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1. Please explain and provide support for the statement that Gulf's economic development efforts supported 14,000 jobs.

RESPONSE:

Gulf Power's economic development initiatives, along with its support of Enterprise Florida, Inc., Florida's Great Northwest, and regional and local economic development organizations played a significant role in companies' decisions to create approximately 14,000 jobs in Northwest Florida. Gulf Power has developed various processes and programs in support of its economic development efforts including, hosting a website for business attraction and expansion, a small business website portal, research and technical support, corporate recruitment missions, trade show missions, conducting an existing business retention program, economic development incentives for new and expanding businesses, economic development training for state, regional and local partners, and other industry standard economic development tools.

The listing below provides yearly documentation of fifty-nine business announcements resulting in the pledge to create approximately 14,000 new jobs in Northwest Florida. Gulf Power was directly involved in many of these projects. Gulf Power's involvement included meeting one-on-one with members of the project teams, research assistance to provide information requested by prospects in order to aid their decision-making processes, assisting with prospect visits to Northwest Florida, coordinating and participating in meetings related to incentive negotiations, and providing workforce solutions to prospects that demonstrate Northwest Florida can meet their hiring requirements. Many of the projects also benefitted from Gulf's investment in its Florida First Sites program, investments in regional and local economic development organizations, and research assistance provided by the Company.

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3. Please clarify over what time period the 59 new and expanding businesses are expected to produce an economic impact of more than \$1.2 billion.

RESPONSE:

Gulf, like all other investor-owned utilities in the State of Florida, records announcements of business creation and expansions in the month in which the announcement occurs. It can take months, or in some cases years, following an announcement for a business to construct new facilities, test new equipment and attract and hire new employees. Many of the projects identified in response to Item No. 1 above have been completed. Other projects are still in process. While Gulf Power does not routinely track the status of each and every project identified, the Company can state with confidence that the direct capital investment associated with 59 identified projects will exceed \$1.2 billion as the announced expansions at Navy Federal's facility will result in a direct investment in excess of \$1.0 billion, once the campus in completed. The campus is approximately 75 percent complete today, with approximately 6,200 professionals employed at the campus. The remaining portions of the campus which are currently under construction will be complete in 2021. Once completed, Navy Federal will employ 10,000 professionals at the campus.
