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1	PROCEEDINGS
2	CHAIRMAN CLARK: Good morning. We're going to
3	go ahead and get started this morning, try to get
4	this thing kicked off. Before we begin, I would
5	like to take the opportunity to open our meeting
6	with a short invocation. For those of you that are
7	here, in the audience, would like to stand with me,
8	please, we'll have a moment of prayer.
9	(Invocation given.)
10	CHAIRMAN CLARK: Thank you. You may be
11	seated.
12	Again, it's certainly good to have everyone
13	here with us today. We have kind of another
14	limited crowd, but I know there are a lot of folks
15	online that are joining us this morning.
16	We're going to try to make our way through the
17	agenda, taking all of the necessary precautions,
18	making sure everyone that would like to speak is
19	given an opportunity to be heard.
20	And good morning to my fellow Commissioners.
21	Commissioner Graham, you've changed on me there
22	since I looked down last. Looking more like your
23	normal self there.
24	Certainly good to see each of you as well.
25	Look forward to the opportunity when we can all be

1	back together, I guess, kind of in a normal
2	setting.
3	We're going to call the meeting to order. And
4	I'm going to ask Mr. Mark Futrell, if he will, to
5	introduce the first item.
6	MR. FUTRELL: Good morning, Mr. Chairman,
7	Commissioners. I'm Mark Futrell with the staff.
8	The item on this morning's special agenda
9	concerns the petitions filed by Tampa Electric
10	Company, Florida Power & Light Company, Gulf Power
11	Company, and Duke Energy Florida.
12	These utilities request Commission approval of
13	mid-course corrections to fuel and capacity cost
14	recovery in order to recognize an expected
15	reduction in these costs in 2020 compared to
16	projections made in 2019.
17	The fuel and purchase power cost-recovery
18	clause hearing is held annually. And mid-course
19	corrections may be used by the Commission between
20	hearings if these costs deviate from revenues by a
21	significant margin.
22	Any over-recovery or under-recovery of costs
23	resulting from an adjustment to fuel fac rates
24	or factors as part of a mid-course correction would
25	be subject to Commission review during the hearing

in November.

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In this instance, the currently-projected price of natural gas has declined significantly relative to the projected price of gas embedded in the current fuel rates or factors charged by each of the four utilities.

The utilities are requesting approval to temporarily reduce the expected fuel and capacity charges to customers. While the specific methodologies vary by utility, each is requesting approval to accelerate flowing the projected over-recovery of fuel and capacity costs to their respective customers.

The standard approach for mid-course corrections is to spread the total amount equally over the remaining months in the year; however, the utilities are proposing to flow all or the majority the projected over-recovery to customers in one- or three-month periods.

The staff recommends approval of these methodologies, given the unique circumstances of our times, as these actions will aid in mitigating the adverse economic conditions customers are facing as a result of the pandemic.

The utilities and other parties are available

1	to address the Commission. Staff is available to
2	answer questions.
3	CHAIRMAN CLARK: Thank you, Mr. Futrell.
4	Okay. I'm going to go through the list of
5	participants and see if anyone has any comments
6	they would like to make specifically. Then we will
7	open it up to interested parties, for anyone that's
8	on the line that has comment. Then we will come to
9	individual Commissioners, give you an opportunity
10	to ask your questions.
11	We do have staff available. We have legal and
12	technical staff both available for any of your
13	questions this morning, both on the line and in the
14	room. So, we will address those issues and
15	concerns.
16	Then, at that point, we will call for the
17	motion and discussion from that point on.
18	So, with that said, let me go through my list
19	real quick. Florida Power & Light, any comment?
20	Ms. Moncada.
21	MS. MONCADA: Good morning, Commissioners,
22	Mr. Chairman. Yes, Florida Power & Light has a
23	comment. And for the sake of expediency, I will be
24	speaking for both Gulf Power and FPL, if that is
25	okay with the Commission.

1	CHAIRMAN CLARK: Absolutely.
2	MS. MONCADA: Thank you. We appreciate the
3	opportunity to address you about this important
4	matter this morning.
5	FPL and Gulf supports staff's recommendation
6	to approve our respective petitions for a mid-
7	course correction. And before going any further, I
8	would like to thank the Commission as well as your
9	staff for moving so quickly on our filing and for
10	bringing it to this special agenda to allow us to
11	implement the significant rate relief for our
12	customers in the May billing cycle. We also
13	applaud the other IOUs that have filed for mid-
14	course correction.
15	As Mr. Futrell so eloquently pointed out,
16	these these are unique times. We are not living
17	under ordinary circumstances. The COVID-19
18	pandemic has presented challenges and substantial
19	limitations in the manner in which we all live, the
20	way we work, the way we play and interact with one
21	another. And this morning's hearing is an example
22	of that.
23	Social distancing also has had economic
24	-quences economic consequences, as Mr. Futrell
25	also pointed out. And that has impacted many of

1 our customers.

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During this time, job one for FPL and Gulf, when it comes to our customers, has been to keep the lights on. And, as active members of the communities that we serve, we also have chosen to do something about the economic impact that so many of our customers currently are experiencing due to this pandemic. It is to that end that we ask for your approval to reduce rates for the month of May through these mid-course corrections.

And also, as Mr. Futrell -- Futrell pointed out, we understand that the Commission typically flows the over-recoveries -- and, in some instances, they're under-recoveries or over-recoveries -- but they flow them back to customers over the remainder of the calendar year, but we do believe this is an isolated exception and that it's warranted by the extraordinary circumstances surrounding the COVID-19 pandemic.

If these petitions for mid-course corrections are approved, our customers will experience onetime bill reductions that are substantial. And this is applicable to all of our customers, from residential to small business, includes governmental entities, hospitals, and even up to

1	the largest industrial users. The reduction would
2	appear on their May bill, when so many of our
3	customers need the cash infusion the most.
4	Thank you, Mr. Chairman and Commissioners.
5	And we are available to answer any questions.
6	CHAIRMAN CLARK: Thank you, Ms. Moncada.
7	TECO, Mr. Wahlen.
8	MR. WAHLEN: Good morning, Commissioners.
9	It's Jeff Wahlen for Tampa Electric Company.
10	Penelope Rusk is also on the phone.
11	We support the staff's recommendation and
12	appreciate the work of the staff and the Commission
13	in bringing this matter up for a decision today.
14	And we're available to answer any questions, if the
15	Commissioners have any.
16	Thank you.
17	CHAIRMAN CLARK: Thank you, sir.
18	Duke Energy, Mr. Bernier.
19	MR. BERNIER: Good morning, Mr. Chairman. We
20	also support staff's recommendation. And we also
21	appreciate the speed with which staff was able to
22	move this forward and the Commission's willingness
23	to consider this as a special agenda.
24	Myself and Mr. Menendez are available, should
25	there be any questions, but thank you very much.

1 CHAIRMAN CLARK: Thank you, sir. 2. All right. OPC -- Mr. Kelly or Mr. Rehwinkel, 3 are you on the line? 4 MR. KELLY: Yes, sir, Mr. Chairman, we're on 5 the line. 6 CHAIRMAN CLARK: Okay. 7 MR. KELLY: But we -- we have -- we don't have 8 any comments at this time. 9 CHAIRMAN CLARK: Thank you very much, sir. 10 PCS, Mr. Brew. 11 MR. BREW: Yes, thank you very much. We don't 12 have any questions at this time. 13 CHAIRMAN CLARK: Thank you. 14 FIPUG, Mr. Moyle. 15 Thank you, Mr. Chairman. MR. MOYLE: We iust 16 have a brief comment to make, which is that we are 17 appreciative of the utilities flowing back these 18 monies and particularly during these -- these tough 19 times. 20 We also appreciate the fact that the utilities 21 are no longer hedging and, if they had been, the 22 monies flowing back would have been reduced 23 significantly by the cost of hedges. So, we think 24 it's a good day for consumers, including industrial 25 consumers.

1	Those are all the comments we have.
2	CHAIRMAN CLARK: Thank you, Mr. Moyle.
3	All right. Commissioners, the floor is open
4	for any questions or any discussion that you guys
5	would like to have. Any Commissioners any
6	questions? Discussion? Comments?
7	COMMISSIONER BROWN: Mr. Chairman?
8	CHAIRMAN CLARK: Commissioner Brown.
9	COMMISSIONER BROWN: Thank you. I do have
10	just a comment I want to make.
11	You know, this is truly a no-brainer for me,
12	quite frankly. And I appreciate the IOUs taking an
13	early initiative to help their customers in such a
14	time of need.
15	Without a Commission directive, as is the case
16	in so many other states, whether it's a one-time
17	lump sum of release, as proposed, or a gradual
18	flow-back to customers, this is a tremendous public
19	benefit.
20	I also want to mention that I appreciate the
21	utilities actively managing their fuel contracts to
22	keep costs low for their customers, and reemphasize
23	my gratitude for being in the position we are today
24	so expendiently.
25	Finally, I want to thank many of the companies

	1	for their pro-consumer action they've taken early
	2	on, whether it's an affirmative decree not to
	3	disconnect for failure of payment or waiving late
	4	fees or even contributions to local community non-
	5	profits, as is the case of so many.
	6	There's really been just an exemplary action
	7	by the companies helping pay for housing and
	8	utility costs to those in need. And I appreciate
	9	the humanitarian effort during this difficult time.
	10	CHAIRMAN CLARK: Thank you, Commissioner
	11	Brown.
	12	Commissioner Polmann.
	13	COMMISSIONER POLMANN: Thank you,
	14	Mr. Chairman.
	15	Commissioner Brown said so many of the things
	16	that I appreciate as well. I think she spoke very
	17	eloquently to actions that the utilities have
	18	have taken. And I am very appreciative as well.
	19	Let me simply add that, although the mid-
	20	course correction is a manner a matter that can
	21	arise annually, taking this action now, in the
	22	extraordinary fashion that we're addressing
	23	today it simply makes sense under the current
	24	circumstances. It's the right thing to do for the
	25	customers. And I certainly do find it to be in the
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1	public interest in general.
2	I I applaud the effort and I do appreciate
3	the staff and Public Counsel and all the attendant
4	parties working together on this. I think it is a
5	very significant move and I would I would
6	support all of the issues.
7	Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
8	CHAIRMAN CLARK: Thank you, Commissioner
9	Polmann.
10	Commissioner Graham.
11	COMMISSIONER GRAHAM: Ditto.
12	CHAIRMAN CLARK: Thank you, Commissioner
13	Graham.
14	Commissioner Fay, any comments?
15	COMMISSIONER FAY: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
16	Just one quick question and then a comment.
17	I and I think the question is directed at
18	staff. Ms. Moncada mentioned that all of the
19	consumers will feel the impact of this reduction.
20	I know there are some consumers who are on what's
21	referred to as budget billing.
22	And so, I just want to check really quick that
23	that this adjustment, depending on the time line
24	for the which utility filed it, would still
25	apply to those consumers.

1	CHAIRMAN CLARK: I'll let Mr. Futrell answer
2	that.
3	Mark?
4	MR. FUTRELL: Yes, Chairman and Commissioner
5	Fay, I believe Mr. Tripp Coston with the staff has
6	done some research on that.
7	And and Tripp, if you would, respond to
8	that question, please.
9	MR. COSTON: Yes, this is Tripp Coston with
10	staff.
11	Commissioner Fay, I have confirmed with each
12	of the utilities involved in this particular docket
13	that the customers who have participated in the
14	budget-billing tariff will receive the same benefit
15	and the same credit that all the customers will
16	receive in that particular rate class.
17	They will experience how they benefit from
18	that particular or this particular reduction a
19	little differently. Based on the budget-billing
20	process, that particular credit, the credit that
21	may be received by those customers, will be spread
22	out over the budget-billing-calculation period.
23	So, instead of seeing a one-month reduction, they
24	will see that credit over a period of between three
25	and 12 months, depending on the budget-billing

1	cycle for that particular customer.
2	COMMISSIONER FAY: Okay. Great. That
3	appreciate the answer.
4	And then the the quick comment that I
5	had I also want to thank staff, but also thank
6	our Chair. I think when we were working on storm-
7	hardening rules, I made a comment about the speed
8	at which the Commission was able to to look at
9	those rules and move them forward.
10	The speed at which these petitions, the
11	recommendations, and this hearing were set up was
12	extremely impressive. And so, I appreciate the
13	staff, Chair, and the other Commissioners for
14	making this work.
15	That's all I have, Mr. Chair. Thank you.
16	CHAIRMAN CLARK: Thank you, Commissioner Fay.
17	Thank you to all the Commissioners for your
18	comments.
19	I will just echo that these unusual and
20	difficult times call for unusual and difficult
21	measures. And I want to just say thank you, again,
22	to the all of the parties that have stepped up
23	to the plate and are doing their part to try to
24	ease some of the pain that the consumers are
25	feeling out there.

1	I think this is a very strategic move on
2	behalf of the utility companies and I applaud you
3	for your efforts. And thank you, Commissioners,
4	for you and your staff's work during this
5	particular time.
6	With that said, I will call for a motion on
7	the items.
8	Commissioner Brown, you're recognized for a
9	motion.
10	COMMISSIONER BROWN: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
11	Move to approve all issues in this matter.
12	CHAIRMAN CLARK: Do I have a second?
13	COMMISSIONER GRAHAM: Second.
14	CHAIRMAN CLARK: I have a motion and a second
15	to approve staff recommendation on all items in
16	this docket. Is there any discussion or questions?
17	On the motion, by roll-call vote, Commissioner
18	Brown.
19	COMMISSIONER BROWN: Aye.
20	CHAIRMAN CLARK: Commissioner Polmann.
21	COMMISSIONER POLMANN: Aye.
22	CHAIRMAN CLARK: Commissioner Graham.
23	COMMISSIONER GRAHAM: Aye.
24	CHAIRMAN CLARK: Commissioner Fay.
25	COMMISSIONER FAY: Aye.
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               CHAIRMAN CLARK: All right. The motion is
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          approved unanimously.
