

Re: Advisory Opinion to Attorney General—Energy Choice Ballot Initiative Case No. SC19-328, Florida Supreme Court

Dear Chairman Graham:

On March 1, 2019, the Attorney General petitioned the Florida Supreme Court for review of the validity of a ballot initiative entitled "Right to Competitive Energy Market for Customers Investor-Owned Utilities; Allowing Energy Choice" (Energy Choice Initiative). The Attorney General laid out her concerns that the Energy Choice Initiative ballot summary did not comply with section 101.161(1). Florida Statutes. The Attorney General pointed out the Energy Choice Initiative "hides the ball' as to its 'true meaning and ramifications," contrary to Supreme Court precedent. We share this concern.

The Energy Choice Initiative indeed would have significant ramifications for the State of Florida if it were to pass. It not only would undo the current regulatory structure of utilities in the State, but also it would create a new governmental "independent market monitor," ostensibly to ensure competitiveness in energy markets, which is a function already performed by the PSC. In reality, this amendment would lead to stranded costs, extensive litigation, and regulatory confusion.

The PSC is the state entity that regulates energy utilities regarding their rates and competitive markets. It, then, is well situated to address, from a technical perspective, the serious, detrimental—but undisclosed—structural implications of this amendment. We respectfully request that the PSC submit its own brief to the Court addressing how the proposed amendment would impact the current regulatory structure. The scope of the PSC's brief could include identification of any statutes, regulations, and PSC orders that ultimately would be voided by operation of the proposed amendment. The PSC's brief also could address the impact of the proposed amendment on service reliability, coordination of the electric grid, reserve margins, sufficiency of electric

generation, and impacts on storm restoration. The brief should address these topics with an eye toward the applicable ballot summary and single-subject requirements.

We thank you for your time and attention to this matter.
