Use an Appliance Timer: Investing in a built-in timer can shave dollars off your winter electric bill. When using your space heaters or holiday lights, you can set your timer to give yourself peace of mind.

Unplug: Vampire electronics are electronics that use energy even when they're turned off. TVs, computers, chargers, and other gadgets are guilty culprits. According to a *USA Today* article, "The EPA estimates that these idle gadgets burn through more than 100 billion kilowatt hours of electricity nationwide each year. That's about \$10 billion worth of energy." To prevent this, make sure to unplug all your devices when not in use.

Secure your home year-round by weather-stripping your doors and windows and making sure all cracks are caulked correctly. This will help keep the cold air out. If you have a window air conditioning unit, remove it for the winter months to prevent heat from escaping through and around the unit. If it can't be moved, put a cover over it to prevent drafts.
