I am writing to ask you to preserve Florida's Net Metering policies that encourage residential and commercial investment in solar and storage. I have recently invested in a 7.5 kw residential PV system with two Tesla Powerwalls. This system has only been online for a month and has already provided seamless backup power through 16 grid power interruptions adding up to 2 hours. When I produce more than I consume, I save the utility money by exporting power back to the grid so my nearby neighbors can use it without having to endure generation and transmission line costs.
