Dear Chairman Art Graham,

I urge the Florida PSC to maintain its current full 1 to 1 true net metering for residential, commercial, and industrial customers. Non solar customers do not "subsidize" solar customers. In fact, solar customers are subsidizing non-solar customers. These customers are not commercial power producers. They are no more than customers minimizing energy usage behind their meter such as installing energy efficient appliances. How is it fair that a customer that uses less energy is to be charged more for using less energy. Any excess power produced and returned to the grid is sold by the utility at retail price just down the grid. In fact such power addition adds benefits to the utility, saving the need for power production by the utility, power growth needs, grid power and power frequency stabilization, and significant environmental benefits of reduced pollution, power generation diversity, decentralization of power production, and American freedom. Utilities are supposed to serve the public desires and needs, not the other way around. Solar is less expensive; provides for more jobs, businesses, and industry; addresses climate change; and reduces pollution improving health and well being. The PSC should be requiring this of utilities, not bowing to utility pressure for increasing their profits. The PSC should be looking to the future. If utilities are serious about cost shifting and subsidizing, they should look to correcting their block rate structures. The PSC should be requiring utilities to address the inequities of block rates rather than a false concern for non-solar customers supposedly subsidizing solar customers.
