer correspondence or complaints regarding this docket.

Based on staff's review of the 2008 rate case proceedings and the information provided in this docket, St. Joe's proposed rate restructuring appears to be reasonable and staff recommends approval. St. Joe also is represented here today in the event that there are any questions.

CHAIRMAN BROWN: Thank you, Mr. Rome.

Mr. May, good morning.

MR. MAY: Good morning, Madam Chair,

Commissioners. Bruce May with the law firm of Holland &

Knight. We support staff's recommendation. The

president of St. Joe Natural Gas, Stuart Shoaf, and the

vice president, Andy Shoaf, are both here to answer any

questions. We really don't have any formal presentation

except to say in light of the last agenda item, I do

think it's important for us to convey to you that in

this particular unique situation, St. Joe Natural Gas is

not requesting any rate case expense as part of this

limited proceeding, so.

CHAIRMAN BROWN: Thank you, and it is very relevant.

So, Mr. Shoaf, the Shoafs are father, son?

MR. STUART SHOAF: Yes.

CHAIRMAN BROWN: Great. Thank you for being here today.

MR. STUART SHOAF: Good morning.

CHAIRMAN BROWN: Good morning. I appreciate you coming up with a rate restructuring rather than a full-blown rate case. But with that in mind, I'm curious about what you all are doing since 2009 to attract a new replacement industrial customer, commercial customer comparable to Arizona.

MR. STUART SHOAF: The -- in Port St. Joe,
we're -- as you know, it's a fairly small town,
2,500 population. The county is 15,000, been that for
the last 20 years. We're somewhat landlocked with
Tyndall Air Force to the west and Apalachicola, I guess,
on the east. We're also surrounded by property owned by
the former St. Joe Company, and now the Mormon Church
has acquired quite a bit of it. So there's not an awful
lot of available land for a large industry to come in.
But the efforts we make in trying to add a new large
industrial customer being that we maintain an open
relationship with the Economic Development Council. I
actually served on it a number of years ago. We stay in
touch with them. Of course, all of the prospects they
get are usually code named and you can't really find out

a whole lot about it, although that organization does routinely contact the gas company to make sure they have our current pipeline size, pressures, available capacity and those sort of things. And we do stay in touch with the EDC about that, making sure they know that -- what natural gas is available for potential new customers.

We also -- as far as the residential and commercial, we constantly pull the new permit applications at the courthouse and follow up on all of the new construction and that sort of thing. And so we make every effort to bill low, particularly in our residential and commercial. As far as the industrial, those are a lot more difficult to penetrate, but we do pay attention to it. We actually have -- currently have a prospect that's been visiting with us for the last six months about a potential large use of gas that they've been in our office multiple times, we've met and always accommodated them, provided everything they've asked for. We've put them in touch with the pipeline and also the gas marketers and try to educate them on what it takes to do the gas side of their plan. So in conclusion, I guess, we do all that we're capable of doing. We're a pretty small company.

CHAIRMAN BROWN: Yeah. Is it realistic to get a comparable replacement?

MR. STUART SHOAF: Well, it -- only in that 1 the new technologies, as I understand it, that have come 2 3 along in the LNG market have opened up a few new opportunities. But I think there are an awful lot of 4 folks around, not just Florida, but the country, that 5 are trying to get into that market, and I think they're 6 7 all -- I think the pipeline told me one out of five makes it. Most of them don't. There are a lot of 8 9 people trying to do it. We have a port authority in 10 St. Joe that's been in its infancy for 20 years, and 11 they're trying to get things started with the port 12 authority. We're in close connection with that. 13 Actually my other son is on that board, so we've got to keep up with what they're doing.

MR. STUART SHOAF: And we do all that we can in our circumstances to try to bring in a large and industrial load. So there's not a whole lot, though, that we can do other than what I've mentioned.

CHAIRMAN BROWN: I appreciate you coming here today and telling us that and getting a better perspective of the situation, and also the fact that you didn't come in for a full-blown rate case. That's --

MR. STUART SHOAF: We try to keep our rates Contrary to a lot of opinion, we want them low, we

1	like them low, and we do everything we can to keep them
2	low.
3	CHAIRMAN BROWN: Thank you very much.
4	Commissioners, any other comments or
5	questions?
6	Ready for a motion.
7	COMMISSIONER GRAHAM: Move staff.
8	COMMISSIONER EDGAR: Second.
