2	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: All right. Welcome this
3	morning to our Internal Affairs meeting. Today is
4	March 26th.
5	I love how automatically at the room, at 9:30
6	everything just went shush, right?
7	COMMISSIONER GRAHAM: Training.
8	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: So, yeah, I guess I
9	guess so, right? This is supposed to be a casual
10	room, right? It got very serious.
11	So just a quick reminder. Today's Internal
12	Affairs agenda a little bit short maybe than normal
13	of what we've had the last couple the last
14	couple of months. Of course, we have a hearing
15	afterwards, and, you know, we wanted to make sure
16	we have time for that as we are planning.
17	First, maybe and foremost, one of the most
18	important things we do here in Internal Affairs is
19	our Employee of the Month. So I will tell you my
20	office and, Andrew, I don't know how you worked
21	it, but I always felt we were behind. Like, we are
22	picking, and we are trying to choose. So I
23	actually have two Employees of the Month, but not
24	for the same month. We are going to have
25	February's Employee of the Month and March's

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1 Employee of the Month. So I think we're -- I 2 always get confused. I didn't know which month it 3 was, so I wanted to make sure we recognize the 4 employee during that month, so I think we are 5 there. So our Employee of the Month for February is 6 7 Wendi Denison with Engineering, Wendi -- oh, there 8 she is. 9 (Applause from the audience.) 10 CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: As an Administrative 11 Assistant for the Safety section, obviously a very 12 important role, Wendi not only coordinates data 13 submissions for several inspections, but also 14 processes travel and other records associated to 15 the telework employees in the Miami and Tampa 16 regions, which obviously is a little bit new to us 17 with making those operations work. 18 Regardless of the task, Wendi always provides 19 thorough results, combined with a smile and bright 20 attitude. Of course, very important, her knowledge 21 and records of procedures is also assistive to the 22 Commission in obtaining high marks during the 23 annual PHMSA evaluations of the pipeline safety 24 program. 25 While she may not be in the limelight, which

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1	is a good thing for the safety section, of course,
2	she's a shining star in the division. So, Wendi,
3	congratulations for Employee of the Month for
4	February.
5	MS. DENISON: Thank you.
6	(Applause from the audience.)
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1 CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: So our Employee of the 2 Month for March is Yen Ngo. Yen is with the CAO. 3 She's actually in -- down in Miami. She works 4 So, of course, she could not be with us remotely. 5 today. But I did talk to her and, of course, let 6 her know that she had won the Employee of the Month 7 for March.

8 She started her career with the PSC in the 9 Bureau of Auditing in 1995 as a staff auditor, and 10 what was formally, of course, the Miami district 11 office. After the closure of the office, Yen began 12 a working remotely. As a 29-year staff member, she 13 has worked on numerous audits during her tenure at 14 the Commission.

15 Yen's dedication to her audits and attention 16 to detail plays a significant role in the timely 17 release of professional quality and audit reports 18 issued following, of course, a completed audit in 19 our investigations, if there are any.

20 Yen's self-motivation and work ethic makes her 21 a valued employee of the Commission. So I reminded 22 her, I said, even though that she's, you know, 23 she's not here, she's thought of, of course. And 24 her work is an important part of what we do, so 25 help me in congratulating Yen Ngo, Employee of the

1 Month. 2 (Applause from the audience.) 3 CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: All right. So on main 4 stage is our legislative update, so I will toss it 5 over to Lance. All right. 6 MR. WATSON: Chairman, 7 Commissioners, good morning. 8 Florida's 2024 legislative session ended on 9 March 8th, and the Governor has until June 30th to 10 sign bills into law. Just a couple of stats. This 11 year, 1,487 bills were filed with 325 of those 12 And of those bills that passing both chambers. 13 passed, from our A list we had four bills specific 14 that passed both chambers, and I will go through 15 those real quick and kind of what that impact is on 16 the PSC. 17 The first one, of cures, being our agency 18 bill, Senate Bill 364. This is a RAF bill. This 19 did pass. It ended up with passing with one 20 caveat, there is a Sunset on it, and that Sunset 21 expires July 1st, 2028. So four-year Sunset before 22 we have to take additional action on it. 23 The second bill, Senate Bill 366, the gas 24 safety bill. This, of course, raises the per 25 violation civil penalty to a certain amount until

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1 June 30th, 2025, and then after that, assigns the PSC the responsibility to establish those maximum 2 3 penalties, and that's based on the Consumer Price 4 Index Federal Pipeline Safety Penalties and 5 Legislative Intent to maintain certification with the pipeline and hazardous materials safety 6 7 administration. This requires the PSC to annually review this and, if necessary, to revise it, and to 8 adopt rules implementing these provisions. 9 That 10 takes effect July 1, 2024.

11 The next bill, Senate Bill 478, the 12 designation of eligible telecommunication carriers. 13 This bill authorizes the PSC to designate entities 14 upon petition as eligible telecommunication 15 carriers for lifeline services provided they are 16 telecommunications companies or commercial mobile 17 radio service providers.

18 And the last bill, of course, House Bill 1645, 19 the energy resources bill. This is an omnibus 20 It contains numerous provisions related to bill. 21 energy, but really the four areas that impact the 22 The first being requires the PSC to determine PSC. 23 upon notice by a public utility whether an 24 off-scheduled power plant retirement is prudent and 25 consistent with the state's energy policy goals.

1 The second requires the PSC to develop a plan 2 to conduct an assessment of the security and 3 resiliency of the state's electric grid and natural 4 gas facilities against both physical threats and 5 cyber threats. The third allows the PSC to approve utility 6 7 programs for electric vehicle charging under certain conditions. 8 9 And then lastly, the fourth requires the PSC 10 to study and evaluate the technical and economic 11 feasibility of using advanced nuclear power 12 technologies, and to submit a report of its 13 findings and recommendations. 14 I will note that as of this morning, those 15 four bills I mentioned have not been presented to 16 the Governor yet do approval. But once they are, 17 he will have 15 days to make a determination on 18 those. 19 Any questions on the bills? 20 COMMISSIONER GRAHAM: Yeah. Back up to that 21 last bill. 22 MR. WATSON: Okay. 23 COMMISSIONER GRAHAM: Go over that cyber 24 threat part again. 25 This -- this -- it says MR. WATSON: Okay.

Thank you. 6 COMMISSIONER GRAHAM: Okay. 7 MR. WATSON: Any other questions? 8 CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Lance, none of these have 9 been signed by the Governor, right? 10 No, sir. MR. WATSON: Not yet. 11 CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Probably not even sent to 12 him yet. 13 1645, that's very comprehensive, like you 14 noted. Is there a way, maybe we can, in the fall, 15 or at some point later this year, we can maybe do a 16 follow-up, especially with the reporting and kind 17 of the uniqueness of things that we have got to do 18 as an agency? 19 MR. WATSON: Sure. 20 CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Just kind of highlight what 21 we've done. I know some of these -- some of the 22 other bills have rulemaking, some of the things 23 that we will make adjustments to, which is pretty 24 standard and we're pretty good at, but that one is 25 a little bit unique, right, where we are kind of

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1 maybe taking on some things that we --2 MR. WATSON: Yes, sir. 3 CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: -- haven't done, really 4 hadn't done in a long time, so I would kind of like 5 to see that just maybe to update us and see we are and thoughts and inputs. 6 7 Yeah, that sounds good. MR. WATSON: Sure. 8 Any other questions on bills? 9 I will quickly go over the budget real quick. 10 CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Sure. That's important. 11 MR. WATSON: In total, the budget came out to 12 117.5 billion. Florida's reserve total 16.3 13 And in that budget includes a billion. 14 three-percent pay raise for State employees, and 15 pays off \$500 million of outstanding state debt. 16 The retirement system also saw a change for 17 reemploying retirees. Retiring employees may 18 return to work six months after DROP ends, and they 19 will not have to defer their retirement for another 20 six months after that. 21 Our budget, the PSC was fully funded at 22 \$30,737,974 and all 272 positions per our LBR. And then in an effort to reduce Floridians' tax burden, 23 24 the budget also includes tax relief efforts 25 totaling up to 1.5 billion. 450 million of that is

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1 a total rebate program for drivers with more than 2 35 toll transactions a month, a credit for 3 homeowners insurers who lower premiums, and a slew 4 of tax holidays, which includes a two-week back to 5 school sales tax holiday, a 30-day freedom month sales tax holiday, a one-week tool time sales tax 6 7 holidays, and two separate disaster preparedness 8 tax holidays.

9 And then lastly, not that we are counting the 10 days, but the 2025 legislative session will convene 11 on March 4th and then gavel out on May 2nd.

12 And with that, that's a -- that's all I have 13 for you all today, other than I would note two 14 other bills that we were tracking that did not 15 pass, House Bill 1277, the -- what we called the 16 muni bill. This year, it died on second reading in 17 the House. And then lastly, the RNG bill, Senate 18 Bill 480, passed the full Senate, but dies in House 19 messages, and then its companion, House Bill 683, 20 died in its last committee stop commerce. 21 Gotcha. Seemed like that CHATRMAN LA ROSA: 22 certainly had some movement on, it didn't cross the 23 finish. 24 MR. WATSON: Yeah.

1 COMMISSIONER FAY: Thanks for all your work. 2 I know you were downtown a lot. 3 MR. WATSON: Sure. 4 COMMISSIONER FAY: I appreciate it. 5 MR. WATSON: Yeah. Thank you all. Yeah, certainly a busier 6 CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: 7 session maybe than --8 MR. WATSON: Than last year for sure, yeah, it 9 That it was. was. 10 CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Awesome. Well, thank you 11 for the update, and, yeah, certainly look forward 12 to the follow-ups, of course, as time goes on, and 13 like you said, before you know it, we will be back 14 in the swing of things. 15 All right. Let's move on to the General 16 Counsel's report. 17 MR. HETRICK: Thank you, Chairman. Good 18 morning, Members. I have no report, sir. 19 CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Move on to the Executive 20 Director. 21 Thank you, Chairman. Good morning, MR. BAEZ: 22 Commissioners. A couple of housekeeping issues. 23 First, the agency -- the PSC normally 24 regularly participates in career fairs, certainly 25 the nearer ones here at FSU and FAMU. And this

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year, we have identified and brought onboard a couple of interns and I wanted to welcome them, Brianna York is a FAMU Business Administration major, and Scott Quigley is an FSU Finance major. Both started on March 18th, and they are both detailed to AFAB, so they will have -- they will have their hands full soon enough by the calendar.

8 We want to welcome them and wish them well. 9 They will be with us, I think I said eight weeks, 10 and we are always on the lookout for new young 11 talent, and hopefully future full-time employees. 12 So welcome to them.

13 Secondly, just to tack on regarding House Bill 14 1645, and, Chairman, I know that you want to have 15 an update in terms of the implementation. And even 16 though we -- as Lance said, they haven't been 17 presented to the -- certainly, that one hasn't been 18 presented to the Governor for signature. We have 19 every high confidence that that should be 20 forthcoming.

21 We are starting to reach out to not just 22 interested stakeholders, kind of forming 23 participation rosters, as one would call it, and 24 also reaching out to the liaisons for the different 25 agencies that are listed in terms of consultation

1 under the different sections, both for the --2 specifically for the nuclear feasibility study, and 3 then the cybersecurity piece as well. So we will 4 be keeping you up-to-date on how that's 5 progressing. Certainly, you said fall. It may be 6 some time sooner than that, one would hope. So 7 stay tuned. 8 And lastly, I know you mentioned the hearing immediately following, and our next Agenda is on 9 10 April 2nd, which is next Tuesday. 11 And if you don't have questions, that's the 12 end of my report. 13 CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Awesome. Thank you. 14 Commissioners? 15 Well, I am excited for the interns. That was 16 a big part -- I wanted to, of course, get folks --17 young folks involved, and hopefully they do maybe end up becoming future employees. 18 19 MR. BAEZ: Oh, absolutely. We consider 20 ourselves lucky when we can find, you know, folks 21 that take an interest in public service that early 22 on --23 CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Sure. 24 MR. BAEZ: -- and certainly catching them 25 before they have bigger choices, we can sink our

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1 claws into them, and I think -- I think we have 2 been pretty well successful --3 CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Gotcha. 4 MR. BAEZ: -- in getting some good keepers. 5 CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: You have got the Kool-Aid 6 that you can --7 Well, Kool-Aid is calories and MR. BAEZ: 8 sugars and oils and A1C kind of things you don't 9 want to be dealing with, but, yes, your point is 10 taken, and that's sort of the strategy. 11 CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Yeah. In eight weeks, 12 there is -- although it seems like a small window, 13 there's a lot that happens here. 14 MR. BAEZ: A lot happens -- a lot can happen. 15 In the right eight weeks, there is a lifetime, 16 so --17 COMMISSIONER PASSIDOMO: I will definitely 18 make a plug is that I started here as a legal 19 intern. 20 MR. BAEZ: There you go. 21 COMMISSIONER PASSIDOMO: Yeah, so definitely. 22 And the Kool-Aid -- I mean, everyone knows, GCL has 23 some of the best home table buffets going on, so 24 that didn't hurt coming back for full --25 It was legendary, Commissioner. MR. BAEZ:

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1 Absolutely. 2 I -- I walk heavier nowadays because of that 3 oak table over the years. 4 COMMISSIONER PASSIDOMO: Yeah. 5 MR. BAEZ: Good luck to our interns, and hopefully many more to come. 6 7 CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Thank you. 8 Anybody else? 9 All right. So any other matters? Anything 10 we've got before us? 11 No one has asked me about what the song of the 12 month was. Man, I skipped right through it? 13 It's telephone, Mr. Telephone Man. MR. BAEZ: 14 CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: So Telephone Man by New Addition. I do have to research some of these 15 16 songs, by the way. So don't think I know all of 17 these, and I certainly don't.
