To whom it may concern,

I am the daughter of homeowners (John and Joann Adler) on Palm Island (250 N. Gulf Blvd, 33946) since 1980. My parents also own 231 and 260 N. Guld Blvd. The home/property has an established trust to my sister and me. I have durable power of attorney on my father's affairs including anything to do with these properties (if you need evidence of this please let me know and I can email a scanned copy). On behalf of my family, I am addressing the issue (as my father did in the past) to the idea of Environmental Utilities, LLC (EU) putting in a system on Palm Island. This is a "for profit" company which is unacceptable since what is currently in place (septic systems) work for those that maintain them.

A vast majority of the islanders with whom we have spoken oppose this private sewer system especially after Helene and Milton have destroyed the island. We are still attempting to rebuild and the costs are astronomical this should not be another stress on our community.

I was there in early October to assist with Hurricane Helene cleanup and then evacuated my parents 80+ year old parents to safety up north. Our septic was fine then and we went back after Milton and it was fine then too. There is no need for an EU private sewer. We properly maintain our septic as do most other homeowners on the island so there is no need for a privately-owned, <u>for-profit</u> system to be installed. It is absolutely ridiculous that it is brought up again while most of us our hurting and struggling. It is unconscionable.

My husband, (Michael Boland) owns industrial engineering distribution companies that manage the southeast (including Kentucky/Indiana/ Tennessee/Georgia,/Alabama/Florida) that sell a multitude of pneumatics and pumps including those to wastewater plants. From an environmental/engineering aspect he thinks it is unnecessary/hazardous for a multitude of reasons:

- i. Being at sea level will not only create a significant danger due to a breakage and more deterioration to a line thus creating more expense to repair/replace for the home owner. After Hurricane Milton we saw the literal tons of sand and damage created and for something at sea level I/he would like to see the engineers' plans for how it could be built deep enough to maintain the weight of the water and sand we incurred from Milton.
- ii. Septic systems are also environmentally good when properly maintained. Septic systems require far less infrastructure than city sewers. They use less energy than municipal treatment plants and very rarely rely on chemicals to remove wastewater pollutants. Septic systems are systems designed to conserve the local water supplies in an environment like Palm Island and Don Pedro Island. Moreover, septic systems create a groundwater effect that reinvigorates the soil and vegetation water supply.
- iii. If you can provide a report that the water quality would be better with a sewer from another barrier island we would like to request that. It is unlikely you will find one based on a significant numbers of samples.

Next there is the legality of it all:

1. We would be forced to give up easements and rights of way, pay for permits, etc. It is not yet the time have our attorney look into it but I will should it come to that.

Lastly, but most importantly, on Palm Island there is a contingent of my family members and friends enjoy our time there and contribute to the local economy and the majority of them are residents of Charlotte County. I spent every summer there from 1981-1989; and then went to college, got married and bought my children there. My youngest daughter 20 is now vacationing there with her boyfriend (and they have helped with some lan clean up). Dear Commissioners,

I was unable to make it in person to the meeting on January 28, 2025 but watched/listened (and again for approximately 3.5 hours today, January 29, 2025). The meeting on January 28, 2025 started at 5:30 PM EST at which point I tuned into the link to ensure my feed would display sound and video properly (only to discover it was starting); the meeting was started earlier than announced. There were a significant number of residences and owners against it that could not make it due to work schedules. Courtesy copied are those in my closest circle that are homeowners/have ties to the island (blind copied are those who do not know I am sending this to you). You need to deny EU from building this sewer system. We have my our septic system pumped every couple of years (by SOS Septic) and we are there about 7 days a month at max (for two of us). Our septic was intact after Ian, Helene and Milton; despite Milton washing away the complete underside our family home (tool and golf cart shed-probably about \$30K worth of tools and golf cart etc;). In addition, we had pipes broken under the house for which we were fortunate enough to have complete strangers post on FB about the leak the next day and shut off the water for us (Linda Cotherman). I have never met her in person but I owe her a lot. Our septic tank was never breached in all three storms.

We support local businesses/contactors, get our permits, pay property taxes and vote.

Below was my first letter sent on September 2, 2024. The second letter (attached) was emailed on December 15, 2024.

We strongly oppose the sewer.

I am the daughter of homeowners (John and Joann Adler) on Palm Island (250 N. Gulf Blvd, 33946) since 1980. My parents also own 231 and 260 N. Guld Blvd. The home/property has an established trust to my sister and me.

On behalf of my family, I am addressing the issue (as my father did in the past) to the idea of Environmental Utilities, LLC (EU) putting in a system on Palm Island. This is a "for profit" company which is unacceptable since what is currently in place (septic systems) work for those that maintain them and would be an undue burden on the homeowners that have supported the economy for decades.

One week after Hurricane Ian my husband and I drove from Louisville, KY to the island with a trailer full of supplies (4 generators, chainsaws, a giant cooler with food and cases of water). This island means everything to our family and should you choose to believe the homeowners are able to pay another \$40,000 per lot after the expenses associated with rebuilding from Hurricane Ian that just says you are not interested in the value of the commodity of those willing to pitch in on the island. In our case this would cost us is \$120,000. We support local companies with reconstruction of our property, restaurants, Ace Hardware, Publix; those were the first four that came to mind and I could go on I am not citing the names of those they really benefited from Hurricane Ian, which included construction, landscaping, and roof replacement; we paid out of pocket and we paid our bills on time (and have loans).

We already invested over \$300K for repairs from Hurricane Ian. We are asking that you have some mercy and at least to postpone this until we have time to recover. We are paying loans off for the emergency money we needed to restore our family's home that my father built in 1980.

My husband, (Michael Boland) owns industrial engineering distribution companies that manage the southeast (including Kentucky/Indiana/ Tennessee/Georgia,/Alabama/Florida) that sell a multitude of pneumatics and pumps including those to wastewater plants. He works on project like these. He works with the core of engineers in the state of KY on the Ohio River Valley. He understands the fragility of the environment.

- i. Being at sea level will not only create a significant danger due to a breakage and more deterioration to a line thus creating more expense to repair/replace for the home owner. In some cities there are insurance policies for protection but we have seen how those have played out over Hurricane Ian. Long and short you are increasing more risk to the homeowner than necessary.
- ii. Septic systems are also environmentally good when properly maintained. Septic systems require far less infrastructure than city sewers. They use less energy than municipal treatment plants and very rarely rely on chemicals to remove wastewater

My name is Paul Sarofim and I own 9254 Little Gasparilla Island, which is within the proposed sewer service area for Little Gasparilla Island. I am formally requesting that you please reconsider Charlotte County's support of EU's PSC sewer application.

The proposed connection charges for the sewer system is estimated "starting" at \$30,000, which is the cost for implementation per household is an estimate on the mainland; which means that cost will double since we are on a barrier island.

The proposed monthly sewer charges are VERY high compared to other utility rates. For the residents of Little Gasparilla Island, we already pay high monthly rates for the water system. I currently pay around \$100 per month for water with little water usage. Adding the proposed monthly sewer charges would bring the monthly water and sewer charges to over \$250 a month which is a ridiculous monthly charge for water and sewer compared to other local utilities, especially with a 10-20% usage at our vacation property.

With the 300 +/- homes on LGI, most being vacation rentals, I would assume that usage would be <50% of normal usage, thus the lack of need for a central sewer system, especially one being implemented by EU.

Please understand that everyone I know on LGI is extremely opposed to EU bringing sewer to our island. To say that the island does not oppose the EU application is a gross misstatement. I know the amount of people that are there in person to oppose this is only a fraction, as I know 5 households that cannot make the hearing in opposition, and are having to send emails stating their opposition.

Hello Commissioners:

Thank you for giving us the opportunity to address a concern that is becoming more and more common in our communities: the idea of for-profit private sewer systems, specifically the proposed installation of a low-pressure sewer (LPS) system by Mr. Jack Boyer dba Environmental Utilities LLC on Palm Island. We have firsthand knowledge of installing a new sewer system and removing a perfectly fine septic system. The new sewers were implemented by the County we were living in about 30 years ago, the County helped offset the costs of installation with grants and 0% interest loans. The disruption to our daily lives due to contractors and heavy equipment ruining our roads and our property were not easily forgotten along with the financial burden that was placed upon us at the time. We are dreading the possibility of reliving that same scenario again if you approve the request for private sewers.

We are full-time residents living on the island and we have carefully considered all the implications. We want to explain why we believe this is not a viable option for our property, for our environment, for our wallets and for our neighbors.

First, let's talk about the environmental impact. LPS systems rely on pumps to move wastewater from homes to the larger sewer infrastructure. While they may seem like a quick fix, these systems are harmful to the environment. The pumps can fail, leading to untreated wastewater being released into the ground, nearby water sources, or even directly into our local canals, rivers, and streams. These pumps will fail when we lose electricity unless we install an expensive backup generator. This failure can potentially contaminate drinking water supplies and create significant harm to wildlife and our fragile ecosystems. In addition, these systems require frequent maintenance/replacement and are more prone to clogging or breakdowns, leading to potentially catastrophic failures.

But there's another serious issue: flooding from extreme weather events which we have experienced just recently. We have had back-to-back hurricanes which caused unprecedented severe flooding on our island. LPS systems are particularly vulnerable during heavy rain or flooding and are unreliable during these types of events. When floodwater overwhelms the system, the pumps can become inoperable, leading to backflow and wastewater spilling out. This not only increases the risk of contamination but also places additional stress on already overwhelmed stormwater management systems. After a hurricane or flood, island residents may find themselves not only dealing with water damage to their homes, but also the risk of untreated sewage affecting their property and local environment.

Now, let's consider the financial burden of installing and maintaining a private for-profit sewer system. The initial cost of installing a new sewer line to a residence can be astronomical. Not only do we have to pay for the installation of the pipes and pumps, but we also face the expense of permits, excavation, new electrical lines and labor. This is an enormous one-time investment that many homeowners simply cannot afford. Mr. Boyer continues to move the goal posts on the cost of installation. The first estimate a few years ago was approximately \$10,000.00 and has now swelled to well over \$50,000.00 with no end in sight. But it doesn't stop there—the ongoing costs of maintaining an LPS system can be just as high, if not higher. From pump repairs and replacement to regular inspections, the long-term maintenance can easily run into thousands of dollars over the years. In addition, these systems may not increase the resale value of a property, and in some cases, could even decrease it because of the perceived risk and the added costs.

On the other hand, our current in-ground septic system has been in place for over 30 years, and it has operated without any issues. This system, when properly maintained, is a proven and reliable solution for wastewater management. Unlike the LPS system, which requires frequent monitoring and repairs, our septic system is much less prone to mechanical failure and doesn't depend on pumps that can break down during flooding or extreme weather. The ongoing costs of maintaining a septic system are far more manageable, typically limited to periodic inspections and occasional pumping. It's also better for the environment when managed correctly, according to the EPA, as it naturally filters and treats wastewater through the soil, reducing the risk of contamination.

There's also the risk of putting too much responsibility on the homeowner. Unlike a public sewer system, which is regularly maintained and managed by professionals, with a for-profit private system, the responsibility falls squarely on our shoulders. In the event of a failure, it's up to us to repair or replace costly equipment—and there's no guarantee that we will be able to fix the problem quickly or affordably. Mr. Boyer has no experience with running a start-up sewer company, he cannot or will not provide the scope of work necessary for such a large-scale project. Mr. Boyer is telling island residents to trust him and his financial backers who remain anonymous at this point. We do not trust Mr. Boyer, to our knowledge, there are only a few of his friends who want the for-profit sewer system.

Another serious concern that we have is the fact "Mr. Boyer was charged with and indicted for larceny as it relates to a utility as well as criminal mischief for stealing water from Don Pedro Island State Park to serve his own water utility on Little Gasparilla Island". Florida Park Patrol Case #96 J29 0153, Charlotte County. Mr. Boyer should not oversee running a Utility given his past dishonesty towards the County and island residents.

We have endured several natural disasters over the past 2-3 years, the emotional and physical toll takes years to recover. Jack Boyer is now telling island residents that he wants to inflict more emotional stress on us for several years while he destroys our island for his personal financial gain. While Mr. Boyer has a successful water utility company on island, we have more concerns. The water rates at which Mr. Boyer's water company continue to increase will become the highest in the State of Florida in a short period of time. This shows precedent that Mr. Boyer does not try to contain costs, he continually increases them for his financial benefit.

We have not received any communication directly from Mr. Boyer or Environmental Utilities LLC to date regarding the plan to disrupt our lives. Thankfully, several of our neighbors have pointed us to various websites to obtain knowledge of what Mr. Boyer believes is beneficial to the island, we disagree. Mr. Boyer and his associates, along with a few select individuals with inside deals will be the only beneficiaries of this flawed plan.

Ultimately, a for-profit private LPS system simply isn't a sustainable or responsible solution. It's costly, it's prone to environmental damage, it's vulnerable to flooding, and it can create an ongoing burden that many of us cannot afford or take on with confidence. Our current septic system, on the other hand, has served us well for over 25 years and presents far fewer risks to the environment, our finances, or our peace of mind.

We ask of you to <u>deny the request once again</u> for private sewer on the island. Thank you for your time and consideration.

I am-unable to attend any of the prescribed meetings which i regret so i hope this letter carries my thoughts and wishes.

I own 2 properties one at 400 S Gulf blvd and unit 28 at S gulf blvd. I have owned both for 30 year plus. My Name is Terry Kent 470 Bocilla Dr. Don Pedro Island 25 year full time resident.

The main reasons I oppose the Private Sewer on our Barrier Island

- 1. No need for service. There has been no water testing or any evidence of need for sewer.
- 2. Excessive cost. Over 40k up front and no way to pay over time. A burden for someone that is retired and living on fixed income.
- 2. Private for Profit. Because EU would be a private company running the sewer instead of the county, we won't be afforded payment plans, there's no competition, and no central oversight.
- 3. Outdated Technology. EU wants to use a low-pressure systems, which Charlotte County won't install any more because of the excessive maintenance they require.
- 4. Traffic Congestion. Only access to the island is by ferry. Long wait times.
- 5. Maintenance Problems. The required grinder pump at each home will be susceptible to our harsh salt air. If there's an emergency repair needed, how will they get here after ferry hours?
- 6. No Oversight. There is no performance bond required and we have no single point of recourse in the event of cost overruns or project failure.

Finally I would like to point out that after the last 2 Hurricanes that caused flooding on the island very few septic tanks were affected by the flooding. However every pool pump on the island was ruined. With an out dated system like EU is proposing every house on the island would be without a sewer. Imagine the cost and impact to replace all of this.

Given the documented inefficiencies and maintenance costs associated with this type of system, I strongly recommend that you deny the request of EU to install this type of system.
