Dear Commissioners,

I am a homeowner on the island and just recently acquired an adjoining lot to build another home, both for our family's use. We understand that FPSC denied a certificated service area for Environmental Utilities. If I understand correctly, the reason for denial was that no one requested wastewater service.

I, along with my father, previously submitted emails as part of this process and our emails were in support of wastewater service to be brought to the island, which is vitally necessary. The water quality in the Gulf of Mexico and the bay have deteriorated significantly in the last 40 years since I have been visiting the island (typically 25-30 times per year).

The popularity of the island for vacationers has also skyrocketed the last 10 to 15 years which is putting even more septic tank runoff into the surrounding waterways. It is unfortunately commonplace to see in the bay floating items which look like sewage, and although while it may not technically be sewage, I definitely feel that it is a direct result of septic tank runoff.

To be clear, we are requesting wastewater service for both of our properties on Little Gasparilla Island.
