Dear Florida PSC PSC,

We are in the middle of a pandemic with unemployment rampant in our state. Right now, Floridians need help making ends meet paying day-to-day expenses, including rising healthcare costs and prescription drug prices, as well as increasing rents and food costs.

What Floridians do not need now is to pay for services that benefits no more than 5 percent of ratepayers.

We don't mind companies making a profit but for an electric company, in our case, FP&L included, who will make an estimated \$12 billion in profits after Florida electric customers pay \$40 billion for implementation of their proposed plans is reckless and poorly planned out.

All customers should not be forced to subsidize a few customers who will experience shorter storm-related outages. For example, only 4% of FPL's residential customers and only 5% of Duke Energy's customers will have their overhead power lines underground.

In addition, the SPPs are not strategic. They are not well thought out long term for several reasons including that they do not consider any modern options for reducing grid dependence, such as: solar, batteries, or a more decentralized electricity system.

We don't appreciate state mandated monopolies' bad corporate citizenry who don't even follow their own rules, i.e. none of the SPPs complied with the PSC's own Rules (25-6-030) for such plans.
