**CRITICAL INFORMATION:** Please place on the May 4, 2017 Internal Affairs.  
**Commission approval is sought.**

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Pursuant to Section 120.695, Florida Statutes (F.S.), the Commission is required to review all of its rules and designate those for which a violation would be a minor violation and for which a notice of noncompliance must be the first enforcement action. A violation of a rule is a minor violation if it does not result in economic or physical harm to a person or adversely affect the public health, safety, or welfare or create a significant threat of such harm. No later than June 30, 2017, the Commission must certify to the President of the Senate, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Joint Administrative Procedures Committee, and the Governor's Rules Ombudsman those rules that have been designated as minor violation rules. The Commission must also publish the list of these rules on the Commission's website beginning on July 1, 2017.

Attachment A is the Commission's draft certification letters. Attachment B is the Commission's draft list of rules for which a violation would be a minor violation. Staff is seeking the Commission's approval of the draft certification letters and list of minor violation rules.

2           **CHAIRMAN BROWN:** Welcome. We are at our  
3 Internal Affairs. Thank you all. I know many of us are  
4 starving. This is going to be very, very short. And I  
5 ask those that are on here, on the agenda, to please  
6 make brief reports because we have just a few things to  
7 go over.

8           So with that, this meeting is convened, and  
9 let's get to the first item, which is the draft list of  
10 rules designated as minor violations.

11           **MS. PAGE:** Good afternoon, Commissioners. I'm  
12 Pamela Page with the Office of General Counsel.

13           Pursuant to Section 120.695, *Florida Statutes*,  
14 the Commission is required to review all of its rules  
15 and designate those for which a violation would be a  
16 minor violation and for which a notice of noncompliance  
17 must be the first enforcement action.

18           Minor violation rules are those which do not  
19 result in economic or physical harm to a person or  
20 adversely affect the public health, safety, or welfare  
21 or create a significant threat of such harm. The  
22 Commission must certify the designation of rules to the  
23 legislature, the Joint Administrative Procedures  
24 Committee, and the governor's rules ombudsman no later  
25 than June 30th, 2017. The rules will also be published

1 on the Commission's website by July 1st, 2017.

2 Staff is seeking the Commission's approval of  
3 the draft certification letters and the list of the  
4 minor violation rules. Staff will work with the  
5 Chairman's office to ensure the letters are provided to  
6 the required entities and the rules are posted on our  
7 website by the statutory deadlines.

8 **CHAIRMAN BROWN:** Thank you. And on the right  
9 letterhead.

10 **MS. PAGE:** Correct.

11 **CHAIRMAN BROWN:** Great. All right.

12 Commissioners, any questions, comments on  
13 this? We need a motion; is that correct?

14 **MS. PAGE:** Yes.

15 **COMMISSIONER BRISÉ:** So move.

16 **COMMISSIONER PATRONIS:** Second.

17 **CHAIRMAN BROWN:** All right. Any further  
18 discussion?

19 Seeing none, all those in favor, say aye.

20 (Vote taken.)

21 Opposed?

22 Great. It passes. Thank you for your work on  
23 this, and we'll work to make stylistically -- make sure  
24 it's on the right, proper heading.

25 **MS. PAGE:** Yes, ma'am.

1           **CHAIRMAN BROWN:** Thanks.

2           Hi, guys.

3           **MS. PENNINGTON:** Good morning.

4           **CHAIRMAN BROWN:** How are you?

5           **MS. PENNINGTON:** We're great. Today it is day  
6 59 of the legislative session. "May the Fourth be with  
7 you," Commissioner Patronis.

8           **CHAIRMAN BROWN:** Ticktock.

9           **MS. PENNINGTON:** We have provided you with our  
10 most updated tracking list, and I would just tell you  
11 that some of those bills are still in play. Most of  
12 them are not. There are still a lot to be decided in  
13 the next however many hours. Braulio will get into the  
14 budget and the things like that. So unless you have any  
15 questions, we just want to tell you nothing bad has  
16 happened to us and so far so good, unless Braulio has  
17 bad news.

18           **COMMISSIONER POLMANN:** And I'm still waiting.

19           **CHAIRMAN BROWN:** But there's -- so the budget  
20 is -- they come back on Monday?

21           **MS. PENNINGTON:** We don't know. The budget is  
22 not being printed yet, so we don't know if there's a  
23 signed deal yet or not. The Senate comes back in at  
24 1:30. The House comes in at 1:00 today. So maybe we  
25 will find out a little more information at that time,

1 but nothing is done yet.

2           **CHAIRMAN BROWN:** Thank you. Thank you. I  
3 know I've said this before, you guys have -- every IA  
4 we've had since session has started, you guys have done  
5 a great job. Y'all are a great team together and really  
6 have worked very well. I appreciate all of the extra  
7 hours you guys are putting in and keeping the  
8 Commissioners, Braulio, and everyone informed.

9           **MS. PENNINGTON:** Thank you.

10           **CHAIRMAN BROWN:** Commissioners, any questions  
11 on the report or anything, for that matter?

12           **COMMISSIONER POLMANN:** I'm still waiting.

13           **CHAIRMAN BROWN:** You're still waiting? Oh,  
14 there is that.

15           Commissioners, anything else?

16           All right. Thank you so much. Just a few  
17 more days.

18           **MS. PENNINGTON:** Hopefully.

19           **CHAIRMAN BROWN:** One more.

20           General Counsel's Office.

21           **MR. HETRICK:** No report, Madam Chairman.

22           **CHAIRMAN BROWN:** Thank you for that.

23           And Executive Director.

24           **MR. BAEZ:** Thank you, Madam Chairman,  
25 Commissioners. I passed out brief highlights and

1 lowlights, perhaps, of the current budget as it stands  
2 proposed for the, for the legislature's consideration.  
3 You heard Katherine say it hasn't made the printers yet,  
4 so it's not actually sitting on the desk of the  
5 legislators. We're looking at Monday now. We could be  
6 looking at Tuesday by the end of tomorrow. So I think  
7 the cutoff day for Monday is tomorrow. So it's very,  
8 it's very fluid.

9           There are still a couple of items that don't  
10 have anything to do with us that are still up in the  
11 air, and that's what's holding things up, it's our  
12 understanding.

13           But with reference to our particular budget  
14 request, here's where it stands. As you recall, we had  
15 proposed eliminating our general revenue funding. That  
16 was accepted by both Houses, both sides of the  
17 legislature. That was in the amount of 216,000, so now  
18 we are funding that, which included three FTEs. We had  
19 asked for \$100,000 to replace some aging vehicles. That  
20 was accepted as well. So, you know, some of our folks  
21 can drive better cars on their inspections.

22           The one item that I think is now resolved but  
23 we don't have the final tally yet is our issue with the  
24 Agency for State Technology. That has been resolved,  
25 but we don't have final numbers. That will be a

1 technical amendment to our budget itself, so that'll  
2 kind of flow down. There's an elimination of ten vacant  
3 positions, as we had discussed, for a reduction of  
4 \$498,000. That was a big ticket for us. So our total  
5 appropriation right now stands at \$24.6 million, and  
6 that's the budget.

7 **CHAIRMAN BROWN:** Thank you.

8 **MR. BAEZ:** Little -- I'm sure that this is  
9 non-budget items. There's -- there are pay increases,  
10 scaled pay increases for the general employees,  
11 1,400 for 40,000 or less, and -- for those making 40,000  
12 or less, and \$1,000 for those making 40,000 or more.  
13 And there's no change in costs, healthcare costs this  
14 year. And by special request, the Bar dues are  
15 included, Mary Anne, so you should be happy.

16 **CHAIRMAN BROWN:** Did you say "Barbies"?

17 **MR. BAEZ:** Bar dues.

18 **CHAIRMAN BROWN:** Oh, sorry.

19 **MR. BAEZ:** Barbies are not included this year.

20 **CHAIRMAN BROWN:** I have no food in me.

21 **MR. BAEZ:** Bar dues are. That's it. If y'all  
22 have got any questions --

23 **CHAIRMAN BROWN:** Wait. Bar dues for --

24 **MR. BAEZ:** For our attorneys, our able  
25 attorneys, yes.

1           **CHAIRMAN BROWN:** That's a bummer.

2           **MR. BAEZ:** Not for, not for others.

3           **CHAIRMAN BROWN:** Commissioner Graham has a  
4 question.

5           **MR. BAEZ:** Yes, Commissioner.

6           **COMMISSIONER GRAHAM:** A question for you.  
7 Last year we had -- legislation went through that  
8 required for us to live stream all of our meetings.

9           **MR. BAEZ:** Yes, I remember it well.

10          **COMMISSIONER GRAHAM:** How -- I know we threw  
11 out a number of what we thought that was going to cost.  
12 Do we have a better idea of how much it actually did  
13 cost?

14          **MR. BAEZ:** We -- I think at the end of this  
15 fiscal we're going to take stock, and I know that  
16 Apryl's folks have been keeping track of that. I don't  
17 have a number at the ready for you, Commissioner. We'd  
18 be happy to come by and give you current numbers and  
19 discuss it. Part of our purposes is to really, after  
20 we've got some data on it, kind of -- you know, we're  
21 keeping track of not just our costs but also how many  
22 folks are actually watching when these live streams go  
23 on, because I think you can make a case -- then you can  
24 really do the comparison. Are we getting bang for our  
25 buck? Is the statute really helping us? And perhaps

1 there's some further discussion as to how to modify it  
2 so it's a cost-effective service we provide our --

3 **COMMISSIONER GRAHAM:** So we can actually tell  
4 how many people are actually logged on during that live  
5 streaming?

6 **MR. BAEZ:** I'm told that the internet can do a  
7 number of things, and that's, and that's one of them,  
8 yes.

9 **COMMISSIONER GRAHAM:** Magical things?

10 So, I mean, well, I mean, because there's a  
11 big difference between what it costs to live stream or  
12 what it costs to put it, you know, put it on the website  
13 five hours later.

14 **MR. BAEZ:** Yes, sir, big difference obviously.  
15 And, you know, this past year was a busy one on average.  
16 You know, we had a couple of major rate cases and one  
17 that took us -- you know, a few more that took us out of  
18 town, and that involves more staff traveling, IT staff  
19 included. So it's a big setup. I'm sure you noticed  
20 it, you know. So it's a pretty big added cost. But  
21 like I said, the numbers will be compiled and we'll make  
22 them available to you.

23 **COMMISSIONER GRAHAM:** Well, those would be  
24 good numbers to have so we can sit back and have some  
25 discussion about it.



1           **MR. BAEZ:** Absolutely. Absolutely.

2           **COMMISSIONER GRAHAM:** Thanks.

3           **CHAIRMAN BROWN:** Good questions.

4           Commissioners, any other questions or  
5 questions?

6           All right. Thank you very much. Thank you,  
7 Braulio.

8           On to other matters. Commissioners, any other  
9 matters? None?

10           I would like to recognize publicly here Rachel  
11 Arnold from the Clerk's Office. She's our "Employee of  
12 the Month" -- she's sitting right there -- for May.  
13 Rachel is just funny, smart, quick-witted. She sheds  
14 light to everybody even outside the Clerk's Office, and  
15 we enjoy working with her, and want to congratulate you  
16 on behalf of all the Commission for being "Employee of  
17 the Month" for May. Congratulations.
