CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: The only thing we have on the Internal Affairs, special Internal Affairs docket today is the approval of an interim General Counsel.

And I believe that everybody has met with the proposed candidate. Are there any words, discussions, comments?

Commissioner Edgar.

COMMISSIONER EDGAR: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. As you described, per your suggestion at, I believe, our last Internal Affairs meeting a few weeks ago and your suggestion that we meet with Mr. Beck, I did have the opportunity to meet with him and discuss his thoughts as to the role of General Counsel and share some of my thoughts as to the role of our General Counsel working with our legal staff. And we had a very positive conversation. I'm very pleased that he is interested in working with us, and I look forward to working with him as we move ahead.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Thank you very much.

Commissioner Brown.

COMMISSIONER BROWN: Thank you. I also had a chance to meet with Mr. Beck last week. And at first I wasn't really sold on the interim concept for a couple of reasons. I thought why not just promote someone from within if we're going to do interim or -- pardon my

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voice, I'm a little under the weather -- or hire someone permanently since we've known Mr. Kiser has been retiring for a few months now. But after meeting with him, I was definitely impressed with his field of knowledge. I think, you know, to be qualified in this pool, there's only a certain group of folks that really would be qualified. I think he meets that. He has a great understanding of the law, the matters we regulate, he's worked with the lawyers in our office, he's worked with the parties that we regulate.

I am a little skeptical of two things though. Pardon my voice. It's horrible. The first thing that I'm skeptical -- you know, he really committed to just six months to me. He said he has no intention of doing it any longer than six months. So getting, I guess, up to speed on how we do business in the legal department in a matter of six months was a little bit concerning to me.

I know when he was Deputy Counsel at OPC he did manage a few folks. Obviously our legal department is much bigger than the Office of Public Counsel, so I'm a little skeptical on that. You know, his 27 years of experience though definitely gives me some comfort and some confidence.

You know, I asked him also -- like I said, he

said he was committed firmly to six months and six months only. So I asked him, "Well, would you memorialize that in writing," because, you know, we've had interim folks that have gone beyond the intended purposes. And so I was comforted with that. He said that he was definitely doing it. And I asked him why he wanted to do it, because he seemed to be enjoying retirement very much and -- lucky guy. And so I asked him, "Why do you want to do it?" And he said, "Well, you know, I'm up for the challenge. It is only six months."

I care a lot about our legal department. I care about the attorneys that work in our legal department. I hope that the transition of hiring him will go smoothly.

Again, my only, the only thing I'm really skeptical is how is he going to get up to speed in enough time. He's never worked at the Public Service Commission. That's not a downfall. But it is interim, but I will support him.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Commissioner Balbis.

COMMISSIONER BALBIS: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

I did have the opportunity to meet with Mr. Beck, and I
was very impressed with him. He seemed to be, even
though he, as Commissioner Brown said, is committed to

only six months, he seemed to be passionate and excited
about the opportunity, and he seemed to have a firm
grasp of obviously what the Commission does, especially
with the number of years he spent at the Office of

Public Counsel.

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To be perfectly honest, you know, once he indicated to me that he's only committed for six months, I kind of looked at it in a different light in that, in that, you know, I wanted to focus on what his thoughts were to make sure it just wasn't an extension of his retirement, which certainly was not the case. He was very excited about it. He even had some ideas about how to improve the Commission and how we operate in that short period of time, which tells me it's someone that would take the job seriously and is excited to do it. I'm fully supportive of him.

I'm not sure, and I think, as Commissioner

Brown indicated, that it's the best process but -- with

hiring an interim. At this point I think he's a good

candidate for that.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Commissioner Brisé.

COMMISSIONER BRISÉ: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

And I too had the opportunity to meet with Mr. Beck. I found that he meets all the qualifications in terms of what I'm looking for in an interim.

And so let me define what I'm looking for in an interim. Someone who understands what we do and how we do it. Someone who can come in and take a look at some of our processes and things that we might need to look at before we bring in someone to take on the role full-time. When I say full-time, in terms of long-term or permanently.

So it gives us an opportunity to take a strong look at what we have currently. And so we talked about that in my conversation, recognizing that, as in most of our agencies, there's an issue of people getting ready to retire, and having someone look at that, knowing that they're not going to be here long-term, that gives them an opportunity to address that particular issue and what processes we can establish and put in place as we recruit and look at what our challenges are long-term as an agency.

So I think from my perspective Mr. Beck can help us in that regard. I think he's respected within the regulatory space in our state. And recognizing where we are in time, that is definitely an asset for this agency.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: I'd like to thank all my colleagues for taking the time to sit down and interview and to vet Charlie Beck. I'm very excited about the

choice. I think somebody that's sat on the other side of the table for 29 years has a perspective to add. I think -- I'm sure there's a lot of things that he said that "I wish they would have" or "didn't they ever think of" and that sort of thing.

So I think when you get on this side of the table, number one, you understand the reasons why we do some of the things we do. Number two, you can challenge us to do some of the things that you've always thought that we should have done maybe a little different, a little better. And so I think that six year -- six months to a year interjection into this agency I think is going to be a great thing. I think it's a great fit. And with that, I'll entertain a motion from Commissioner Edgar.

COMMISSIONER EDGAR: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

And I appreciate the comments of each of my colleagues.

Just to sum up, in my conversation with Mr. Beck and hearing the comments from each of you here with us today, I agree. I believe he seemed excited about the possibilities and I like that. He is clearly very qualified and, as has been stated, very well respected for his years of experience and knowledge. And I do believe he understands what we do and the role that we play and is clearly very experienced with the

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procedural requirements and processes.

We also discussed one of my passions, which is helping to mentor younger staff and giving them opportunities for professional growth. I think that's very important. And as somebody who's been involved in state government for many years, I really, I think it's a great strength that he can also bring to our work.

So with that -- or let me just add, I did not get into the discussion about a specific period of time. It just didn't come up in our conversation. My understanding prior was six months to one year. So what I would ask or what I would suggest, Mr. Chairman, is that on behalf of the agency that you negotiate with Mr. Beck and offer him a position and that you discuss the terms of that as well as salary and any timeline. And that is a motion.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Thank you. It's been moved and seconded. Any further discussion on the job offer to Mr. Beck? Seeing none, all in favor, say aye.

(Vote taken.)

Any opposed? By your action, you've extended the offer.

MR. KISER: Mr. Chairman?

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Yes, sir.

MR. KISER: I observed something this weekend

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that I thought I really should bring to the attention of 1 the Commission. As many of you know, the Florida State 2 Seminoles hosted Notre Dame Saturday night here in a big 3 football game, and I personally, in driving to the game, 4 I personally observed a formerly respected member of the 5 Public Counsel staff directing cars and parking them for 6 7 the outrageous price of \$50. And Mr. Steve Reilly was doing it quite aggressively, and the parking lot was 8 9 almost full. And everyone in my car was shocked at those what seemed to be unfair prices, and I would have 10 thought he'd have been more sensitive about stuff like 11 12 that.
