2	CHAIRMAN FAY: All right. Welcome back. We
3	will begin our Internal Affairs meeting for June
4	13th.
5	As usual, I would like to recognize our
6	Employee of the Month for this month. So we will
7	be recognizing Phillip Ellis.
8	So Phillip is known around the Commission for
9	his pleasant attitude and willingness to help with
10	pretty much any situation. From briefing with him,
11	he has the ability to quickly recall a number of
12	facts and issues just off the top of his head. He
13	loves digging into the details, and I love that he
14	loves digging into the details, and so he just
15	constantly just proves to be a huge asset to our
16	commission, and we are thankful to have him. His
17	team also has a lot of respect for him and the way
18	he runs his group, and the caliber of educating and
19	bringing people on as team members.
20	So with that, we will recognize Phillip Ellis
21	as this month's Employee of the Month.
22	(Applause from the audience.)
23	CHAIRMAN FAY: All right. With that,
24	Commissioners, next we will move into today's
25	presentation for Internal Affairs, which will be an

1	introduction to the Florida Office of Energy
2	presented by Alexander Mack, who is the Program
3	Administrator for the Florida Office of Energy. I
4	know we've got some PowerPoint slides here this
5	morning for us to go through.
6	Mr. Mack, typically if somebody has sort of an
7	urgent question, they may interrupt
8	Commissioners may interrupt you to ask you that
9	specific question, but common practice is we will
10	wait until the end, and if we have questions, we
11	might refer to a slide to have you go back to that
12	to ask for some additional detail. But we do
13	appreciate you being here this morning, and when
14	you are ready, you are recognized to start your
15	presentation.
16	MR. MACK: Well, good morning, Commissioners.
17	I am an alum of the Public Service Commission.
18	Previously, I worked in electric safety, from 1990
19	through '93. And I have been in the Energy Office
20	since that time.
21	But as it relates to the Office of Energy, we
22	are housed in the Department of Agriculture and
23	Consumer Services, and we are governed by Chapter
24	377.703 of the Florida Statutes. And in that
25	statute, we are charged or our function, our

1	responsibilities are legislatively we are the
2	legislatively designated state energy policy
3	development office within Florida. We evaluate
4	energy related studies, analysis, stakeholder
5	input. We promote and advocate for the development
6	and use of renewable energy resources, energy
7	efficiency technologies, alternative fuels and
8	alternative fuel vehicle technologies.

We use available state and federal funds to develop and manage energy efficiency renewable energy, energy education, alternative fuels and alternative fuel technology programs. We also produce an annual energy report. Also, we serve as the state clearinghouse for all energy information.

And having said that, there is a website that's the Florida Energy Clearinghouse, it is housed at the University of Florida, and we continually host and update and expand the clearinghouse in accordance with section 470.0741 of the Florida Statutes. It is designed to be a consumer friendly portal to compare energy saving technologies and learn more about energy use, production and renewable energy technologies and research being conducted within the state.

There is also the My Florida Home Energy.

1 It's a major component of the clearinghouse. 2. it takes users on an interactive home tool, and 3 offers tips on how they can improve their energy efficiency. And so it uses information provided by 4 5 the homeowner and publicly accessible data to provide a customized report, which identifies 6 7 energy efficient products, services, potential 8 energy and monetary savings. It even includes all available financial incentives in the area. 9 10 this summer, we plan on updating the My Florida 11 Home site.

Also, we -- within the Energy Office, we have federal dollars, of course. And with the bipartisan infrastructure law, or bill, as we call it, we have received funds from the State Energy Program, and that amount is 16, a little over \$16 million. And the State Energy Program was created back in the 1970s, and it emphasizes the State's role as the decision-maker and administrator for programs and activities unique to the state.

So that -- so the funds will flow down from the federal government, or the Department of Energy, but the State is the administrator and decide what it wants to do with those funds based upon the federal law.

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With the State Energy Program, the plan is for these funds to be used for wastewater treatment facilities in physically constrained counties and cities and towns. That is the current plan for these funds. These funds were received from the federal government last month, and budget authority, we are waiting for a stroke of the pen before we move forward.

Also, we received -- we have applied for the Energy Efficiency Conservation Block Grant. Those are funds for -- that flow through the State.

Those funds are for counties under 200,000 and cities and towns under 35,000. Anything larger than that, those funds flow direct to those local governments.

The decision has been made for the funds that are flowing through the energy -- Office of Energy will be used for local governments in those physically constrained counties. That is the plan.

Also, we have applied for the Energy

Efficiency Revolving Loan Program, or loan fund.

These are funds that will be used to capitalize grants to establish a revolving loan fund for energy audits, upgrades and retrofits to increase energy efficiency and improve the comfort of the

1	building. With the Energy Efficiency Revolving
2	Loan Fund, we are actually plussing up those funds
3	with some funds that we currently have that have
4	not been expended, which are existing federal
5	funds.
6	Also, there is the Inflation Reduction Act.
7	And Florida's allocation for the Home Efficiency
8	Rebates is 173 million, and the Home
9	Electrification & Appliance Rebates is 172 million.
10	The Home Efficiency Rebates are given to
11	develop a rebate program for single family and
12	multi-family households to accomplish whole home
13	retrofits that save at least 20 percent of
14	household energy.
15	And then the Home Electrification & Appliance
16	Rebates program, it is a rebate program that is to
17	be developed for low and moderate income, single
18	family and multi-family households, to purchase
19	high efficiency electric equipment.
20	But in this program, for the audits that will
21	take place on those homes, there would be con
22	concern contractors that will be able to do those
23	audits. And so the Department of Energy is
24	providing funds for contractor training for this
25	program. But a decision has not been made if it's

1	going to be formally allocated or if it's going to
2	be competitive. So we do not know that yet. We
3	have not received guidance from the Department of
4	Energy.
5	And what's ahead, we are going to continue to
6	seek federal funding for energy efficiency programs
7	critical for Florida and local governments;
8	continue to administer the current programs and
9	develop new programs; work with the Legislature and
10	Governor's Office to collectively advance Florida's
11	energy policy; and work with the Florida Energy
12	Systems Consortium to expand research in Florida's
13	universities.
14	And if you are not familiar with the Florida
15	Energy Systems Consortium, it is a consortium that
16	supports that's I don't want to say staffed,
17	but staffed by the 12 State supported universities.
18	And if there are questions, I will be prepared
19	to answer questions that I can at this time.
20	CHAIRMAN FAY: Great. Yeah. Thank you.
21	I have got two quick questions for you, Mr.
22	Mack and then I will go to my colleagues, who
23	probably will have some questions on this.
24	The first being, you have some of the the
25	material in here in your comments about the federal

1	funding components that go through the State, and I
2	think you provided a great overview, in that,
3	depending on the funding and the timing, there is
4	all different ways that this stuff can be
5	distributed, and sometimes there is a lot of
6	confusion, I think, as to what that entails. I
7	know Department of Energy has a number of specific
8	grant funding opportunities, but then they have low
9	interest loan opportunities. I mean, it's just a
10	wide variety.
11	Does your office have any sort of maybe
12	central are you working on something where you
13	are able to centralize that information of the
14	all the different federal funding that's out there,
15	so individuals can look at that and have a better
16	idea of what's available?
17	MR. MACK: We are working on the website to
18	provide links to the Department of Energy so that
19	they will know exactly what's available. But
20	typically, the State Energy Program, Energy
21	Efficiency Conservation Program, the Revolving Loan
22	Fund Program, those are the basic federal programs
23	that flow through our office.
24	But if there are other opportunities, we
25	continually monitor what's available and reach out

1	to partners around the state to see who's
2	interested in applying, because all of the funding
3	that's available, the Energy Office is not the
4	eligibility entity to be able to apply.
5	CHAIRMAN FAY: Yeah, and I think we have, at
6	least I have, when I have looked at some of these
7	programs, as a regulatory entity, we are not the
8	right option either for a lot of those.
9	And so if a municipality, for example, wanted
10	to apply to something but they need to apply
11	directly, you are saying you may have conversations
12	with them about that process?
13	MR. MACK: Right, because even with the EECBG
14	program, the Department of Energy has actually
15	reached out to us because there are local
16	governments that are eligible that have not
17	supplied the preliminary information. So we have
18	reached out to entities around the state to let
19	them know that the funds are available, because if
20	Florida don't receive them, they go elsewhere, and
21	we want them to come to Florida.
22	CHAIRMAN FAY: Great. And just one more
23	question for you, Mr. Mack.
24	You mentioned updating this the website
25	over the summer in the My Florida Home component.

1 I know this commission has talked a lot about 2. energy efficiency, and the idea of educating 3 customers so they can make decisions about -- about 4 efficiency. 5 I know we -- our commission has, and our communication folks, have worked on, like, an 6 7 example of a house and where energy efficiency 8 components might be. Is this something that you 9 think, by the end of the summer, would be available 10 so if customers -- like, for example, if customers 11 reach out to the PSC, it is -- is it a diagram, a 12 website, like, something that would give them some 13 general understanding -- and I am not saying 14 Commissioner Clark's energy audits, which are 15 great, and everyone should do, are not essential 16 However, if individuals chose to for everybody. 17 sort inform and educate themselves, and for 18 whatever reason chose to not have a physical energy 19 audit, is that -- is that kind of the goal of what 20 your working on? 21 That is the goal. It is currently MR. MACK: 22 We are just planning on updating in existence. 23 it --24 CHAIRMAN FAY: Okay. 25 MR. MACK: -- so they can actually go to the

1	website now to be able to utilize it.
2	CHAIRMAN FAY: And see the previous version
3	whatever that is?
4	MR. MACK: Yes.
5	CHAIRMAN FAY: Okay. Great. Yeah, I think
6	and I would like our communication folks to get
7	with your agency and team just to make sure if we
8	are not duplicating whatever information is put out
9	there, and we are putting maybe redirecting
10	customers, right, to the best options that's there,
11	since you are going to be updating that this
12	summer.
13	Commissioner Clark, you are recognized for
14	questions.
15	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
16	I actually just want to train the energy auditors.
17	That's my goal.
18	CHAIRMAN FAY: There is money for that too.
19	COMMISSIONER CLARK: That's what he said. I
20	got that part.
21	Just a couple of questions related to
22	collaboration and partnerships. In my experience
23	in the utility business, the utility companies
24	often are some of the best collaborative partners
25	that the energy office can have in the field

1	promoting and recognizing these programs,
2	recommending these programs, and to helping you to
3	disperse, get the funds out there. Do you have any
4	programs in place? How are you working with the
5	utilities? And is there anything that the
6	Commission can do to help facilitate the utility's
7	role in being an advocate and a promoter?
8	I remember the weatherization programs from
9	back in the '90s, the low-income weatherization
10	programs. And all of those programs required the
11	utility to do an initial audit on those facilities,
12	then come back and do the inspection to make sure
13	that the dollars that were being invested were
14	spent in the areas where the consumer could get the
15	largest return, not based on what the contractor
16	felt like he could make the most money off of.
17	So how can we work to help you to make sure
18	this process is getting us the most value for our
19	dollar?
20	MR. MACK: My initial response would be the
21	current rebate program that we do not have guidance
22	from Department of Energy on yet, the program is
23	not developed yet, and so other energy offices
24	around the state excuse me, around the country,
25	there are utility programs, rebate programs. We

1	don't have that. And so they are actually taking
2	the federal funds and plugging them into the
3	utility to assist with the utility programs, to
4	be able to spread it. And so that's an option here
5	in Florida, but we don't know what the final
6	decision is.
7	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Thank you.
8	CHAIRMAN FAY: Great. Commissioners, any
9	other questions?
10	Commissioner Passidomo, you are recognized.
11	COMMISSIONER PASSIDOMO: Thank you, Mr.
12	Chairman. I have sort of a follow-up, maybe more
13	specific than Commissioner Clark's question.
14	When it's coming to the home energy, or the
15	efficiency rebates, are you trying to target
16	municipalities more or individual customers through
17	through utilities?
18	MR. MACK: The individual customers.
19	COMMISSIONER PASSIDOMO: Okay. And how how
20	do you find is the best way to target them, or to
21	let them know about these programs? I just you
22	know, especially, if you are talking about lower
23	income customers, I just think that they probably
24	have other things on their minds, and this is
25	would be the most helpful for them. How are they

going to find out about these programs and how they
can participate?

Because I know that some of -- we've gone through, through the NARUC process, about talking about these federal legislations and, you know, it's kind of a lengthy, like, application process through the DOE website. So if there is any way that your office assists them through that process, is that something that -- that you guys can do?

MR. MACK: Well, there is one thing that we've talked about, or discussed internally. With the rebate program, the only guidance that we have right now are what's called administrative funds for the rebate program to try to ramp up.

One of the things that we have discussed is actually reaching out to the Public Service

Commission to try to be able to purchase bill stuffers, if you will, to go out to the customers, notifying them of the rebate program. So that's one of the things that's being discussed, giving them the specifics of the program.

COMMISSIONER PASSIDOMO: Okay. That's an interesting idea. I mean, I think it might be helpful to work with the utilities specifically as well. I don't know. Yeah. But I appreciate --

1 yeah, that's just a concern that I have is like --2. again, we want the money to come to Florida, of 3 course, but we also want it to be used effectively 4 for those customers who need it the most. 5 Thank you. Thank you, Commissioner CHAIRMAN FAY: Great. 7 Passidomo. 8 Any other questions? 9 Just -- just one quick follow-up. I -- I am 10 not sure of the best way to frame this, but do you find that there are, within the Department of 11 12 Energy, is -- is -- are there different points of 13 contact for each type of program? In other words 14 shall, the State doesn't have the ability to go to 15 the Department of Energy with some centralized 16 point of contact and say, you know, we are the 17 third large state now. Our jurisdiction at the PSC 18 alone is one of the largest in the country. Ι

mean, I think our ability at the make an impact

could be significant, but it does seem challenging

21 to get, kind of, the feedback that we need from all

different agencies, municipalities, state agencies,

private individuals, from the Department of Energy

with better direction.

Do you feel like you have been able to make

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1	some progress with either a central contact, or
2	maybe siloed contacts depending on the funding?
3	MR. MACK: It's siloed contacts depending on
4	the funding.
5	Our main contact is through Energy Efficiency
6	and Renewable Energy, or the State Energy and
7	Community Programs that has been renamed, but
8	that's our main contact. But if there are any
9	energy issues needing a contact, we are able to
10	reach out via the silos and try to put people in
11	appropriate contact.
12	CHAIRMAN FAY: And do you it's in part not
13	that the funding will get distributed, but more
14	just a timing issue? Like, it sounds like with
15	some of these programs, to your comments, that we
16	are just not quite there yet. Like, they are
17	finalizing maybe exactly how distribution will
18	work?
19	MR. MACK: Correct. We have been told what we
20	were going to receive, but the guidance has not
21	been given yet.
22	CHAIRMAN FAY: Okay.
23	MR. MACK: One other program that was assigned
24	by the Governor to the Division of Emergency
25	Management is the grid resiliency. That did not
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1	come through the Energy Office. It went through
2	Emergency Management. And that particular program,
3	of course, works with the utilities.
4	CHAIRMAN FAY: Okay. Great. Thank you.
5	Commissioners, seeing no other questions, Mr.
6	Mack, I know that the Commission I say the
7	Commission, the other Commission, the Commission of
8	Agriculture and Consumer Services, I know you are
9	busy and have a lot of work. We really appreciate
10	the taking the time, and for the Commission
11	allowing you to come over here and give us the
12	information. And I think our agency and yours will
13	be communicating about some of these energy
14	efficiency things, and information we can put out
15	to customers and the public that will be helpful.
16	I think we share a common goal of just trying
17	to get those expended in the way that's best and
18	appropriate for customers, and make sure they that
19	it's available if it's something they they
20	qualify for.
21	So thank you again for your time this morning.
22	We move on to other business in our Internal
23	Affairs, so you don't have to hang around with us
24	if you don't want to. We won't be offended by any
25	means. But thank you again for your time this

1	morning.
2	MR. MACK: Thank you for the opportunity.
3	CHAIRMAN FAY: All right. Commissioners, with
4	that, next we will move into our General Counsel's
5	report.
6	MS. HELTON: There is no report, Mr this
7	morning, Mr. Chairman.
8	CHAIRMAN FAY: Okay. Great. Thank you.
9	Our Executive Director?
10	MR. BAEZ: Good morning, Mr. Chairman and
11	Commissioners.
12	CHAIRMAN FAY: Good morning.
13	MR. BAEZ: A couple of items.
14	First, Florida Water Florida Community
15	Water Systems, staff will be holding a virtual
16	customer meeting on June 20th at 10:00 a.m. The
17	company filed, in November of '22, for revenue
18	neutral rate restructuring limited proceeding for
19	14 systems that it owns in Brevard, Lake and Sumter
20	Counties, and the notice has been given to the
21	customers, so mark that that should be marked on
22	your calendars.
23	Secondly, update on the Peoples Gas System
24	rate case, specifically the customer service
25	hearings. As I had mentioned before, the in-person

customer service hearings are upcoming, Wednesday,

June 28th at 2:00 p.m. in Pembroke Pines, and the

following day, Thursday, June 29th at 2:00 p.m. in

Brandon, in Hillsborough County.

There are a number of other ways to participate, specifically on virtual customer meetings, which have already been scheduled July 10th and July 11th at various times, and as well the technical hearing is scheduled for August 29th, coming end of summer.

And now I have another item -- a last item of interest, and we've got a very small and tightknit community in the best sense of the word. And in that vein, it may already widely be known that our most excellent Director of Economics, Judy Harlow, will be retiring at the end of July. And while we are not fully ready to say our farewells today, that day is going to be way louder and way sadder, certainly for me. We felt it prudent, and in the interest of a smooth transition, to announce her replacement today for the benefit of all involved.

And with that, I wanted to announce that
Elisabeth Draper has accepted the great challenge
of replacing Judy. And I am assuming that includes
the uphill battle of getting me to name my cat.

1	It's not going to happen.
2	Elisabeth is a wonderful ambassador for our
3	agency. And anyone that has heard her speak of the
4	agency can attest to that. She's been with the
5	Commission for 29 years. It's amazing, that
6	number, that it's been that time has flown. She
7	joined us in 1994 as a regulatory analyst with
8	Electric and Gas. And is now currently, until
9	further notice, Economics the Economic Bureau
10	Chief in Impact and Rate Design.
11	I can't think of a better person. It was a
12	difficult decision certainly for Mark, and in
13	discussing with me. We had we had good choices,
14	and hard choices to make, but I think we've made a
15	great choice, and I want to congratulate Elisabeth.
16	And I hope you will join me in congratulating her
17	and welcoming her to the new post as well. So
18	thank you for the time, and thank you, Elisabeth,
19	for agreeing to take on the challenge.
20	That's all I have got. And if you have got
21	questions, I am happy to answer anything you have.
22	CHAIRMAN FAY: Okay. Commissioners, any
23	questions for Mr. Baez?
24	Mr. Baez, thank you for the update. I think
25	it's important to for the Commission to have

1	information about transitions like that, and so I
2	appreciate you bringing them forward. Although,
3	it's definitely bittersweet, and I am excited for
4	Ms. Draper, very sad to see Judy
5	MR. BAEZ: This is the definition of
6	bittersweet. You always like to see good people,
7	you know, we have a small agency but good people
8	move on in their career move up in their
9	careers, but sadly, that involves great people
10	moving on, so
11	CHAIRMAN FAY: Yeah. And Judy the Cat, also
12	sounds like a great cat maybe to have, and maybe
13	just some
14	MR. BAEZ: It might well, you know, Judas
15	the Cat is is probably more appropriate but, you
16	know
17	CHAIRMAN FAY: Yeah. Okay. Okay. Fair
18	enough. Yeah.
19	Okay. Well, Commissioners, seeing any other
